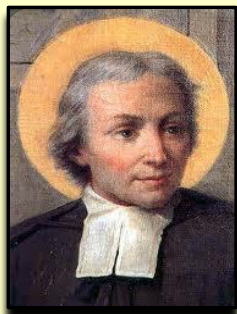

School News



“Good, safe, healthy decisions” is a particularly familiar phrase around Saint Paul’s School. The term can be heard on many Friday afternoons, sounding from the school intercoms through classrooms and hallways as disciplinarian Ken Sears and President Brother Raymond Bulliard, FSC advise students to act in a way that is beneficial to them as well as to others. Additional focus on safety comes during every class, when students and faculty pray that Brother James Miller will “*Help us make courageous choices.*” At Saint Paul’s, student safety is a constant and primary priority.



On February 5th, the Mothers’ Club made an invaluable contribution to the administrative effort to promote safety.



Officers Nick Manale, Dustin Dwight, and Greg Marchand from Troop L, and Susan Titman, Managing Nurse of Saint Tammany ICU had been assembled by the Mothers’ Club to speak to the school about an unpleasant topic of ever-increasing relevance in modern society: intoxicated driving. They gave a powerful presentation that aimed to make students aware of the immense gravity of operating a motor vehicle while impaired. Having served in their various positions for long enough to witness countless horrific incidents, the volunteers were thorough and effective in their testimonials, and students came away more cognizant of the immense dangers of drunk and drugged driving.

But that’s not where the message ended; following the Officer Dwight’s presentation, a family of especially honored guests took the stage.

Ashlee Stokes was fifteen years old, driving with a permit, when a drunk driver had collided with her car in 2008. The wreck, which had been no fault of her own, had caused permanent brain damage that severely impaired her movement and her cognition. Seven years later, Ashlee remains disabled; her speech is limited to slow, strings of words, and her every movement is dictated by whoever mans her wheelchair. Nevertheless, she remains compelled to share her story.

Saint Paul’s was fortunate enough to be the Stokes family’s latest audience. Unable to tell her story for herself, Ashlee remained in her wheelchair as her father David related the events of the wreck that had permanently altered so many lives.

“Ashlee’s story wasn’t like the usual ‘scare-us-into-being-good-kids’ speeches that we’re used to hearing from authority,” reflects senior Colin Skinner. “Instead, we were filled with inspiration and gratitude for what we take for granted every day, things like getting dressed or brushing our teeth.”

The standing ovation that followed the Stokes’ testimony affirmed that the message had hit home. Students queued to shake hands with the officers, Ms. Titman, and Ashlee and her parents, thanking them for a story that wouldn’t be soon forgotten.

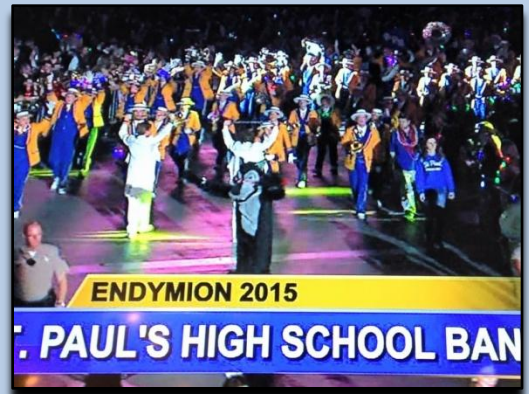

Project Lead the Way

Mole Day

The mole is a unit of measure most commonly used in Chemistry. It is used for counting things which are very small, such as atoms or molecules, and in the calculation of results of chemical reactions. The numerical value of the mole is 6.02×10^{23} (like the numerical value of a dozen is 12). The number is also called Avogadro's number after the Italian scientist, Amadeo Avogadro. In our chemistry classes the mole is used the entire second semester. Because the mole is so used so much in chemistry, scientists like to stress the importance of its role. There is a national mole day celebrated on October 23 (10^{23}). The animal mole really has no relation to the chemistry mole but scientists like to use the animal as sort of a mascot for the chemistry mole. In order to promote the mole in our chemistry class we have a mole day. The students create and decorate their own unique stuffed toy animal mole. Some of the moles we had this year included: "mole'lificent, Cara"mol" apple, Exxon "mole"bil, "mole"winkle, and "mole"er coaster.

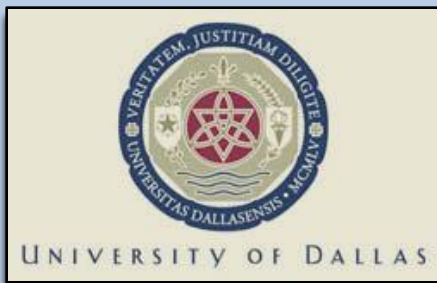
