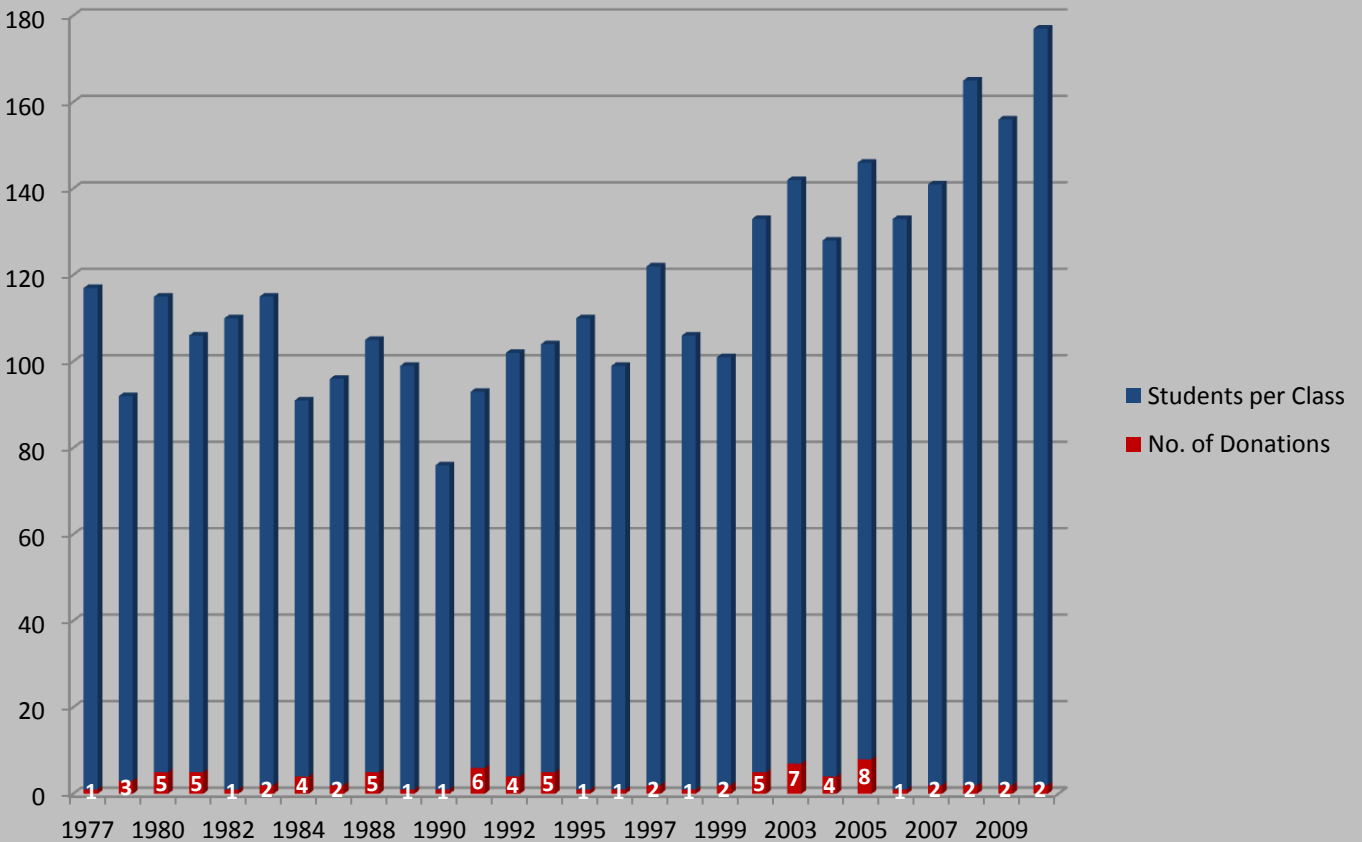
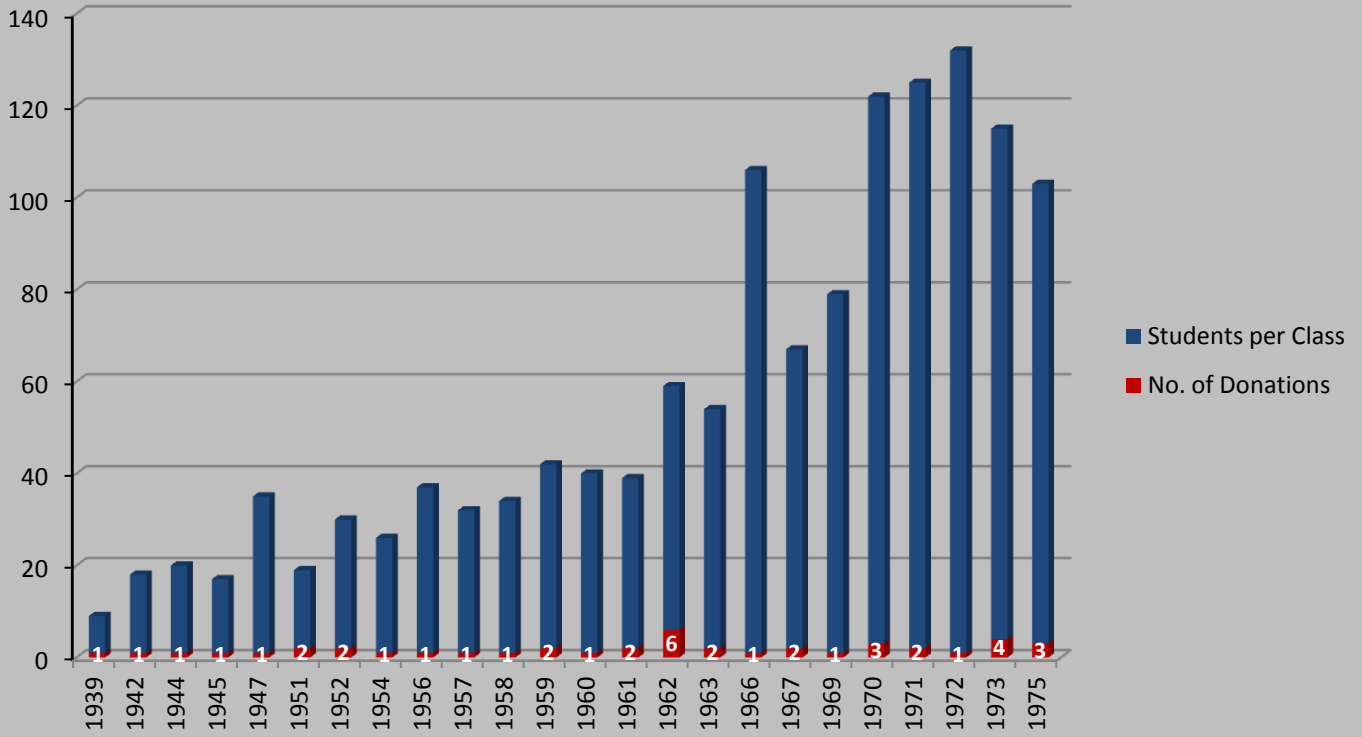

Echoes from the Past

Old Infirmary – Old Guidance Building – New Development/Alumni Office



Between the years of 1988 and 1997, the old infirmary building was called *Applehaus* and was easily recognized by its red door and red and white curtains. Although the building continued as an infirmary for resident students and a first aid station for all, it also housed the special program for which it was named.

Applehaus was an acronym for the basic human needs as defined by William Glasser, an American psychiatrist who is the father of *Reality Therapy* and *Control Theory*. In the eighties and well into the nineties his work was a significant part in helping create at Saint Paul's an education and handling of young men that

worked to help them make good choices in life and to be the ones in charge of their lives. He believed that to be happy and satisfied one must work to meet his basic needs.

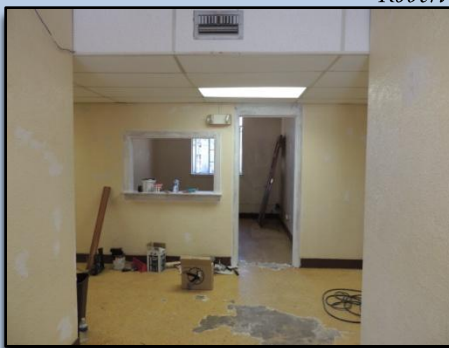
In order to assist our students in learning appropriate ways to meet and balance their needs, counselors and administrators organized the *Applehaus* program whereby students were invited to sign up for support groups to help them deal with problem areas in their lives; for example, family issues, relaxation and meditation, relationship conflicts, faith issues, drugs and alcohol abuse, suicide issues, even “how to get a date” and table manners for the younger students. Support groups were then formed and students went to *Applehaus* at lunch time where they met with group leaders: psychologists, psychiatrists, specially trained parents and teachers. More than half the student body in any given year were participants.

The program also included drug and alcohol abuse prevention workshops for parents and suicide prevention workshops for all sophomores. Merle Dooley served as the director and volunteer parents assisted.

In January 2012, the Lasalle Hall renovation was completed and the Counseling Department moved into the area where they are located today. The old infirmary has sat vacant since then.

In the beginning of this year, the decision was made to renovate the building and move the Development/Alumni offices into it upon completion before the end of the school year.

Chris Pool '97 - Chris completed the GOOFY CHALLENGE at Disney World running a half marathon and a full marathon on back to back days.

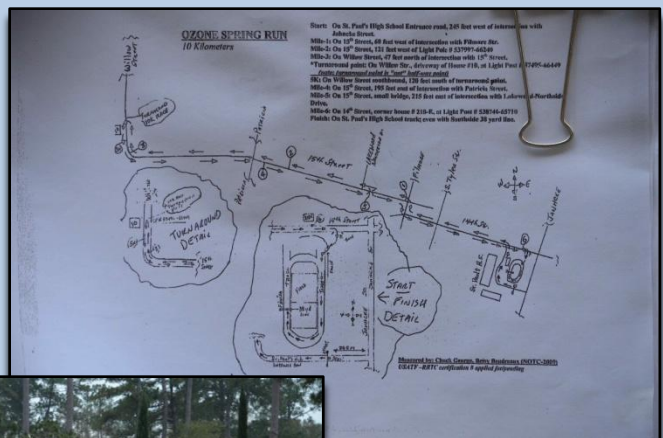
Goeff Pool '01 - Goeff completed the first ever DOPEY CHALLENGE at Disney World consisting of running a 5K, 10K, half marathon and full marathon in four consecutive days. He completed the 48.6 mile course in 6:05:35 averaging 7:51 per mile. The time for his first ever marathon of 3:23:10 placed him 285th out of 25,000 runners. His time in the DOPEY CHALLENGE was 51st out of the 6114 runners who finished. Goeff is currently serving as a ship's pilot with the Biscayne Bay Pilots Association.

Connor Campo '13 - Connor, two time LHSAA state champion, won the NCAA Division III Regional Championship last week at Wartburg College. He wrestled in the Nationals as the only true freshman but unfortunately lost. Connor was named the 2014 IIAC Freshman Wrestler of the Year. Click [here](#) for article. He finished the year 28-9 overall and of his nine losses, six were to NCAA Division III Championship participants, including the second-, third-, and fourth-place finishers at that weight and two others came to top-3 finishers at the NAIA Championships. 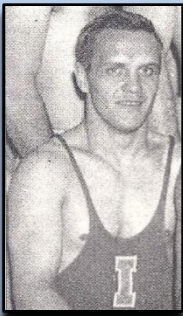

Legendary wrestling coach, Dale “Coach K” Ketelsen, and father of Saint Paul’s Athletic Director and head wrestling coach, Craig Ketelsen, passed away on Saturday, March 22nd. Click [here](#) for the obituary. Dale had many achievements as a wrestler as well as a coach. After wrestling in high school in Iowa, he wrestling in the 1960 Olympic Trials and lost to the eventual gold medal winner. His team won many championships while coaching in Iowa and was hired in 1967 as LSU’s first wrestling coach. During his ten year tenure, his teams won two SEC conference titles, as well as titles in the Southern AAU and Southeastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Tournament. He produced fifteen individual conference champs. Click [here](#) for LSUSportsNet article. He has been on the NCAA rules committee and is a charter member of USA Wrestling. After leaving LSU, he coached at Catholic High School in Baton Rouge and Bellaire High School. In 2001, Dale received the 2001 Master of Wrestling Award from Wrestling USA Magazine. Saint Paul's recently had a very special and familiar guest on campus. On Tuesday, February 18, current Principal/President Brother Ray Buillard welcomed former Principal Brother Jeffrey Calligan, FSC back to Saint Paul's during an "all school" assembly. Brother Jeff served as the sixteenth Christian Brother principal of Saint Paul's School, and, during his tenure as principal, even hired Brother Ray as a senior counselor at that time. Brother Ray assured Brother Jeff that the school has done nothing but improve since he last set foot on campus and that the Lasallian traditions remain more alive than ever before.



Brother Jeff experienced firsthand exactly what Brother Ray meant. On Wednesday night, February 19, he attended the state championship ring ceremony for the 2013 State Champion Cross Country Wolves in the Our Lady of Peace Chapel. Head Coach Terryl Chatham along with moderator Myrle Wiggins distributed the rings to the champion Wolves as an eternal remembrance of victory and companionship.

Brother Jeff also had the opportunity to witness the Marching Wolves participate in the Mardi Gras festivities. St. Joseph's Day Altar

Faith

In celebration of the feast day of Saint Joseph on March 19, a very special parent of a Saint Paul's student puts on a Saint Joseph Altar annually. But the school started the Altar a few days early and celebrated Monday, March 10. Saint Joseph is the "patron and protector of the Institute of the Christian Brothers" and therefore holds a special place in the hearts of the community.

This altar, flowing with flowers, grains, fruits, vegetables, seafood, and sweets, pays homage to Saint Joseph in a unique way. The legend goes that during the Middle Ages a drought struck the island of Sicily. Famine and many other hardships railed the land. Fish died, rivers dried, and crops disappeared as the Sicilians desperately needed rain. The faithful people prayed to Saint Joseph that he would intercede to God for them, and the Sicilians promised that they would forever honor Saint Joseph if their petitions were granted. After days of deep prayer, God answered their cries for help. Rains began to fall, crops flourished, and fish filled the waters where there had been none. In his honor, they began to construct an altar every year in Saint Joseph's honor on his feast day. The Sicilians built the altar in three levels, representing the Holy Trinity.



Besides being an Italian tradition, the altar is also a New Orleans tradition and has made its way into the city of Covington, but more specifically and recently into Saint Paul's School. About sixteen years ago, Doctor Ann Kay Logarbo, mother of Class of 2013 Patrick Logarbo, Class of 2009 graduate Nick Logarbo, and Class of 2008 graduate Brian Logarbo, prayed to Saint Joseph as vehemently as the Sicilians of the Middle ages when illness struck her elder brother. When things seemed grimmest, Ann Kay and her mother asked Saint Joseph to save her brother; in return, she would build an altar in his honor. Within two months, the brother beat his sickness and turned around his life. Ever since then, the Saint Joseph Altar has been at our school and this year marks its fifteenth year.

Large numbers of students and parent volunteers assisted Logarbo throughout the weekend with preparation of the food and altar itself. Students visited the altar during their religion classes with opportunities to feast on the many desserts and other items that had been placed on the altar in honor of St. Joseph. At lunchtime, Logarbo, along with a strong contingency of mothers from the St. Paul's Mothers Club, offered a meal to every member of the student body and faculty, a welcome treat for most from the usual "iffy" cafeteria food. Delicious catfish, spaghetti, salad, and various pastas comprised most of the menu.

Before any feasting starts, however, the food is blessed. As tradition has it, if the food is not eaten, proper etiquette would require that a person buries it in the ground. Doctor Logarbo makes sure to adhere to these particular qualifications when organizing this awesome spectacle. Specifically labeled trash cans are used to collect the uneaten food and prepare it for burial.

Saint Paul's School graciously appreciates Doctor Logarbo's hard work as this day is a particular favorite in the hearts of the student body.

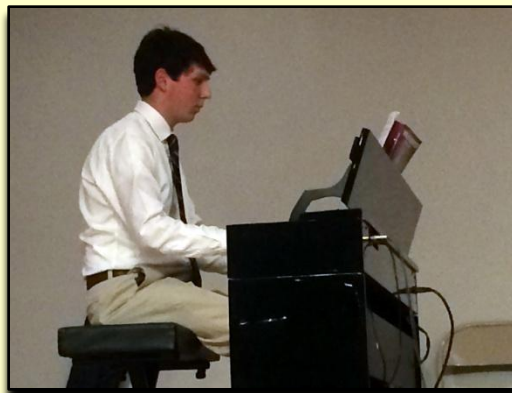


Mother Son Brunch

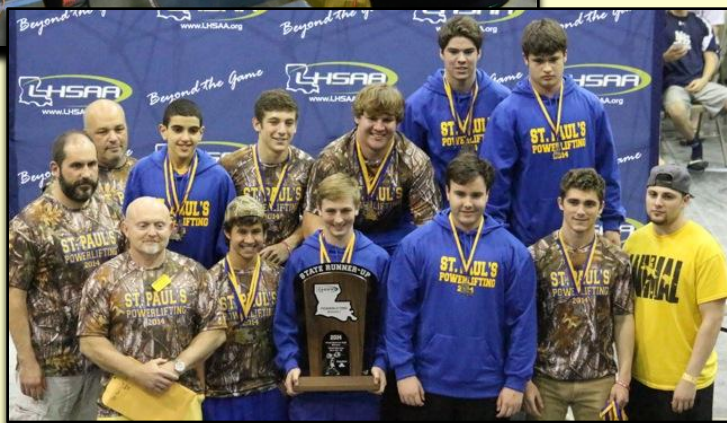

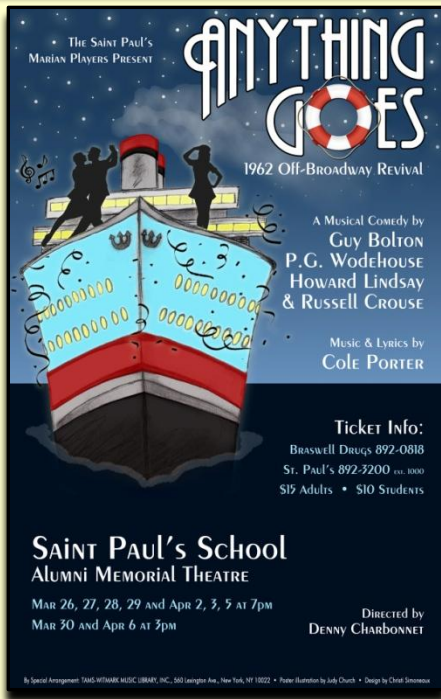
