Rather, he looked over at me with tears in his eyes and a lump in his throat and muttered, " I am never going to hear that again while wearing this uniform." I cannot tell you what that meant to me as a competitor, a coach and most of all as a proud alumnus and alumni director of Saint Paul's School. This was coming from a young man who is a multiple time individual State Champion and All State performer, with a nearly perfect score on the ACT , heading to Princeton University as a student athlete, and with the world at his fingertips. ---- It was not about winning or the remote possibility of losing. It was about WOLF PRIDE and that moment of realization of THIS IS IT for my Blue and Gold experience that so many of us have lived. I saw it last Friday night amongst our Senior Football Players who did not want to leave the field after the game, and I never grow tired of reliving that emotion.

I must also quote Coach Terryl Chatham in his post meet summary to the team, as his words embodied what we are all about at St. Paul's, "This win is not just for you but for all of the guys before you and for the young men who have not yet had the honor and privilege of wearing a Blue and Gold uniform. " While we certainly cannot go back in time, I maintain and reiterate constantly that life is mostly about relationships and memories. We are all truly blessed to have formed so many great ones here at Saint Paul's in each category, and we are equally as blessed with the opportunity to continue to be a part of the Saint Paul's family.

Finally, I am compelled to reference Zach's concluding remarks of his Open House speech. In regard to Saint Paul's being a college preparatory school, he duly noted that we fulfilled our obligation and that we have certainly been a good place for him to grow up, preparing him well for the world ahead. He said, "I am prepared. I am prepared to leave. I just don't want to!"





Saint Paul's Aqua Wolves

Saint Paul's AquaWolves were back in action on Saturday, November 9 at the cluster meet that was cancelled from Tropical Storm Karen back in early October. In winning their second straight cluster meet, the team racked up 395 points decisively outdistancing five other schools at the meet. The AquaWolves were led by juniors Jacob Elliott and Jack Dubreuil, freshman Brenton Larmann and senior co-captain Max Morvant.


The Season of the Wolf gathered more momentum on Tuesday, November 12 as the team overtook Mandeville in the last relay to win the 2nd Annual Turkey Leg Invitational, besting seven other teams and edging the Skippers 407 to 405 in the final tally. This was the team's third cluster meet win this season. With only 11 swimmers to Mandeville's 20, the team captured trophies in seven of 11 events, with junior Jacob Elliott dominating the 100 and 200 freestyles, anchoring both the second place 200 freestyle relay and the victorious, meet clinching 400 freestyle relay. Other winners were Jack Dubreuil, who held off a fast finishing Mandeville swimmer to hit the wall first in the 200 individual medley, Brenton Larmann, who blasted out to an early lead in the 100 butterfly and won going away, and Senior Co-Captain Max Morvant who, in his last individual race as a Saint Paul's swimmer, came from behind in the 100 breaststroke, showed the grit and determination that reflects the outstanding qualities of the entire team, and touched out the field for the winner's trophy.

The Aqua Wolves' season will conclude on November 22 and 23 in Sulphur when the highly motivated group compete in the Division 1 state championship.




Three Rivers Art Festival in Covington
