
reimplementation of the alumni Board, the Spring calendar events, committee formations, and the like. As always, feel free to contact us in development or alumni, if we can be of any assistance.





Echoes of the Past



Steven Scott Stalder Memorial

In 1986, I remember Principal Brother Jeffrey waiting for us in Founders' Circle. We got off the bus and gathered around and he broke the news to us that we had lost one of our schoolmates, Scott Stalder. Scott had been in an accident that took his life. I recall the confusion I felt and the grief I saw around me. As the days and weeks passed, I took in the different stages of grief with the support the guys gave one another as well as the Brothers and faculty; listening, hugs, and shoulders to cry on, a true rebuilding of the community crushed by tragedy.



From that tragedy, the Class of '86 decided to put up a reminder for all for students as a reflection of Scott who freely associated with all groups and all levels. The monument is a simple and effective student bulletin board. A place where one see himself in photos or find out what's for lunch. From the profound displays of Saint Paul's community in action to the latest painting, it can be found here.

The monument is located in the heart of the campus next to the

Signum Fidei Pavilion between Benilde Hall and the Main School Building. The monument is passed by hundreds of students every day and utilized by clubs to display their latest triumphs. I leave you with a excerpt from the 1986 Salutatory address of Sam Latino: "As I look back at the year, I know that one of the most important, unifying factors was the tragic death of senior Scott Stalder. Scott was a significant part of our class; every member was affected by his death. Together we still miss him. We could not have coped with this tragedy as individuals; we were supported by the love and shared-grief of our classmates. We learned what John Donne meant when he said, "No man is an island, entire of itself; every man is a piece of the continent, a part of the main."





Grandparents Day





Academics

On Friday, September 20, twenty senior and junior students from the Engineering III Civil Engineering and Architecture class took a field trip to the construction site of the new Louisiana State University Medical Center which will be replacing Charity Hospital in New Orleans. The class, accompanied by Assistant Principal Trevor Watkins, physics teacher Rachel Peak, and Habitat for Humanity moderator and math teacher Richard Pichon, arrived at 10:30 and met with the project manager who gave a brief overview of the construction work being done.





Afterwards, the boys split up into three groups. Two of the groups went and analyzed CAD programs, computer aided design, which displayed 3D models and layouts of the 1.2 million dollar construction project. Engineers, architects, and designers from across the have worked together on this project. The third group went out to the actual construction and viewed the design and architecture style. The group leader disclosed very interesting facts about the entire project and building process.

On Saturday, September 28, Saint Paul's held the 19th Annual St. Paul's Math Tournament. With the Briggs Assembly Center opened for business this year, 230 mathaletes from twelve different schools rushed into the BAC for its first ever math tournament. The Fighting Math Wolves led the charge while battling in individual and team competitions over various categories: Geometry, PreAlgerbra, and Algebra I and II. Equipped with nothing more than pencils and brains since



Freshman Retreat


The second quarter begins a special time of spirituality for the students of Saint Paul's School. As part of the Lasallian "experience" at our school, each grade level has its own unique and specific religious retreat designed for the needs of the students' growth as "men of God." Each level retreat builds on the other, and they culminate with what is arguably the most highly-anticipated event at Saint Paul's School: Senior Retreat. While none of the other retreats can quite fully equal Senior Retreat in the aspects of effectiveness and profoundness, the faculty and student leaders try their best to make these prayerful days worthwhile. The freshman class went on their retreats in mid October while the pre-freshmen will have their retreat a month later.



The freshman retreat is split into two days: one day is spent at the Camp Abbey Retreat Center in Covington and the other is spent at various service projects around the Covington area. Half of each grade goes to the retreat one day and the next day to the service day.

The freshmen started their retreat on Thursday and Friday, October 17 and 18, at Camp Abbey. Two school buses filled with about eighty students spilled onto the Retreat Center grounds deep in the woods of Covington. From nine o'clock to two thirty, the freshman reflected upon a question asked by freshman religion teacher Thomas Lahey: "How is your relationship with God?" Mr. Lahey along with fellow teachers Mr. Lacour, Mr. Marchese, Mrs. Schmitt, and Mrs. Brett and about twenty-five Lasallian Youth Leaders guided the freshmen to find their path to faith and assisted them in strengthening their bond with God and each other as classmates. Seniors Thomas Ruli, Michael Burke, and Michael Stewart shared their own personal testimonies about their relationships with God over the two days.

When it came time for the class of 2017 to do service, the freshmen broke into six or seven groups of ten to fifteen students each. These groups went to a few places to help local families within our community: the YMCA, Forest Manor retirement home, the Covington Food Bank, and the Covington Food Bank Thrift Shop. Freshman Patrick Napier, who went to the Covington Food Bank, greatly enjoyed his hours helping others: "I worked with a dozen of my classmates for about four hours. Two moms helped us box up food for families. I even had an opportunity to give a box of food to a woman in need which really hit home the message of serving others." 








Marian Players



The Saint Paul's Marian Players are set to perform the World War II era comedy, "The Teahouse of the August Moon," starting Nov. 6 at the school's Alumni Memorial Theatre, a revival that originally graced the school's stage 11 years ago.

"Teahouse of the August Moon" tells the story of Misfit Captain Fisby who is sent to the Americanize the village of Tobiki on Okinawa, the largest of the Ryukyu Islands. His commanding officer, Col. Wainwright Purdy III, assigns him a wily local, Sakini, to act as interpreter.

Play director Denny Charbonnet is looking forward to the opening, noting, "When we performed it 11 years ago, it went over very well. It's a funny play; it focuses around very inept people handling their positions as they try to understand one another, and it sends a good message of seeing people for who they really are and not just what is on the surface."
