Meet the Schools of San Francisco New Orleans District: Last week I highlighted La Salle High School in Yakima, Washington. This week, we move into the state of Oregon, where there are two Lasallian schools. I'll start with La Salle Catholic

College Prep in Milwaukie, OR. With a motto of "Enter to learn, leave to serve", La Salle has been providing a quality, Catholic, college-preparatory education on their 34 acre campus to students of the Portland/Vancouver metropolitan area since 1966. La Salle serves a socio-economically diverse student population; about 19% of this population is minority and 67% are Catholic. Their co-ed student body (about 700, almost equally divided between boys and girls) is drawn from as far north as Ridgefield, WA and as far south as Salem, OR. Sixteen percent of their students live in the state of Washington. They offer 14 AP courses and 170 of their students sat for AP exams last spring. The class of 2014 garnered over \$11M in scholarship offers. They are a 1 to 1 ipad school and offer a STEM academy option. Some interesting courses include Chinese, German, Music Technology, Fashion Illustration, & Game Design and Theory. Their annual school theme centers on a social justice issue. Last year, the theme was *Investing in the World's Women* and the whole student body had the same book to read. Their mascot is *Falcons*. Geaux Falcons!

**Wolf Pack Time:** Our revised advisory program (now known as Wolf Packs) debuts on Tuesday. Here are the highlights of the program:

• All students are assigned to a Wolf Pack which will meet every other Tuesday. The Wolf Pack is a grouping of a single faculty member and a selection of students. Most, but not all, returning students have the same faculty advisor as they did last year. A many factors were involved in forming Packs but any adjustments were done out of necessity. Students will be informed on Mon about which Wolf Pack they are assigned to.

- The "re-branding" of the program to Wolf Packs is intended foster more of a 'pack' mentality to promote a stronger relationship within the group.
- A committee of teachers and students plans each Wolf Pack time.
- During Pack Time, we still deal with important topics of discussion when such topics are deemed relevant and necessary (bullying, safety, etc.). We also emphasize DOING things to reinforce the topic of the day as opposed to just talking.
- The success of the program relies upon everyone's openness to the structure. Many people, teachers and students work hard to make this program relevant and enjoyable.
- Senior leadership and mentoring is stressed, especially between seniors and Pre-freshmen. This is Big Brother program.

*When the Game Stands Tall:* I don't usually recommend movies, but this Fri, Aug 22, WTGST opens in theaters across the country, including Covington. The film is an inspiring story about the 151 game high school football win streak by Coach Bob Ladouceur of De La Salle High School in Concord, CA – a Lasallian school in the San Francisco New Orleans Province. Coach's approach emphasizes to his young men the value of purpose and significance over the glory of titles and streaks. It's based on a true story and is an inspiring film, worth viewing by our students. The two local Covington movie houses

are showing it – just in case your son is looking for a good flick.

New LA Laws: In case you weren't aware, the following legislative acts became law on Aug 1:

- School Zone Cell Phone Ban: Motorists are now prohibited from using any type of hand held wireless communications device while traveling through schools zones during posted hours. The law includes use of a cellular/wireless device for engaging in a voice call, accessing, reading, or posting to a social networking site, and/or writing, sending, or reading a text-based communication. The school zone cell phone ban does not apply if the device is being used to report an emergency, is being used in a hands-free manner, or while the vehicle is lawfully parked. Upon first violation of the school zone ban the fine is \$175, subsequent violations can be up to \$500, and if a crash occurs during the time of the violation, fines can be increased.
- LA Litter Law Updates: Amendments to the LA litter law now specifically include cigarettes and cigarette butts to the official definition of litter. Additionally, the fine for a first offense increases to \$300 with 8 hours of community service in a litter abatement program, second offense to \$700 with 16 hours of litter abatement, and a third and subsequent offense to \$1500 with 80 hours of service in a litter abatement program.

**ALERT St. Tammany:** If you have not done so, I encourage you to register for this service. It will inform you when any event poses a threat to us. With ALERT St. Tammany, the Parish can inform you, by phone, based on your geographical location in the Parish, when your safety or well-being is at risk. Evacuation orders, security issues and health threats are among some of the reasons they would feel it necessary to use the Alert St. Tammany. Your information will be used only for this purpose. You can access the self-registration page <u>here</u> or at <u>https://stpgov.onthealert.com/</u> and enter your contact info. I've signed up and we'll react accordingly.

**Seniors**: Want to earn \$200 or more in one day? The St. Tammany Clerk of Court has opportunities for you as an Election Commissioner on Election Days. 17 year old US citizens enrolled in 12th grade as well as 18 year old and older registered voters are eligible. You must attend a training class. See your Civics teacher for more information or go to the St. Tammany Clerk of Court website: www.sttammanyclerk.org/main/elections.asp

**Service Hours:** We remind all of our students of their obligation to do at least 10 hours of service this year. Last May, a number of seniors did not receive their caps and gowns because they had not completed their service hours. If a student does not want to help others by giving of his time, Saint Paul's is not the place for him.

**Important Tax Info**: The Louisiana Department of Revenue reminds parents that back-to-school shopping can qualify for a \$5,000 per-dependent tax deduction on their state tax returns next year by saving receipts. Items such as uniforms, supplies and TUITION are eligible for tax breaks on the income tax forms due May 15, 2013. The maximum deduction is \$5,000 per dependent student, he said. More information is available at www.revenue.louisiana.gov/schooldeduction.

**Driver's License Proof of Attendance:** Don't forget: you son will need proof of attendance in order to get a learner's permit. The forms are in the counseling department or the administration building. I feel terrible when a parent waits two hours at the DMV only to be turned away b/c the son doesn't have his proof of attendance. This is a legislative act, so don't blame me!
