The following words are taken from Saint John Baptist de La Salle's Meditation for Palm Sunday. May they help us make the most of this Holy Week.



Jesus Christ came to this earth to reign, but not, says Saint Augustine, as other kings do... for his kingdom is not of this world but is to establish his reign within our souls....So that Jesus Christ may reign over your souls, you must pay him the tribute of your actions. All of them must be consecrated to him; in them there must be nothing that is not pleasing to him. They ought to have no other intention than to accomplish his holy will.

So that Jesus Christ may reign in your soul, wage war under his leadership against the enemies of your salvation, who are also his enemies. Because he wishes to establish his peace within you, a peace which, according to Saint Paul, ought to reign in your hearts, he must overcome—and you must overcome with him and by his help—anything that is able to be an obstacle. You must eliminate within you the man of sin who in the past has reigned over you.

Be disposed today, then, to receive Jesus Christ fully by abandoning yourself entirely to his guidance and by letting him reign over your whole interior life, so absolutely on his part and so dependently on yours that you may in truth say that it is no longer you who live but Jesus Christ who lives in you.

ASSEMBLY ON MAR 23: I hope the students enjoyed our March 23 assembly. Here's some of what we did:

- Welcomed two levels (seniors and 8th graders) into the gym for the first time (while still within COVID protocol numbers) while we live-streamed the event to the other levels in their classrooms. The 8th graders entered to the strains of Mouret's "Rondeau" and the thunderous applause of the seniors, in a ceremony that would have been done at the first assembly of the year in August. I asked the pre-freshmen if they were willing to live the Lasallian way, to which they replied "Yes, Brother, I am willing!)
- The music then switched to the strains of "I Surrender" as performed by Class of 2010 alums Thomas Lorando and 2009 alum Jackson Parsons. This has become a Lenten tradition since the days when Jackson and Thomas would perform the song live in the gym for the Holy Week assembly. I reminded the students that the song encourages us to surrender to God and give up our sinful ways. Time continues to pass. But it's not too late to change. Are we cooperating with God's plan? Are we making the most of the time we are allotted?
- Welcomed students to the second week of the fourth quarter and reminded them that their GPAs will change in just a couple of weeks, so put the effort in academically. - Starting to run out of time, I encouraged the boys to SLOW THEIR ROLL through Covington and to remember the HOPE of luminarias.
- Then, as if by magic, Johann Pachelbel's Canon in D



started playing – which I mostly play at important senior events. I told the seniors that it was time to induct them into the Alumni Association. I projected a slide which has the Profile of a Saint Paul's Alumnus and asked the seniors if they were willing to commit to living up to those ideals. The Profile is printed at the end of the newsletter if you wish to read it. They responded: Yes, Brother, I'm willing! Faculty members who are SPS alumni then blessed the alumni pins with holy water and seniors walked up to get their pins and decals – while Pachelbel played robustly in the background. It was a special moment for the Class of 2021.

- We ended with a playing of "I Surrender" with seniors singing along. it was emotionally and spiritually moving and powerful. I again begged the student body to concentrate only on "the good" during this Lenten season and to make safe choices. I closed by reminding the students what the candle represents the love of God, the grace and peace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit. I exhorted them to spread God's love to all whom they meet.

BAND HALL HISTORY: In the summer of 1966, the school constructed a "recreation center" for the recreational needs of the students living in La Salle Hall dorm. At a cost of \$15,000, a building was constructed to provide ping pong, pool, games and TV for boarders. Eventually, arcade-type games and a snack bar were added. In addition, a nine-hole miniature golf (putt-putt) course was built in front of the building, complete with lighting for nighttime use.



The facility, known simply as "the rec hall", served the recreational needs of the boarding students until the summer of 1995, when, once again, the needs of the school dictated change. The overall population of the school was growing, but the population of the boarding program was shrinking. Accordingly, the decision was made to move the "rec hall" into La Salle Hall itself and to move the band hall (which was located on the third floor of Benilde Hall) into the rec hall building, thus allowing us to construct five more classrooms in Benilde Hall. The miniature golf course had also deteriorated and was removed.

The building has served the Marching Wolves well since that time, but, again, needs dictate change. In addition to overall building deterioration, our band programs have been expanding of late and now include concert, jazz, and drum corps components in addition to the renowned Marching Wolves, now almost one hundred members strong! They are deserving of a better facility. This new facility will provide expanded space, restrooms,

acoustics, and aesthetics to our music program. Construction has begun and this \$2.3 million project will be completed in the summer of 2021. LOUISIANA SCHOOLS RANK SEVENTH FOR IN-PERSON **INSTRUCTION:** It's not often that LA schools rank in the top ten, but last week's news is cause for joy: LA schools are among states leading the way in providing in-person instruction to students. The American Enterprise Institute currently ranks LA No. 7 in the nation for the highest number of students participating in face-to-face learning. A quote from the report: "Louisiana schools have been at the forefront of safely providing in-person instruction this entire school year." "The success of in-person instruction in our state is due to the heroic efforts of our teachers and leaders," said State

Superintendent of Education Dr. Cade Brumley. "Despite the challenges the past year have presented in Louisiana, our educators continue to serve the needs of our children and families." And the Catholic schools, especially SPS, have definitely helped! - Parents: stress with your sons the consequences of inappropriate social media posting. Cyber-bulling is against the law and has legal implications. And the school will take strong measures .
- Students: THINK before you post!

SPORTSMANSHIP TALKS: Trevor, Joe Dickens, Lee Pierre, and I spoke to each sophomore, junior, and senior classes concerning the increasing incidents of poor and inappropriate "sportsmanship" by students at our athletic events. We had even banned students from attending events for the past two weeks. I echo Trevor's remarks to the students: *Moving forward ANY instance of improper fan behavior will result in very severe consequences. We have to stop what has been happening and change the culture at our athletic contests. I encourage all teachers to reinforce our new vigilance in this regard both by taking strong action when you see or hear of it and by talking to your classes about expectations. Please reinforce this message with your sons. And parents – this sometimes applies to a few of you, too. We will not tolerate abusive behavior by anyone at our events.*

SUPERINTENDENT DR. 
