## Final 2012-13 Edition of the President/Principal's Newsletter

My last newsletter (I hear you cheering!) will be brief. My final Lasallian thought is the same one I use every year at this time: a short excerpt from Saint John Baptist de La Salle's last Meditation for the Time of Retreat to the Brothers entitled: *On the reward that a Brother should expect in heaven, if he is faithful in the work*. Saint La Salle wrote this meditation because the life of the early brothers was VERY hard – and he needed to assure them that they would one day be rewarded by Almighty God. He made sure they read this meditation every year.

I shared the meditation with the faculty last week and asked them to believe that St. La Salle wrote the meditation for them, too, for their lives as teachers are difficult and challenging, and they need to believe they are valued by Almighty God and doing His work.

I share the excerpt from the meditation with you, too, because as parents, you are the primary educators of your children as you lead them on the path to salvation. Your work as parent is hard, but it is God's work. I believe, therefore, that Saint La Salle's words apply equally to you, too:

Oh, what glory there will be for those who have instructed children, when their zeal and devotion to procure the salvation of children will be made public before all people! All heaven will resound with the thanksgiving which these blessed children will render to those who have taught them the road to heaven.

Act, then, in such a way by your good and wise guidance of those who are entrusted to you, that you will procure all these blessings and all this glory for yourself.

Thank you for your parental ministry. I am profoundly awestruck by the responsibility you have in raising your children. I am most grateful that you have allowed Saint Paul's to share in your parental teaching ministry this past year. I am confident that the good work we have done this past year will help insure the truth of Saint La Salle's words for all of us when our day of judgment comes and that "all heaven" is resounding with the good example and instruction you are providing to your children.

Thanks for 2012-13 and here's looking to 2013-14 – the third year of our second century!

**Faith-Based High Schools Newspaper Ad:** Six faith-based high schools in St. Tammany jointly sponsored an ad in the May 26<sup>th</sup> Covington/Mandeville editions of The Times Picayune concerning the recent vandalism on our campus. In the ad, we do not condemn the perpetrators of the vandalism, only their actions. We urge all to use this opportunity to bring good out of bad by building an inclusive community in St. Tammany which respects all people and rejects any act of ill will towards others. We hope that this is the beginning of the faith-based high schools acting in concert on issues which affect all of our students and our community. I am grateful to the chief administrators of SSA, Christ Episcopal, Northlake Christian, Archbishop Hannan, and Pope John Paul II high schools. The Superintendent of Catholic Schools for the Archdiocese and the Christian Brother Leadership of the New Orleans-Santa Fe Province also signed the statement. Archbishop Aymond is fully aware of the ad and has endorsed it.

**Summer Reading:** ALL students have a summer reading obligation for their English class. The list and discussion questions are posted on Edline. Please encourage your son to take his summer reading obligation seriously. We deliberately limit the number of books to be read in order not to make this an onerous task, and we certainly encourage more reading that just what we are requiring. Toward that end, I offer the following:

- We often see that a student's weakest ACT score is in reading. Why? Students don't like to read! Solution? Read more! PLEASE insist your son devote part of each day (30 minutes? 15? 10?) to reading. He's used to this in school with SSR (I hope you know what SSR is!) This could be a family activity set aside time when the whole family reads. Turn off the TV, i-pod, X-Box, the computer and read.
- And speaking of ACT /SAT scores, summer provides an excellent opportunity to prepare. There are
  local formal courses, but both ACT and SAT offer on-line prep programs at very reasonable costs. Or
  just purchase one of the many test preparation books on the market and ask your son to spend 15
  minutes a day preparing. Long term preparation is the only solution. You can't "cram" for an ACT or
  SAT the night before.

This award, based upon senior's performance at LSU Spring Testing, is given to the TOP TWENTY schools in the state. Always treat other people in a manner that shows your awareness of their reflecting the image of God. In all ways let your friends, classmates, and acquaintances know that they are respected. Speak out if you know someone is being abused or bullied. Share the information with a parent, priest, or teacher who can step in and help. The Archdiocese of New Orleans has the staff available to help you in abusive or bullying situations.

One of your many responsibilities at this time is to make choices which will allow you the opportunity to make decisions about your future education or career choices. Choose wisely. Choose only those opportunities and interactions which will give you a greater chance to achieve all of the goals you set for yourself and those which God has in store for you.

If you need help, please let a member of the clergy, a Catholic School Administrator, a Director of Religious Education, or your Youth Minister know.

Wow! Department: James Robert Flautt was the valedictorian of the Class of 1936. A native of Mississippi, his parents knew that his future was in gaining a quality education that his local area could not provide, so they enrolled him as a boarding student at Saint Paul's. In the midst of the Great Depression, his parents sold some of their material goods in order to afford the cost of \$30 a month (yes -that was for tuition, room and board!). Robert, as he was called, graduated first in his class of 19 students. He enrolled in Spring Hill College to study pre-med and went on to become a very successful physician. In 1995, he donated over \$150,000 to SPS in appreciation for his education here. That gift served as seed money for the student center renovation that year, so we named the new religion classes in his honor. Although he was living in Minnesota, he came to SPS for the dedication and had a grand time interacting with the students. He kept in touch and would call every now and then to see how we were doing. When he died several years ago, he left \$50,000 to Saint Paul's in the form of life insurance policies he had purchased in the school's name. At the time, we commended his soul to Almighty God and gave thanks for this good, faithful, and generous alumnus. Imagine my surprise, then, when we received a check a couple of weeks ago for \$135,000 from a charitable trust that Dr. Flautt had established to be distributed following the death of his wife, Agnes, which occurred last November. I had no idea. What's even more remarkable is that the Trust document originally listed seven institutions that were to share the money equally. He later amended the document, reducing the recipients to only three – and Saint Paul's was one of those three. Wow. Who knows what seeds we are planting for the future? God bless you and your family, Dr. Flautt! Thank you beyond words. May your example inspire many SPS alums and supporters in similar positions to imitate your generosity as we face the uncertainties of the future! Maybe there's a future Dr. Flautt in the Class of 2013! The school will need him!

Well, I wasn't brief with this newsletter as promised! Sorry! But you'll get a break from me as I'll only be sending things out periodically during the summer. **And for the Class of 2013, this is the final newsletter you'll receive.** Thanks for putting up with them (and me, too!) Naturally, you can always access the current newsletter on the SPS website if you get nostalgic or need a newsletter "fix"!

As usual, I'll close with a paraphrase of one of my favorite NPR radio shows (which I'm listening to right now as I write this): well, it's happened again – you've squandered perfectly good time reading my ramblings! Thanks for having been part of the 2012-13 edition of Saint Paul's – the beginning of our second century of existence. If the next 102 years go as well as this past year, Saint Paul's will have had an incredible second century of existence.
