The Saint Paul's Mu Alpha Theta travelled to Baton Rouge to compete at the state Mu Alpha Theta Convention, in which 753 students from 31 different schools competed. The Wolves competing were Luke Avenel, Patrick Baldone, Jack Cheng, Patrick Connolly, John Cresson, Ethan Desforges, Josh Devier, Yehia Elkersh, Hanzala Hussain, Ruston Keller, Ryan Meraux, Alex Nguyen, Andrew Norlin, Alex Oliveri, Nick Oubre, Alex Seese, and Daniel Wieseneck.

Placing on area tests were Meraux (third place in calculus), Avenel (fourth place in calculus), Connolly (fourth place in statistics), Desforges (fifth place in statistics), Hussain (ninth place in equations and inequalities), Nguyen (twelfth place in pre-calculus), and Elkersh (thirteenth place in trigonometry).

A team of Baldone, Devier, Wieseneck, Hussain and Norlin placed seventh on the algebra two/geometry inner school test; and a team of Baldone, Devier, Hussain, and Norlin placed seventh in the algebra two/geometry ciphering competition. A team of Avenel, Meraux, Connolly, and Desforges placed fifth in the calculus ciphering competition.

Additionally, Cresson completed his second term as State Governor for District III, and Keller was elected to replace the graduating Cresson next year.


Soccer Champions – 1st in Nation – Again !!

Saint Paul's Varsity Soccer Team was honored by the Army National Guard with the national ranking trophy in a special assembly in the Gene Bennett Sports Complex. The honor is part of the MaxPreps Tour of Champions which is in its fifth year of recognizing soccer. Saint Paul's is one of only ten teams to receive this honor. The Wolves were ranked Number 1 in the nation for a second year by Max Preps, which rates over 10,000 high school teams. The Wolves completed their season with a 27-1-3 record, defeating Acadiana on February 27th to win the third consecutive state title. The team shutout every team in the playoffs for the state title. Teams recognized for this honor, not only demonstrate excellent talent on the field, but also demonstrate dedication, leadership, and teamwork, qualities that are not only beneficial in soccer but also in life.

Saint Paul's Renaissance Program

On Wednesday, April 20, the class of 2016 participated in Life Skills Day, which was set up by the Development Office, and held in the Briggs Assembly Center. Danielle Lavie, chair of the Renaissance Board, which supports a number of worthy causes at school including: continuing education for the faculty, etiquette training for pre-freshmen, and support for a number of student clubs and activities such the Key Club, ACT 30+ Club, Lasallian Youth Leaders, Wolves on Wheels, Habitat for Humanity, Air Force Junior ROTC, and Mu Alpha Theta. At a recent President's Assembly, two seniors were recognized. John Cresson and Luke Avenel attended the Youth and Government Event held in Baton Rouge, Louisiana and sponsored House Bill 322 which passed and was enacted into law by the youth government group. The bill was a proposal to Subsidize Master's Degrees for Teachers in Louisiana, as a way to improve the quality of education in Louisiana. 
