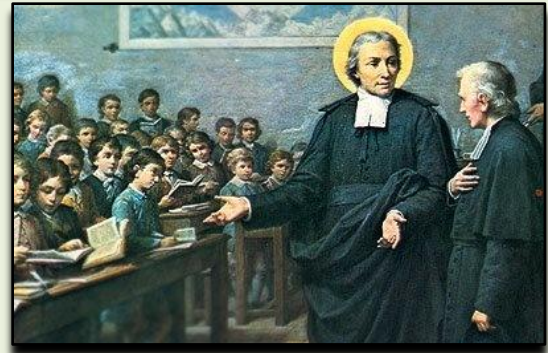

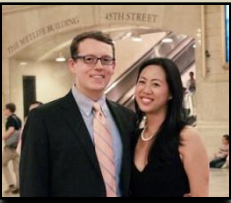

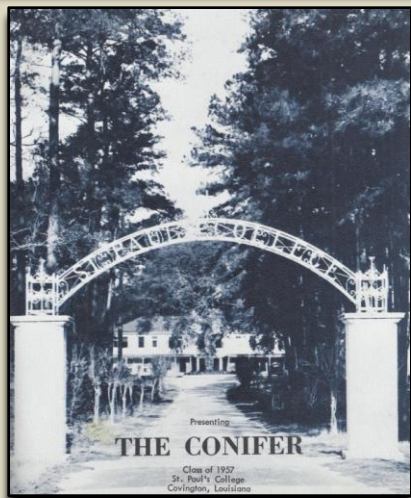
Joseph "Tres" Stoltz '02 - Tres was awarded his Ph.D in History from Texas Christian University in December.

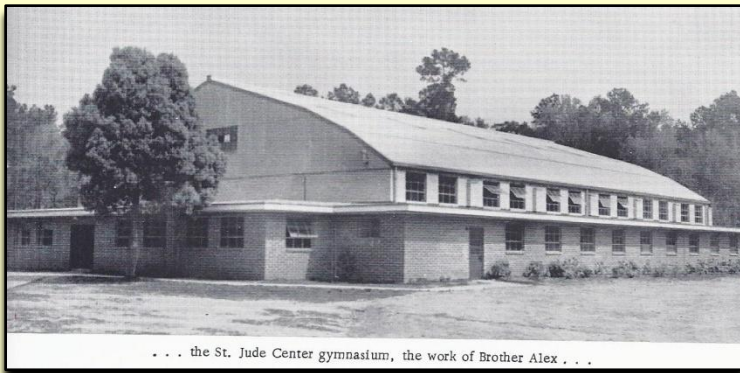

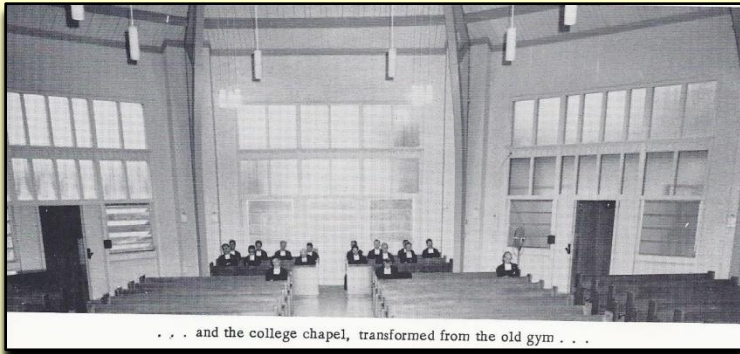

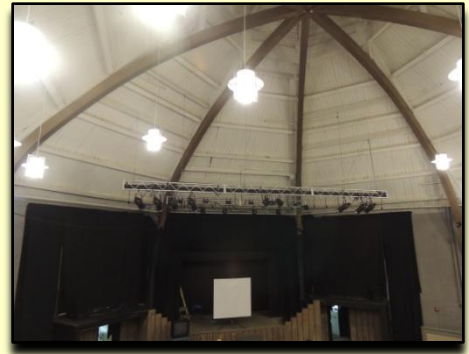

School News



In the weeks leading up to the Thanksgiving Holidays, our teachers and staff constantly reminded the students to keep in mind one of the Lasallian Core Principles: concern for the poor. Day by day, the Saint Paul's community searches for ways it could help the less fortunate in an area that has given it so much.

The Covington Food Bank has recently faced very difficult times. A representative of the food bank spoke at an all school service assembly during October and asked for our help in feeding families of Washington and St. Tammany Parishes. The Student Council answered. From November 4 to November 19, Student Body Representatives persistently encouraged students to bring in as many canned food items as possible to assist the food bank. Our turnout did not disappoint. In the morning of the last day of the food drive, thousands of canned food items covered the green and brown picnic tables underneath the Wolf Dome. Students organized the area into sections: beans, fruits, soups, sauces, cereals, personal care items and more. Separating and boxing these goods took up most of the first two class periods for the thirty or so volunteers who decided to help. Before lunch, boxes and crates were loaded onto flatbed trucks and shipped to the Covington Food Bank. After every last grain of rice and ounce of jiffy mix were counted, Saint Paul's contribution to the Food Bank totaled in at 10 tons shattering its previous record of 8.7 tons. Christmas Luminaries

The Saint Paul's community received a lesson about waiting, the meaning of Advent, when the annual Luminaries lighting celebration was cancelled on Sunday, December 8, and moved to Thursday, December 12. If you stopped by our forty acre campus on that Thursday evening, you would have seen it decorated with hundreds of white paper bags and flickering candles. The Student Council organized the Luminaries throughout the campus. The



Council assembled directly after school let out at three o'clock that afternoon to meticulously fill each paper bag with cups of sand. The Student Council members, with the bags, circled the pond, outlined the paths and LaSalle Drive, and spelled the Spanish word "Gracia," which means "Grace," in the home stands of the football field. They chose the word for the following reasons: Pope Francis has designated 2014 as a "Year of Grace"; Christmas is a time for grace; and December 12 was the feast of Our Lady of Guadeloupe, and so the Council chose the Spanish form of the word instead of the English.

The tradition of the Luminaries came to us from Santa Fe. The Christian Brothers run Saint Michael's High School in Santa Fe and for many years owned and ran the College of Santa Fe. As Brothers moved from Santa Fe to Covington, they brought the tradition of the Luminaries with them. In Santa Fe, the Luminaries were used to light the way to Midnight Mass and, in a more symbolic way, to light the way for the coming of Jesus. For many years at Saint Paul's, this celebration was held for the resident students on the last night of their fall semester before returning home for the Christmas holidays. The Luminaries carried the symbolic meaning of lighting the way Jesus, but also signaled a break from school work. The events which includes Christmas Carols in Founder's Circle and a prayer service was a wonderful send off for those students traveling miles home, and those who lived in town.

So we strive to carry on this tradition. Once everything was in place, at six o'clock candles were lit in the hundreds of paper bags and the campus was ablaze with Christmas joy. Students, families, and neighboring residents strolled through this "light show" while the Liturgical Band caroled harmoniously under the oak tree in Founder's Circle. In the cafeteria, volunteers served hot chocolate and brief refreshments.

"It was truly a beautiful sight," said senior Michael Stewart who sang carols with the Liturgical Band along with Thomas Ruli, Thomas Huval, Bryan Lividuas, Josh Farr, Ross Allbrighton, Michael Brown, Casey Fitzmaurice, and Eric Boudet. "To see the campus aglow with the warming light of Christ definitely put me in the Christmas Spirit."

At seven, everyone gathered in the Our Lady of Peace Chapel for a prayer service led by senior and Vice President of the Lasallian Youth Leaders Michael Burke, serving as Master of Ceremonies. Senior and Student Body President David Conroy gave an eloquent reflection on how, with the word "Gracia" in our hearts, we need to remain grateful and compassionate during this Advent season. Coastal Louisiana

*Restoring and Protecting a
Sustainable Coastal Louisiana*



On Thursday December 5th, Saint Paul's School's Environmental Science Class and Club under the instruction of Mark Richards worked with St. Tammany Parish's Environmental Engineering Department and the Coalition to Restore Coastal Louisiana (CRCL) on an intensive swamp - reforestation project in Lacombe. The group planted over 500 cypress trees in a detention pond north of Lacombe. The aggressive planting is a parish wide initiative to mitigate and filter storm-water runoff to improve water quality of the Bayou Lacombe watershed. Future plans will be to assist the parish in monitoring the growth of the trees, and to conduct water quality assessments.
