School News



Saint Paul's School is a school rooted deeply in tradition and history that has stretched back for over a hundred years. One of the most festive times of the year is when these traditions truly come alive all around campus and in the community around us. The Christmas season highlights the best of Saint Paul with various yearly holiday traditions including luminaries, warm hearts, and Adopt-A-Family all facilitated and organized by students.

Luminaries act as a real reminder of the holiday season for the Saint Paul's community as well as the entire community with its trademark paper lanterns adorning every available surface on campus. This tradition has been a fixture on campus for more than forty years after the then Key Club instituted the practice. At the time, it was only customary to light paper lanterns on the main drive that runs through campus. After multiple expansions and incarnations, the event is now characterized by the bags of candles that light from the arched entrance of campus to the end of Founders' Circle, through the walkways of campus, and around the pond. Each bag has a prayer intention on the bottom, written by students during a Pack Time session. Pack Time sessions are held throughout the year as a way for students of different grade levels to interact and bond with team-building activities.


Other favorite features of Luminaries include the word spelled out in the candle-filled bags in the stands of Hunter Stadium. Past words have included Peace, Logos, and Gracia. This practice began roughly two years after the first celebration of Luminaries. The year's word, however, has remained shrouded in mystery, as it does every year until illuminated for the festival. Christmas caroling has long been a fixture of the festivities and is followed by a Student Council Executive Board and Liturgical Band member led a prayer service in Our Lady of Peace Chapel. Following the prayer service, the Mother's Club will serve refreshments in the cafeteria, with entertainment by the St. Paul's Jazz Band.

Adopt-A-Family is another popular holiday tradition that fulfills the service aspect of the Saint Paul's mission. The program began over twenty years ago and has been a staple ever since. Usually, each grade adopts around two to three families and raises money to help provide toys, necessities, and other gifts for the whole family. The students would then shop for the presents, wrap the presents, and deliver the gifts all within their grade. This year, however, the task of fundraising, shopping, wrapping, and giving away the gifts falls to each particular religion class. In a new push by campus minister Jeff Ramon in conjunction with Adopt-A-Family head Kevin Moore, each religion class is now responsible for one specific child from the local area. Requests for gifts range from clothes to toys to school supplies for the coming calendar year. By adopting this new approach, Saint Paul's can create a positive Christmas experience for roughly three times as many in need children as in the previous system from years past.

Alex Oliveri is a National Merit Scholarship Semifinalist, and Thomas Carriere, Yehia Elkersh, and Lloyd Guillot were named as Commended Scholars. The National Merit Scholarship Program recognizes students for their exceptional academic promise, and their outstanding performance on the qualifying test. Commended scholars are in the top five percent of the more than 1.6 million students who entered the competition, and semifinalists are among the top one half of one percent of the of those students who took the 2015 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test.

Thanksgiving Food Drive

Concern for the Poor & Social Justice

Before the Saint Paul's student body retired from classes for the Thanksgiving holiday, the Student Council held a school-wide Thanksgiving Food Drive for the nearly 25th year is the school's history. The tradition has been a sharp point of pride in the student body for the many tons of food procured every year and the recognition as the largest single group provider for the Covington Food Bank for several consecutive years.

The drive usually produces several thousand pounds of food, but this year the Food Bank expressed a particular need for cereal, dry beans, rice, and macaroni and cheese. This need was overwhelmingly met with over 13,257 pounds (6.6 tons) of food all donated by students through a less than two-week drive. This quantity of food along with donations from the spring Stuff the Bus drive is estimated to help feed over 500 families.

Another interesting distinction of the drive is the total student immersion involved with the process. Students take care of every aspect of the drive to assist the Covington Food Bank in the strenuous effort and help speed up the laborious process. To begin students transport all the collected food from the classrooms where students delivered to a centralized location on campus to help sort and itemize the donations. Following Student Council's accurate inventory and packaging, the donated goods are then loaded onto student volunteers' trucks for delivery to the food bank. Once the student delivery volunteers arrive, they unload the various trucks and begin to help sort and store all the food for the coming weeks and months. Additionally, students also extend their service to the food bank by keeping up a steady flow of volunteer hours to help distribute the food they provided to the local community.

The Thanksgiving drive is only one of the two major food drives that Saint Paul's participates in every single year. In addition to the Thanksgiving Food Drive, the school is also involved in the Stuff the Bus Food Drive organized between the various Catholic elementary, middle, and high schools in the area. The goal of the drive is to fill a conventional school bus to the brim with canned goods and other nonperishable food items. Saint Paul's has often been recognized as the largest provider of food for the drive among its other contemporaries such as Our Lady of the Lake, St. Peter's, St. Scholastic Academy, Archbishop Hannan, and Mary Queen of Peace. Last spring, the effort among all the schools brought in 15, 790 pounds, which bested 2015's 12,940 pounds by thirty percent.

This school-wide spirit of giving and service stems from a strong commitment to one of the school's Lasallian five core principles, Concern for the Poor and Social Justice. This principle supports every community service project at Saint Paul's as well as the private community work of the individual students. The Thanksgiving Food Drive in addition to the Stuff the Bus Drive always remains one of the most visible signs of this faith to service and community strength.

The Wolves completed the season with nine swimmers that qualified for the state meet and a third place finish.
