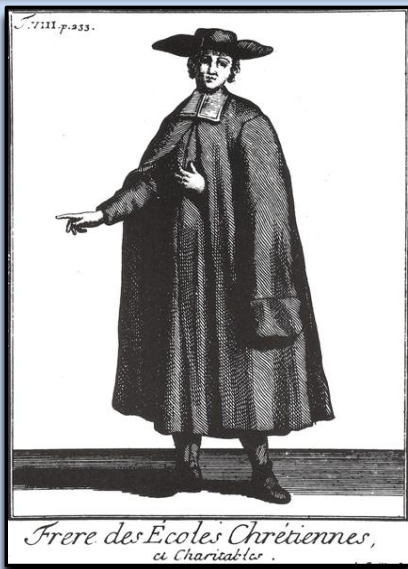
In what ways do you continue to be involved with Saint Paul's?

In the early 1900's, The Brothers of the Christian Schools (The Christian Brothers) were exiled from France due to the government's persecution of the Catholic Church. The brothers travelled to Mexico where they began schools to teach the young. In 1914, during the Mexican revolution, the brothers were ousted by the Constitutionalist Army organized by Venustiano Carranza.

The Brothers' immigration from Mexico was far from smooth. They seemed to take up residency wherever they could while speaking little English. They received an offer from the Benedictines to run a secondary school in Covington, LA, called Saint Paul's College. In 1918, the Brothers entered into a lease-to-own contract with the Benedictines for \$2,500 per year for 15 years. Nineteen Brothers formed the original community of Brothers.

Over the next few months, we will highlight the founding Brothers. Thanks to Br. Jerry Vincent, FSC, and Mr. Robert Simpson for their help with the historical information.



Brother Adelbert Marie (Sylvain Duret) - Brother was born in Paris in 1888, made his novitiate in Belgium in 1905, and was sent to Mexico in 1909. After fleeing the country in 1914 with his confrères during the Carranza Revolution, he was assigned to the District of New York. On August 22, 1918 he arrived at Covington, Louisiana, to be in the founding community of Brothers who took over the operation of Saint Paul's College. He was the third director/principal of Saint Paul's, 1926-1929. He was responsible for many improvements on the Campus. He remodeled the Infirmary Building and examined other activities on Campus and was the one who shortened the graduation ceremony.



Brother Adolphe Basile (Emile Cottet)- He was born on July 1, 1876, in Colombey-Muraz, Switzerland. He received the Brother's garb on December 15, 1899, at age 23 in the novitiate in Paris. After several years in France and having earned a superior teaching certificate in 1903, he volunteered to go to Mexico. Departing from Barcelona, they arrived in Puebla in December and opened two schools in January, 1907. He was assigned to several different schools in Mexico and arrived in Querétaro in 1913. He was there in the summer of 1914 when the Carranza revolutionaries overran the city and forced all foreign priests and religious out of the country. He was among some 65 of the 175 French brothers in Mexico who accepted the offer to go to the United States. After being assigned to the District of New York, he moved to Santa Fe, New Mexico, in 1916, and then in the first community at St. Paul's College (high school) in Covington, Louisiana, in 1918.





Brother Agbert (Jean-Pierre Rettel) - Brother Agbert was born on February 14, 1883, in Dalheim in the Grand Duchy of Luxemburg, and entered the junior novitiate at Buzenval, near Paris, France, on August 1, 1898, where his first challenge was to master his second language, French. He received the Brother's garb in the novitiate in Paris on October 22, 1899. He was given three instead of two years in the scholasticate and received his teaching license in 1903. The school to which he was assigned, St. Nicolas in Buzenval, was closed in 1904 as a result of the anti-religious laws of that year. After a few more years in France, he went on to Mexico and escaped to El Paso, TX, during the Carranza Revolution.

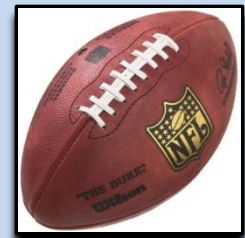

Saint Paul's state champion senior soccer players thanked their dedicated and generous parents for all the support during the past soccer seasons at Senior Night in Hunter Stadium before the last regular season game. Players presented their moms with the traditional rose and dads with a soccer cap. Saint Paul's Wrestling Wolves have taken the spotlight in the final portion of the 2017-18 season. The team captured their 20th and 10th consecutive Parish and District Championships, respectively. The Wolves scored 210 points in the multi-entry individual style tournament that took place at Archbishop Hannan High School. Saint Paul's took titles in seven of the fourteen weight classes. Saint Paul's champions included Carter Duet, Connor Oviedo, Peyton Ward, Brandon Stein, Ben Davidson, and Jake Arena.

The Wolves continued their season with a 56-15 defeat of De La Salle High School and a 70-10 defeat of Covington High School. The dual meet between Covington and Saint Paul's also served as "Senior Night" for the Wrestling Wolves. In gratitude for all the weekends spent in gymnasiums across the regions, Jake Arena, Nathan Bagnell, Cole Houser, Grant Hughes, and Jared Thieler, presented their moms with the traditional rose and their dads a well deserved mug.

Coach Craig Ketelsen was honored for his 350th win in his thirty-year career at Saint Paul's. Many former wrestlers and parents attended the dual meet to congratulate coach on this outstanding occasion. In addition to this accomplishment, Ketelsen was named the 2017-18 Louisiana Coach of the Year for Wrestling by the National Federation of the State High School Association.

After thirty successful years Coach Craig Ketelsen will retire as head wrestling coach of Saint Paul's School. Ketelsen amassed 350 wins, twenty parish titles, ten district titles, 2 team state championships and coached twenty-four individual state champions during his career. He was named Wrestling Coach of the Year by the Louisiana Coaches Association for 2017-18. He will continue in his position as Athletic Director at Saint Paul's and remain the wrestling representative for the LHSCA.

Coach Matt Pinero will replace Ketelsen as Head Varsity, Junior Varsity, and freshmen coach. Matt is a 2008 graduate from Rummel High School where he wrestled and served as team captain. He coached at Rummel from 2008 until 2014 when he moved to Saint Paul's. Matt currently serves as the Louisiana USA Wrestling membership director and director of events, as well as a coach for Team Louisiana (USA Wrestling), and has coached several All-Americans in that program. Matt has a Bachelor's Degree in English from the University of New Orleans and currently teaches pre-freshman English at Saint Paul's. "I'm extremely grateful for the opportunity to lead the Saint Paul's wrestling team. Over the last thirty years Coach Craig Ketelsen has molded Saint Paul's into one of the premiere programs in the state. I am honored that he and the administration have entrusted me with the future of the program." Ketelsen stated, "Matt has done a great job as an assistant, and the time is right for him to take over leadership of the entire program. I am looking forward to helping him continue and improve on our success."

Assistant Coach Keren Davis will be retiring from the Varsity Staff. The amount of work and dedication she contributed by using her organizational, marketing, communication and fund-raising skills in addition to her experience as a two time National Champion in a combat sport have been essential for our team to be able to focus and compete. 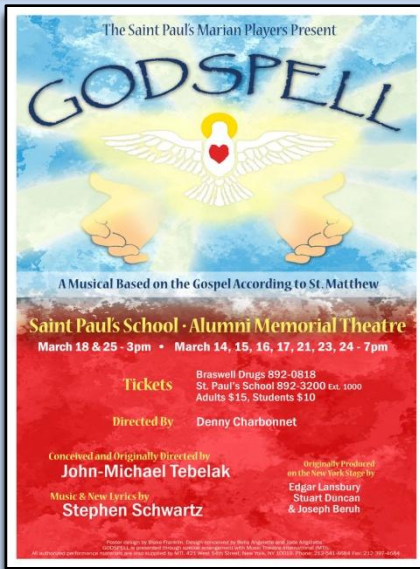
Indoor Track
