Thanks to our sponsors, the Jumbotron sign has arrived and been installed on Saint Paul's campus. The sign should be operational for the start of the football season.



















School News

The GTT program provides a strong foundation for further STEM learning in high school and beyond, challenging students to solve real-world problems like cleaning oil spills and designing sustainable housing solutions. This will be the science class for the pre-freshmen. Mr. Mark Richard and Mrs. Julie Beck are being trained this summer to teach the program, robots and computers are being ordered, and two classrooms are being specially furnished to offer our pre-freshmen this exciting and innovative science class.
- Computer Science and Software Engineering an upper division elective. Here's the description: CSE implements the College Board's 2013 CS Principles framework. Using Python® as a primary tool and incorporating multiple platforms and languages for computation, this course aims to develop computational thinking, generate excitement about career paths that utilize computing, and introduce professional tools that foster creativity and collaboration. CSE helps students develop programming expertise and explore the workings of the Internet. Projects and problems include app development, visualization of data, cybersecurity, robotics, and simulation.

Andrew traveled to New York for master classes, instruction and the performance at the world renowned concert venue.

The *Honors Performance Series* at Carnegie Hall challenges elite students to perform at their very best. Students rehearse and perform under master conductors and have the opportunity to perform before invited representatives from collegiate and professional music programs. Though much of the students' time is focused on performance preparation, the

week also allows students to experience the best of the sights and the performance arts in New York City.

Andrew's career includes parts in six New Orleans Operas at The Mahalia Jackson Theatre, a soloist on WWL TV Morning Show, Voodoo and Zephyrs games, and appearances in several movies, commercials, and television episodes.

Saint Paul's rising senior, Beau Briggs, son of Travis and Erika Briggs of Madisonville, was selected as one of the fourteen national finalists for the United States Golf Association-American Junior Golf Association President's Leadership Award. Beau finished seventh in the Division I state finals in Shreveport this past season as a member of the Saint Paul's Team, that place second in the Division I tournament in May. The award is given to golfers who demonstrate leadership, character, and community service through their involvement with the Leadership Links program. Saint Paul's rising senior, Burke Irwin, son of James and Stephanie Irwin of Covington, has been selected to attend the university of Notre Dame's Summer Life Science Scholars Program. The program will take place in the state-of-the-art facility, the Jordan Hall of Science, on campus, with students engaged in two major areas of study: Ecology and Environmental Science and the Molecular Genetics of Disease. Both content areas will foster collaborative problem solving skills and experiential understanding of science by actively involving students in the design, implementation, and analysis of experiments in molecular biology (i.e. cancer biology and molecular genetics) and environmental science (i.e. stream environmental assessment/restoration and lake ecosystem management). Students will improve proficiency and confidence under laboratory conditions and field situations, and directly engage in accurate reading of scholarly journal articles; the structure/function of scientific research papers, posters and seminar presentations and the use of bio-statistical analysis. The students will investigate these topics using a variety of formats, including interactive lectures, laboratory work, collaborative learning, computer and video material, group discussions, and field trips.


