#### Join Brother Ray for Dinner!


We're trying something new... so let's make it a great success!

# School News



Picture the inside of the Briggs Assembly Center—a shining expanse of recently renovated space, stretching out over thousands of square feet in open readiness for the next Saint Paul's dance, Mass, assembly, or special event. There's enough room inside for any school function—the building can comfortably seat around twelve hundred people—and each Saint Paul's student will use it countless times between Pre-Freshman Orientation and Graduation Mass.

Now picture this: an enormous table, piled unbelievably high with all manner of delicious food, stretching almost from wall to wall of the massive room. The ornate feast covers an enormous portion of the Briggs Center's space, the rest of which is filled with hungry students—who queue around still more heaping tables of food. Pasta, seafood, salads, sides, and sweets are decked out in a dizzying display, and the breathtaking view of the elaborate array is further complemented by the food's incredible aroma. There's more edible material here than most will ever see in one place—and it all looks utterly delectable. The spectacle is enough to make anyone want to praise the heavens.

Actually, that's the point. The food is part of the Saint Joseph's Altar, an Italian tradition that dates back to the Middle Ages, when the faithful people of Sicily honored Joseph for delivering them from the ravages of famine. The tradition later made its way into New Orleans and, more recently, Saint Paul's School. The altar has appeared on campus during each of the last sixteen years, usually preceding Saint Joseph's feast day on March 19<sup>th</sup>, and is probably the school's most flavorful tradition.

The Altar is brought to Saint Paul's by Doctor Ann Kay Logarbo, mother of Saint Paul's graduates Patrick Logarbo '13, Nick Logarbo '09, and Brian Logarbo '08. She promised Saint Joseph sixteen years ago that she would offer the Altar in his honor—just like the Sicilians of old—if he would deliver a family member from a serious illness. Saint Joseph delivered. Ever since that prompt recovery, Logarbo has prepared the altar with assistance from the Mothers' Club and student volunteers.

As tradition dictates, the food is blessed before being served; in addition, every uneaten scrap must be buried in the ground after the feast. But the students and faculty of Saint Paul's do their best to ensure that no delicacy goes undevoured. "This food is absolutely incredible," raves senior Burke Irwin through a mouthful of cannoli. "If only Saint Joseph had more than one feast day per year."

He voices the thoughts of the entire school. Saint Paul's is deeply grateful for Doctor Logarbo's continuing efforts to host the Altar, year after incredible year.

#### Student of the Year

### Special Assembly

Jason Evert strolled onto the Briggs Assembly Center stage, prepared to deliver an hour-long speech before the assembled student bodies of Saint Paul's School and Saint Scholastica Academy.

The subject: chastity.

There may be no task more daunting or difficult than the one Evert was about to attempt. Delivering a sixty-minute testimony about sexual conduct before 1,500 teenagers, and delivering it effectively, is, without a doubt, next door to impossible. Today's high schoolers are a tough crowd when it comes to the subject of sex; they're well-accustomed to hearing series after monotonous series of warnings and statistics, even as society pressures them to live like the Kardashians and Jersey Shore. Talks can be downright painful to sit through, and often fail to deliver a convincing message.

Evert took the stage. The two high schools he faced, assembled *en masse* during school hours for the first time in recent memory, were braced for a sex talk of potentially immense awkwardness.

These fears were never confirmed. Within minutes, Evert had shattered the tension in the air; by the end of the hour, he had shattered everyone's expectations as well.

"Jason did an excellent job of differentiating himself from other speakers in his genre from the very beginning," says senior Casey Fitzmaurice, citing Jason's entertaining and down-to-earth brand of humor as a cause. "He was hilarious, and much less 'holier than thou' than many other speakers. He definitely spoke on a difficult topic, but he did so in a way that inspired a huge number of the listeners in the room."

Listeners also benefitted from the relatable manner in which he presented his thoughts. "Jason talked about everything in a way that was distinctly non-threatening," says SSA student Claire Dubreuil, who visited Saint Paul's campus to hear the talk. "I didn't feel like I was being intimidated at all, even though he was discussing some really serious stuff."

"He made so many good points—not necessarily about consequences, but about the benefits of waiting until marriage," SSA senior Allyson Lacoste chimes in. "And he had specific points that were beneficial to boys or girls individually, but everyone was able to hear both sides."

Evert is no stranger to his craft. Over the last decade or so, he has spoken to over a million high school and college students, authored more than ten books, and founded a ministry called Chastity Project—a worldwide coalition of young leaders who promote purity—that he now runs with his wife. He distributed free copies of his literature after the talk—and concluded by taking an Instagram screenshot (@jasonevert) to preserve the moment.

#### First in the Nation!





#### Life Skills for Seniors



Saint Paul's Renaissance Program

As graduation draws near for the seniors of Saint Paul's School, excitement and anticipation build in equal measure. Even with college on the horizon, the thought of leaving Saint Paul's to venture out into the real world is daunting as well as thrilling.

Saint Paul's Renaissance Board aims to ease graduates' transitions into post-high school life. Funded mostly by the annual Celebrity Waiters' Dinner, the Board facilitates numerous programs—such as Honor Roll Breakfast, Wolves on Wheels, and Mu Alpha Theta—that enrich the Saint Paul's experience for every student. One event, however, is reserved only for those on the verge of graduation.

On Wednesday, March 25, all 180 members of the Class of 2015 were exempt from their curricular obligations (this is key) and invited to experience Life Skills Day. From 8 A.M. to 2:30 P.M, the seniors rotated between six informative and engaging speakers who advised them on different aspects of life as an independent high school graduate.

The first station, Credit and Identity Theft, was piloted by Mr. Eric Dunavant President of Dunavant Wealth Strategies in Mandeville. He informed his groups about the ins and outs of financial credit, explained how to protect against identity theft, and added anecdotal advice on general money management.

The second station, titled "Awareness," aimed to familiarize the seniors with the legal implications of their actions. During the morning hours, tenured attorney and Saint Paul's Law Studies instructor Sonny Garcia gave a comprehensive rundown of the numerous laws and statutes by which students would be bound upon leaving the household. Covington police chief Tim Lentz took the afternoon shift, adopting a dynamic and interactive approach to his teaching. "This station may have been the most informative," senior Declan Moennich pointed out. "I'd honestly never heard half that stuff before. But I'm glad he told us."

The third station dealt with credit balancing and spending advice for the real world. The presenter, Brad Schroder, is a Vice-President of Capital One Bank. His unique combination of humor and meaningful advice held the rapt attention of his audience as he detailed some of his more comical life experiences and lessons learned. "He kept us laughing the whole time," Matt Dysart reflects. "At the end of his session, though, I really came away with a better understanding of my financial obligations."

The fourth station was headed by Mrs. Pam Prescott, who teaches a class on leadership and specializes in college success advising. She provided valuable insight into the lives of college students and gave recommendations supported by a wealth of experience in education. "Her energetic teaching style confirmed that all students, attentive and inattentive, would be getting the full experience of her presentation," remarks David Von Bodungen.

An alumni panel of recent Saint Paul's graduates was yet another beneficial part of the day. Alex Gondolfi '14, Casey Spinelli '13, Gabe Emerson '12, and Mickey Johnson '11 all returned to campus and offered sincere advice about the their transitions into the college world. Gondolphi now attends Southeastern Louisiana University; Spinelli is a kicker for Tulane's football team; Emerson, a Saint Paul's valedictorian, now powerlifts at LSU while majoring in Computational Mathematics; Johnson, a football star who signed to LSU's defensive line, is also a major in Mass Communication.

Another special guest, WolfNation sportscaster Preston Hammonds, facilitated the Life Skills Day proceedings. The announcer introduced each presenter and called time throughout the day's rotations. The afternoon was punctuated by a delicious lunch catered by Mugshot's Grill, and a presentation by special guest Eric Cedor '97 continuing Catholic life in the real world.

#### AFJROTC Academic Bowl

Saint Paul's School Air Force Junior ROTC Academic Quiz Bowl Team has been selected to compete in The 2015 Air Force JROTC Academic Quiz Bowl Championship in Washington D.C. on the campus of The Catholic University of America in June. The event is sponsored by the Air Force JROTC and is conducted by the College Options Foundation. The first round of competition included 220 schools worldwide. Saint Paul's advanced to compete in the second round with 110 schools. #### Future Engineers




