Do you have any other family members currently attending or who have attended Saint Paul's?

My two sons are currently at St. Paul's and are third generation students. Thomas is a freshman, and Daniel is a pre-freshman. My nephew, Jack Grace, is in 10th grade, and my nephews Hunter '11 and Grant Ward '14 are alumni as well as my father, Gordon, who graduated in 1954.

Who was your favorite or most impactful teacher?

I had so many dedicated and devoted teachers that it's difficult to name just one, but I still remember Mr. John Morvant's Louisiana History class, Brother Tim Coldwell's World History class and Brother Alfred's Physics class. These three teachers really impressed me, and I still remember lessons learned from all of them.

What advice would you give to current students or young alumni?

Work hard, really hard. Give it your best and take advantage of the opportunity you are blessed with as a St. Paul's student. Be aware and recognize the people in your life, Brothers, faculty, and parents that make sacrifices for you to be a student or alumnus of St. Paul's.

Why do you continue to support the Saint Paul's mission?

I believe in the Lasallian mission and the 5 core Principles, and it's also a way for me to say "Thank You."

Why would you encourage young men to consider attending Saint Paul's?

When asked this question, I always respond how truly blessed we are to have St. Paul's here in St. Tammany Parish with dedicated Lasallian Brothers and faculty. I love the strong academics. Many people comment about how St. Paul's is so competitive in athletics, but it's equally competitive academically. The presence of the Lasallian Brothers on campus and learning about the Lasallian Five Core Principles, especially faith in the presence of God, would be reason enough for me to encourage young men to attend, but I must say the campus is very impressive, too.

Is there anything you would do differently with your Saint Paul's experience if given the opportunity to go back in time?

I was heavily involved in our family business while a student at St. Paul's, but I would've loved being more involved with extracurricular activities if I would've had the time.

The Founding Brothers (cont).



Brother Alain Félix (René Tigréat) - was born on October 30, 1883, in Plounéventer in the French department of Finistère, entered the novitiate in Paris at age 17 in September, 1900, and received the brother's garb there on December 18. He left for Mexico in November, 1908, and was assigned to a community of four in the small town of Acatzingo, near Puebla, where the brothers taught the poorest of the poor. When they had to leave in 1914 on account of the Carranza Revolution, he was sent to the District of San Francisco, California. In 1918 he was in the first community of brothers at St. Paul's College (high school) in Covington, Louisiana. Throughout the years, he was sent to several schools in Louisiana, Texas and Colorado. He returned to Saint Paul's at age 73 and passed away in 1973.



Brother Alton (Pierre Boncompain) - was born on May 3, 1872, in Yssingaux in the French department of Haute Loire and attended the brothers' school there. He entered the junior novitiate in Paris in November 1888 at the age of 16. In the St. Joseph scholasticate in Paris he fulfilled the requirements for the elementary teaching license and was assigned to St. Nicolas d'Igny school in Paris in 1891 and taught there 15 years. The French antireligious laws of 1904 forced the closure of the school in 1906, and Brother Alton, along with most of the brothers of his community, chose to leave his native land to continue his religious life and educational mission overseas. In 1916, Alton scouted the Southwest and Louisiana for places where the brothers might open schools. He found two in Louisiana and in 1918 negotiated the contracts for schools in Covington and New Iberia. He was a member of the first community at St. Paul's College (high school) in Covington.



Brother Amateur Victor (Victor Amblard) - was born in Aurouzet in the French department of La Lozère on May 14, 1877, entered the junior novitiate in Paris on January 17, 1893, and received the brother's garb in the novitiate there on October 1 the same year. He taught in St. Nicolas orphanage in Paris, 1896-1909. When the school was closed by the French anti-religious laws of 1904, he joined many of his confrères in taking a course in Spanish in Caluire, near Lyon, in the fall of 1909 and then was sent to Mexico in 1910. While he was teaching in a school in Zacatecas, Mexico in June 1914, the Carranza revolutionaries attacked the city and shot two brothers and the community chaplain to death. The surviving brothers escaped by railroad in a cattle car to the United States through El Paso, Texas. He was in the founding community at St. Paul's College (high school) in Covington, Louisiana, 1918-1923. He was in the community at De La Salle in Lafayette, Louisiana, 1924-1927, and after several moves was sent to the district's ranch in Bernalillo, New Mexico in 1930 where he died at the age of 61.

School News

On Monday, March 19th, Saint Paul's School celebrated Saint Joseph's Day with the New Orleans tradition of a Saint Joseph's Altar. Saint Joseph, the patron saint of the Christian Brothers, is special to the people of Sicily because he answered the prayers of the Sicilians during a famine. Once again, Dr. Ann Kay Logarbo, the Mother's Club, Vintage Moms, and students helped to create the altar in the Briggs Assembly Center.

St. Joseph altars, representing the Holy Trinity, are divided into three sections with a statue of Saint Joseph at the head. The devout place candles, figurines, flowers, medals and other items are placed around the altar creating a beautiful, lush and overflowing effect. Since the altars thank St. Joseph for relieving hunger, offerings of food are essential. Cookies, cakes and breads, are common decorations for altars. Fava beans or "lucky beans" are particularly associated with Saint Joseph because they sustained the Sicilians throughout famine.

Saint Paul's not only had the traditional cakes, cookies, breads and fava beans, but the diligent workers also provided the administration, faculty and student body with pasta, vegetables, fruit, cheese, and the fried catfish. Father Matthew Clark, chaplain of Saint Paul's, blessed the altar in keeping with the Catholic tradition. Once again food and faith were the order of the day. Although this wonderful tradition has taken place at Saint Paul's for many years, this is the first time the school celebration actually took place on the feast of Saint Joseph.

'GODSPELL' – Mrs. Charbonnet Announces her Retirement

Director Denny Charbonnet typically runs [productions of GODSPELL](#) within a five-year cycle (with one show every five years) so that every generation of Saint Paul's students has an opportunity to see it. However, this year's production is special in that it falls outside of that cycle.

"It is the right show at this time," Charbonnet said, noting how much meaning this production has held for both her and her daughter, Elise Angelette, who works with Charbonnet on costuming and choreography for the school productions. At the end of this school year, Mrs. Charbonnet will retire after 31 years. [See more in The Paper Wolf article.](#)

For several years, Charbonnet has been a soldier in Angelette's ongoing battle with breast cancer. "I had the sense that God was telling me that this was the show for this year, especially where I am in my home life with my family and with my daughter, it feels like the perfect healing show for right now," Charbonnet said. "The message is incredible; you can't beat it. We're dealing with scripture in a way that is fun, funny, and has a dynamite message, and the music is fantastic. With all of that put together, it's just the right show at the right time."

According to Charbonnet, GODSPELL has lasting effects on those involved in it. "It's a show that I love to work on and I love to watch," Charbonnet said. "I love to watch the cast work with it and realize what it's actually saying; it's a lightbulb moment when they realize what it actually means. If you've been in GODSPELL, you never see church readings the same way again because you hear them with the GODSPELL perspective. It brings them home, which I think is a true gift."

This year, auditions drew a crowd of almost 90 people. The full cast features 75 people, making it the largest ever for a Marian Players production of GODSPELL. Charbonnet was not surprised by the show's popularity. "People love it," Charbonnet said, "It's a show they can all relate to. The nature of the message, the nature of the music and I think really just the feel of the show – it's such a powerfully positive show that it brings out the best in people. In each cast, the individual brings something new to the roll and gives me a fresh perspective on the show. The cast this year are absolutely fantastic: really talented, really cooperative, great attitudes."

The starring role of Jesus will be played by Christian Butler, a two-year veteran of the Marian Players. "I'm really excited about playing Jesus," Butler said. "I really love the entire theater group, and it's great to be able to hand something down to them as a senior. I love all of the St. Paul's plays that I've done, but I think that this is probably my favorite."

Celebrity Dinner – A Personal Note from the Development Director



Thanks to all who participated in our annual Celebrity Dinner. It warms my heart to see the creativity and excitement of our guests with decorating, costuming, and contributing to our auction, Wolfbucks, and raffles. I wish we could give everyone awards for the evening!

Why do we hold this event? Celebrity Dinner funds our Renaissance Program – and with the proceeds, we sponsor extra-curricular activities for our students to expand their knowledge beyond what's taught in the classroom. Some examples of these are: Wolves on Wheels, VEX Robotics competition, FIRST Robotics, Mu Alpha Theta, State Literary

Rally fees and Honor Roll breakfasts. Renaissance contributes approximately \$20,000 for these events.

St John Baptist de La Salle inspired his Lasallian Partners to teach the “entire” student; not only academics, but to augment the teaching of their parents with lessons of proper etiquette for pre-freshmen and Life Skills for seniors. Renaissance funds these two activities contributing over \$7,000. Additionally, Renaissance sponsors students to attend the March for Life in Washington DC and the Lasallian Youth Summer Conference for a total of \$5,500.

Renaissance assists in expanding the knowledge of our instructors through continuing education. This year alone, we have slated over \$10,000 toward travel expenses, registration fees, and hotel accommodations for our teachers. Finally, in the teachings of St. La Salle, we are instructed to minister to those in need. Our Renaissance Program makes a large contribution to our Tuition Assistance program. With the rising cost of tuition, over 9% of our families have received some sort of assistance for this school year. We, in the Development Office, have no idea who this is, only Br. Ray knows. But we feel strongly in our mission to help those that may not have the opportunity to receive a Saint Paul's education otherwise.
