54.05, and finished his meet with a 1:49.30 clocking in the 200 individual medley. He swam the breaststroke leg of the 200 yard mixed medley relay that lowered the 18 and over record to 1:37.96. His efforts helped his team win the Men's and Combined team championships at the meet. Colin is a Mendoza School Graduate and is employed by KPMG in San Francisco. The United States Secretary of Education, Arne Duncan, announced the selection of Ryan Keller, son of Roger and Allyson Keller of Mandeville and a senior at Saint Paul's School is a 2015 U.S. Presidential Schoolar. Keller is one of 141 outstanding American high school seniors that have demonstrated outstanding

high school seniors that have demonstrated outstanding academic achievement, leadership, citizenship, service and contributions to the school and community. Keller will be honored in Washington, D.C. from June 21-23.

Duncan stated, "These scholars are poised to make their mark on our nation in every field imaginable. Their academic achievements reflect a sense of purpose that we should seek to instill in all students to prepare them for college,

careers, civic responsibilities, and the challenges of today's job market."

Presidential Scholars are selected annually based on their academic success, essays, school evaluations and transcripts, as well as evidence of community service, leadership, and a commitment to high ideals. Ryan was selected from the over 4,300 students invited to apply for this honor.

Keller, who will serve as one of the valedictorians of the Saint Paul's class of 2015, has a grade point average of 4.62, and is ranked first in the class. In addition to being an honors graduate, he is an Eagle Scout and an active member of Mu Alpha Theta, and the Habitat for Humanity Club. He serves as Eucharistic Minister at Our Lady of the Lake Church in Mandeville. In the fall of 2015, he will attend Baylor University in Texas as a scholarship student and major in biology and neuroscience. Ryan plans to enter medical school after college.

Each scholar selects the teacher that has been the most influential in his life, and Ryan has selected Mrs. Pam Cullen, Chair of the Math Department for this honor. She will receive a personal letter of congratulations from the Secretary of Education.

Honor Roll

It's official: Brother Ray has exhausted his supply of vocabulary words.

That's the word on the street, anyway; most are fairly convinced that Brother Ray's vocabulary is limitless. Nevertheless, it's hard to find another way to explain his absence from the Third Quarter Honor Roll Breakfasts last week.

Traditionally, the Breakfasts celebrate the highest-achieving students at Saint Paul's school. Thrice yearly, Students with A and A/B report cards are invited to attend with their parents and listen to Brother Ray's educational and uplifting speeches over a delicious morning meal courtesy of the Broken Egg Café.

This time, however, Brother chose to do something different. His place at the helm of each grade level's breakfast was filled by four senior students—Alex Harp, Burke Irwin, Connor Lu, and Jack Dubreuil—whom he had entrusted with the traditional task of presenting the highly anticipated quarterly vocabulary words to all those who had earned their places at the cafeteria tables that morning.

"It was pretty daunting at first," muses Dubreuil. "We all knew we had some big shoes to fill. But we were able to rise to the challenge, and the five days' worth of free Broken Egg biscuits were icing on the cake."

The seniors' chosen vocabulary words were fairly broad in scope. Harp spoke on the foreign phrases quid pro quo (meaning, in Latin, "bit for bit") and fait accompli (French for "an accomplished fact"); Irwin chose résumé and eulogy, delivering a moving reflection on the two and contrasting the worldly values of one with the transcendental importance of the other; Lu introduced attendees to the word bolide (an extremely bright meteor that often explodes in the atmosphere), injecting some humor into the presentation, and also discussed serendipity (fortunate happenstance); Dubreuil went with altitudinarian (a person with soaring ideals or lofty goals), while also discussing a longtime favorite word, defenestrate, which means "to throw an object, often a human being, out of a window".

"This whole thing was a pretty cool opportunity. I may never get another chance to show off my penchant for Latin phrases," reflects Harp, with than a little sentimentality. "I'm really gonna miss these Honor Roll Breakfasts."

Though the speakers were met with generally favorable reviews, the Brother Ray's wellspring of words has run dry remains a dubious one.

The single rose reminds us of the families and loved ones who keep faith awaiting their return. The red ribbon tied to the vase is reminiscent of the red ribbon worn on the lapel of thousands to demand a proper accounting for our missing. A slice of lemon on the bread plate reminds us of their bitter fate and the salt is symbolic of the family's tears as they wait. The glass is inverted to represent that they cannot toast with us at dinner and the chair is empty because they are not here.

Numerous national organizations were present to award cadets who met the specific criteria for the unique awards. Cadet Cray Pennison '15 was the Master of Ceremony, and the guest speaker was Colonel Evans C. Spiceland, retired from the United States Army after serving thirty years in uniform. 

Gatorade Player of the Year

In its 30th year of honoring the nation's best high school athletes, The Gatorade Company, in collaboration with USA TODAY High School Sports today announced Colin Hanley of St. Paul's School as its 2014-15 Gatorade Louisiana Boys Soccer Player of the Year. Hanley is the third Gatorade Louisiana Boys Soccer Player of the Year to be chosen from Saint Paul's School.

The award, which recognizes not only outstanding athletic excellence, but also high standards of academic achievement and exemplary character demonstrated on and off the field, distinguishes Hanley as Louisiana's best high school boys soccer player.

Now a finalist for the prestigious Gatorade National Boys Soccer Player of the Year award to be announced in late May, Hanley joins an elite alumni association of past state award winners in 12 sports.

The 6 foot, 175 pound senior goalkeeper recorded 21 shutouts this past season, leading the Wolves (31-0-3) to the Division 1 state championship. Hanley posted a 0.3 goals against average and surrendered none in Saint. Paul's five postseason games. A First Team All State selection, he was also named the Defensive MVP of Division 1.

Hanley, an honor graduate, has maintained a 4.16 GPA in the classroom while taking AP, and honors courses. He is member of the Mu Alpha Theta mathematics honor society, and he has volunteered on behalf of youth soccer programs. Hanley, a member of the All-State Academic Team, has signed a National Letter of Intent to play soccer on scholarship at Niagara University in New York State this fall. He is the son of John and Cheryl Hanley of Mandeville.

The Gatorade Player of the Year program annually recognizes one winner in the District of Columbia and each of the fifty states that sanction high school football, girls volleyball, boys and girls cross country, boys and girls basketball, boys and girls soccer, baseball, softball, and boys and girls track & field, and awards one National Player of the Year in each sport. The selection process is administered by the Gatorade high school sports leadership team in partnership with USA TODAY High School Sports which work with top sport specific experts and a media advisory board of accomplished, veteran prep sports journalists to determine the state winners in each sport.
