

#### Dia de los Muertos





On Friday, October 31st, Saint Paul's students celebrated the Dia de los Muertos. Literally translating to "Day of the Dead", *Dia de los Muertos* is an international commemoration of friends and loved ones who have passed on to the next life. The celebration is most prominent in Mexico, dating back to an Aztec celebration, but people in many other areas—such as Covington, Louisiana—have been known to take part as well.

This year's *Dia de los Muertos* service was held on Halloween, just two days before the Catholic observance of All Souls' Day. This is especially fitting as both *Dia de los Muertos* and All Souls' Day are compatible with the LaSallian Core Principles of Respect for All Persons, and Faith in the Presence of God. Facilitated by the Spanish Club and headed by moderator Liz Brett, the *Dia de los Muertos* prayer service took place in the Briggs Assembly Center and featured an altar decorated in traditional Mexican fashion, with the items of wind, water, fire and earth. The altar contained the famous skull cookies and bread, traditional Mexican foods of the day as well as, paper decorations representing wind, candles representing fire, flowers representing earth, and vases of water. Students, Faculty, and staff of Saint Paul's were invited to approach the altar, one by one, and leave a

photo or commemorative note of a deceased friend or relative. The congregation prayed and sang traditional Spanish songs. This was the Saint Pauls' fourth year celebrating the *Dia* in a beautiful and distinctive ceremony of reverence that is sure to remain for years to come. This celebration, although young in Saint Paul's years, is a special memory to all.

in Africa, came to Saint Paul's to visit and to talk to the faculty and the Poor and Social Justice student body about our brother school in Marsabit, Kenya and other schools in his district. The Lasallian Region of North America is paired with the Lwanga District trough the twinning program. Saint Paul's School in Kenya has been paired with our school since 1997, and our weekly mission collections are a vitally important contribution to the well being of that school. Every Wednesday morning the halls ring with the words "Our Father" and the television sets beam with photos of life at the other Saint Paul's. See YouTube video. The Lwanda District was established in 1997, the Provincialate is located in Nairobi, Kenya; and it is composed of five districts. 103 Christian Brothers and 1,071 teachers in the district meet the needs of 13,447 students enrolled in the schools, which include child rescue centers, agricultural, secondary, and higher education schools. Many of the students in these schools have financial needs, and some do not have families. Because of the profound change a Christian Brothers' education can make in the lives of these young men and women every school has a large number of applicants for the spaces available. In some schools water and electricity can be unreliable. The purpose of the twining program is to help the schools achieve financial self-sufficiency in the long term. As

Brother took the faculty and student body on an imaginary journey to Africa, the overwhelming sense of

belonging to the Christian Brothers' worldwide community became a reality, regardless of the differences in geography, and economics all of us are called to "Rise Up, O men of God." ## **Academics**





Last month, Saint Paul's Math Department hosted the 20<sup>th</sup> annual tournament in the Briggs Assembly Center. Fifteen schools participated with a total of 263 students working math problems. Schools were separated into two divisions, magnet and non-magnet schools. Saint Paul's completed with the magnet schools. Since we hosted the tournament, Saint Paul's competed in only the lower math levels including Pre-Algebra, Algebra I, Albegra II and Geometry. We did not participate in Advanced Math,

Trigonometry, or Potpourri. Individual results are as follows:

## Academics (continued)



Saint Paul's almost-collegebound seniors have achieved a few extraordinary honors this year. The Classes of '14 and '15 can officially claim a total of twenty-seven Advanced Placement Scholars among their ranks. AP Scholars have demonstrated proficiency in various subjects across the curriculum by scoring exceptionally high on multiple AP Exams, which are offered at the end of yearlong AP courses. High scores on AP exams can yield substantial numbers of hours of college c credit—so these 27 are already

on their way to college success. Saint Paul's School offers Advanced Placement course work in Art, English, Math, Science, and Social Studies. AP Scholars, students who have earned a score of 3 or higher on three or more exams, include: Quinn Anglada, Matthew Baldone, Michael Brands, Beau Briggs, Kyle Cleveland, Grant Connolly, Max Gold, Evan Lewis, Bryan Livaudais, Connor Lu, Jacob Mc Williams, Warner Moore, Walden Perry, Hunter Simonson, Matthew Spedale, and Peter Yager. AP Scholars with Honor, students who receive an average score of at least 3.5 on all AP exams taken, and a score of three or higher on four or more exams include: Michael Burke, Bennett Miller, and Mitchell St. Pierre. AP Scholars with Distinction, students who receive an average score of at 3.5 on all AP exams taken, and scores of 3 or higher on five or more of these exams include: Zachary Albright, George Cazenavette, August Dixon, Jack Dubreuil, Burke Irwin, Ryan Keller, Grant Landwehr, and Max Morvant.

In addition, the National Merit Scholarship program has recognized nine Saint Paul's seniors for scoring exceptionally high on last year's PSAT test. Students scoring in the top one half of one percent of testers—the top 16,000 of over three million—are designated as Semifinalists, while the students scoring in the lower half of one percent are named Commended Scholars. Saint Paul's has produced six Semifinalists from the Class of 2015: Matthew Baldone, Beau Briggs, George Cazenavette, Jack Dubreuil, Max Gold, and Ryan Keller. In addition, Connor Lu, Aaron Nguyen, and Walden Perry were recently named Commended Scholars.

Core Principle - Concern for the Poor and Social Justice

In the spirit of Thanksgiving season, Saint Paul's has recently increased its focus on the LaSallian Core Principle of Service to the Poor.

One might even say that the students and faculty have been "driven" to act on the principle.

A series of three Drives has taken place on campus during recent weeks, all part of the school's perennial effort to give back to the Covington community. The initiatives, which involve all Saint Paul's students and faculty, are each aimed at a certain local charitable cause.

The Warm Hearts Clothing Drive, first mentioned in the October Wolftracks, is a yearly effort led by Sean Noel, a seventh grader, to collect and distribute used cold-weather clothing to the local needy. Saint Paul's delivered; the National Honor Society and LaSallian Youth Leaders collected 875 warm garments after a few weeks of selfless action.

Saint Paul's also held a recent Blood Drive benefitting The Blood Center. Any eligible students and faculty members were asked to donate a pint of blood, by the end of the day, the total collected reached sixty-nine pints. Most of the blood was donated in the name of a Saint Paul's student who had recently been injured in a cycling accident, and is currently on his way to recovery. The donations were able to help over 200 patients because according to blood bank literature one pint of whole blood benefits three patients.

The third and final drive is none other than Saint Paul's Thanksgiving Food Drive, perhaps the most prominent collection initiative on campus. In years past, the initiative has been known to rake in unbelievable quantities of food for the Covington Food Bank; this year was absolutely no exception. Students brought in a whopping eight tons of nonperishable foodstuffs to feed Covington's hungry.

As a final thought before the long holiday, the Thursday before Thanksgiving vacation, the students and faculty gathered in the Briggs Assembly Center to offer thanks. Father Matthew Clark, Chaplain of Saint Paul's, reminded the congregation to reflect on all that we have been given and requested that we not take our blessings for granted. On that note, thank-you to all members of the Saint Paul's family who help to make the school "a good place to grow up."








## College Signings

Saint Paul's School had five seniors decide to continue their athletic career on the college level. The signing celebration took place on Monday, November 17 in the Briggs Assembly Center.






