


2017 President's Annual Fund



Saint Solomon





Sign of Faith

On Sunday, October 16, Pope Francis canonized Blessed Brother Solomon Le Clercq, FSC at the Vatican in Rome, Italy. He is the first Brother of the Brothers of the Christian Schools to be beatified.

In the late 18th century, once the monarchy had been overthrown early in the French Revolution, the next target was the Church. In 1790 the Civil Constitution of the Clergy gave the state complete control over the Church in France. In order to continue to function, priests and religious were forced to take an oath to support the constitution. Most of the Brothers refused and so were forced gradually to abandon their schools and communities. Eventually the Institute was deprived altogether of legal status in France.

Brother Solomon was secretary to Brother Agathon, the Superior General, after having been a teacher, director and bursar. He always showed a great love for people and a great attachment to his work. Having refused to take an oath, he lived alone in Paris in secrecy. Brother Solomon was arrested and imprisoned in the Carmelite monastery, which had become a prison, together with several bishops and priests. On September 2, almost all the prisoners were killed by sword in the monastery garden. He was beatified on October 17, 1926, together with 188 of his fellow martyrs.

School News



Recently, the Saint Paul's Theater elective program, which encompasses Theater I, II, and III, was treated to a special workshop hosted by Alumnus Mike Mayhall '93 dealing with stage combat and stunt work in both the theater and film industry. Mayhall has worked as a successful stunt artist and double on various film and television projects such as the Walking Dead, Deepwater Horizon, Green Lantern, and Looper. In addition to his extensive work in the realm of stunts, Mayhall is also an accomplished actor in such projects as NCIS: New Orleans. He also directed and starred Jake's Road.

The core of the workshop revolved around how to use safe stage combat techniques while working in a theater setting. Students were taught how to fake and stage a variety of different techniques from a stage punch, and slap, to a staged kick. At the culmination of the workshop, students were instructed to construct a full scene with the inclusion of a stage combat routine. Students then went on to orchestrate a variety of different scenarios resulting in a well executed stage combat sequence.

Mayhall stressed the safety and precise nature of the movements throughout. He made sure the students focused on safety rather than garnering shock value or any other meaningless things. Without the students knowing the exact movements, stage combat becomes a risky endeavor. However, with proper instruction, it becomes a relatively easy and worthwhile experience.

The workshop comes as a part of the larger theater curriculum. The entire theme of the program has a multipronged purpose. First, the program is in place to give students a respect and appreciation of theater as an art form and acknowledge its place in society. Secondly, it helps with student self confidence due to the highly involved nature of theater. It helps students open themselves and present themselves in front of a group in a variety of ways. It also helps build collaboration and negotiation, as students must work with others to build and craft scenes.

More specifically, each year of theater has a different approach and purpose to these outlined goals. Theater I deals mainly with development of public speaking skills with a series of speeches and some rudimentary scene work that focuses on presenting oneself and one's ideas. Theater II builds on the idea of student collaboration with a greater variety of scene work and even the inclusion of a full one-act play assignment. The program begins to shift now more to acting and skilled scene work and writing rather than rough public speech skills as in Theater I. Theater III acts as the ultimate culmination of both programs. The class is officially a film class with students analyzing film on a variety of criteria with some being



Borrowed from the realm of theater. Student groups also create a variety of projects that include filming, editing, and acting.

The Theater students involved in the upcoming play, You Can't Take it With You, during the first week of November will also have the unique opportunity to use their skills outside their theater class and scene work with other students.

"Chasing the Dragon"

As Saint Paul's students crowded anxiously into the school Gene Bennett Sports Complex they expected the usual assembly filled with accolades, recognition, and reverence. What met them was a stark contrast. The students were shown a co-produced Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) film entitled "Chasing the Dragon." To complement and reinforce the film, a panel of distinguished guests ranging from FBI Special



Agents to the Parish Coroner, Dr. Charles Preston, and St. Tammany Parish Sheriff, Randy Smith, led a discussion following the film. The entire effort was led Kenneth Polite, a De La Salle New Orleans graduate, who now serves as the US District Attorney for the Eastern District of Louisiana.

The film introduced the students to a host of characters ranging from mothers, high achieving career personnel, daughters, and sons. All these varied characters were united in one of two things: addiction or loss of someone to its grasp. The interviews presented in the video provided a raw and gritty insight into the real cost of Schedule II prescription drugs and the slippery slope they present. Consequences of prescription drug abuse were punctuated by tearful confessions and gruesome memories. The video presented the cost of drugs on the body, mind, and the people around them. Real voices that had experienced the hardships of abuse and addiction were able to find a more than attentive audience in the form of the Saint Paul's student body.

At the conclusion of the video, the panel of distinguished guests spoke up about their experience dealing with such issues in communities across the country and the state. The Saint Tammany Parish Coroner, Dr. Preston, spoke about what his office sees every single day. Dr. Michael Sprague, a panel volunteer, provided a moving personal anecdote about his beloved niece who passed away due to an overdose. Special Agents from both the FBI and DEA explained the legal implications of drug use while also providing disturbing and pertinent information about the prevalence of prescription drug abuse across the country. The Saint Tammany Parish Sheriff, Randy Smith, and Mr. Harold Bartholomew, a representative from District Attorney's office spoke about the actual legal complications that can come from drug use and penalties for distribution and other drug related charges.

At the conclusion of the panel discussion, students were dismissed to their specific "Pack" times where they then had the opportunity to speak with some of the panel members in a more private setting. For the pack times that did not receive a panel member, issues such as prevalence and personal experiences were discussed among the students and faculty moderator. Students began speaking about family members and friends to further punctuate the message of the assembly for their fellow brothers in pack time.

Student response has been incredible with students beginning to absorb the message due to the gravity and real element of the presentation. Rather than lengthy presentations about the legality of drug use, "Chasing the Dragon" proved a cutting, poignant, and incredibly effective alternative. 



Saint Paul's Football Wolves, currently rated number four in the large schools polls, is having a banner season. The Wolves recently faced two major challenges in cross town rivals Covington High and district rivals Ponchatoula.

The Wolves defeated the Lions 31-14 on the turf in Jack Salter Stadium. Saint Paul's has won twelve of the last thirteen games in the renewed competition that began in 2001.
