Happy Birthday Saint Paul's



On Sunday, September 14, Saint Paul's celebrated 103rd anniversary of the opening of Saint Paul's College in 1911 by the Benedictines of Saint Joseph Abbey. On that day, forty-eight students, five Benedictine priests (Fathers Augustine, Adelbert, Aemillion, Martin, and Placid) and four lay teachers (Messrs. Edgar Barre, Oliver Lyons, Bernard Mutter, and Leopoldo Teller) walked through the arch for the first time and opened the school. By year's end, seventy boarders and thirty day students had enrolled. Today, with over 850 men of God, Saint Paul's strives to be the number one choice for parents on the Northshore. View this website for a brief pictorial of the past 100 years.

Saint Paul's, A Lasallian School

17th Century Reims, France: Saint Jean-Baptiste de la Salle founds the Institute of the Brothers of the Christian Schools.

The Institute's objective: "Human and Christian education," especially to the poor. The result: A worldwide Christian educational network encompassing eighty developed and developing countries with Christian Brothers and their partners serving over 800,000 students today.

Calling themselves "Brothers," to avoid the patronizing implication of "Master," the common title for teachers of the time, the Order set about the daunting task of bringing faith-based education to France's many underserved. Over the centuries, they crossed border after border, eventually expanding into Africa, America, and Asia while enduring ruthless persecution by church and government officials. Hundreds of years later, the result of their work can be seen in the 2,000 Lasallian institutions that span the globe.

As an heir to this expansive Lasallian legacy, Saint Paul's School strives to preserve the rich tradition and heritage of the Order as thoroughly as possible—look no further than the regular in-school Masses, the Lasallian Youth Leaders', or, perhaps most prominently, the signature Lasallian prayers said during each class and at the beginning and end of every day.

The prayers, in particular, are essential to Saint Pauls' identity—because they are the hallmark of a Lasallian Institution. In fact, all 2,000 Lasallian Institutions come to prayer with the call "Let us remember that we are in the holy presence of God." (In our case, this happens at the beginning of every class, as well as the beginning and end of each day). Lasallian prayers also involve the call and response, "Saint John Baptist de La Salle, Pray for us." "Live Jesus in our hearts, Forever." As every student, faculty member and administrator utters these words throughout the day, they honor a sacred tradition that has united Lasallians since the days of La Salle himself.

Quality Education





Students in this class focus on application of engineering standards through hands-on projects and document their work in an engineer's notebook. Captain Bryan Moore and Deputy Steven Paretti of the Saint Tammany Parish Special Operations Unit visited Saint Paul's Gateway to Technology class, sponsored by Hornbeck Offshore Services, and taught by Mrs. Julie Beck to demonstrate robots used in real life police work. The students were fascinated by the round eyeball camera that can be tossed into a room for observation, a larger robot on tracks, and a newly acquired underwater camera robot. Saint Paul's has several robot building teams including the pre-freshmen who compete in the Sea Perch competition.









Monthly School Mass

As summer rolls into autumn each year, Saint Paul's falls into a steady routine: clubs and organizations take shape, sports enter competition, and class curricula begin in earnest. In addition to the ordinary progression of academics and extracurriculars, however, Saint Paul's has launched into another tradition held especially close to the heart and mission of the school: the Mass.



The second monthly in-school liturgical celebration, held in the Briggs Assembly Center on Thursday, September 18, gave students and administrators an opportunity to break from routine and worship in the company of the rest of the school. Reverend Gary P. Copping of Saint Anselm gave a moving sermon about the importance of being peacemakers, which was followed a Eucharist facilitated by the Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion. As usual, students were unabashedly loud in singing the songs of praise and responding to the calls of the celebrant and student readers.

As part of an effort to further acquaint the pre-freshmen with the students' perennial tradition of participation in the Mass, the senior class invited the entire Class of 2019 into their own designated seating area during the service. The arrangement gave the eighth graders, still a little wet behind the ears, an opportunity to experience the seniors' shameless singing and willing responses. Before the end, the younger Wolves had joined in, reaching a higher volume than usual—and a greater appreciation of the Mass.

The Aqua Wolves got the dual meet portion of their season out to rousing start by sweeping District rivals Slidell and Covington at Kehoe-France Northshore School. The Aqua Wolves bested Slidell by a 102 to 60 score and overwhelmed Covington 133 to 20. The Water Wolves, won 9 of 11 events, led by double winners Junior Griffin Guzan in the 100 butterfly and 100 breaststroke, Junior Jack Cheng in the 50 free and 100 backstroke, and Sophomore Kyle Hladky swept the 100 and 200 freestyles.

Junior Harrison Prieto captured the 500 freestyle and closed to second in the 200 individual medley. The 200 medley and 400 free relay quartet of Prieto, Guzan, Cheng and tri-captain Jacob Elliott were impressive in victory. Eric Coston ran a 15:05, leading the Running Wolves to a second place victory to be outdone by only seven points, by Brother Martin. Our top 5 Varsity runners were Eric Coston, Spencer Albright, Collin Sullivan, Henry Elliot, and Stephen Schlottmann. We are considered a very young team; we had two sophomores, a junior, and two freshmen run under 17

minutes in the top five. Our Junior High was equally as successful. One 8th grader and five freshmen in the top 20 was enough to secure a n outstanding second place over six teams losing by 23 points to Brother Martin. Pre-Freshman Jonathan Bertucci and Freshmen Jack Verret, Jack Nunez, Forge Mathes, and Ryan Lavin were the heavy hitters for our Junior High race. Our meet is one of the few in the state that scores the Junior Varsity race. Claiming places five through seven and nine through eleven, the Wolves were able to secure a strong second place only to be outdone by Brother Martin by 21 points. Thomas Rovira, Matt Wallace, Samuel Giberga, Matt Gallagher, and Alex Paille were three of the top scorers for the JV squad. With three-second place team finishes, a plethora of personal records, and a great turnout, this has been our most successful meet yet.


