Rise Up 'O Men of God



Brother Benildus Sulzer, FSC

Brother Ben passed away on September 6, 2016 in Santa Fe, New Mexico. He was 77. Brother Ben was born William Karl Sulzer in New Orleans. He entered the Novitiate in Lafayette, LA in June of 1956, received his habit in December of that same year and pronounced his final vows in June of 1963.

He received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Saint Michael's College in Santa

New Mexico in 1961 and a Master of Education from Southeastern Louisiana University in 1977.

Brother Ben began his teaching career in New Mexico and then moved to New Orleans to teach at both Archbishop Rummel High School and Christian Brothers School. During the 1960's Brother Ben was a camp counselor at Camp Saint Paul's and a teacher and prefect at Saint Paul's School. He left Saint Paul's and returned to New Mexico in the early 1970s. In 1977 until 1982, he came back to Saint Paul's as the Director of Camp Saint Paul's, a teacher and the dormitory prefect. Brother Ben spent his remaining years in New Mexico, retiring in 2000.

Happy Birthday Saint Paul's



On Wednesday, September 14, Saint Paul's celebrated the 105th anniversary of the opening of Saint Paul's College in 1911 by the Benedictines of Saint Joseph Abbey. On that day, forty-eight students, five Benedictine priests (Fathers Augustine, Adelbert, Aemillion, Martin, and Placid) and four lay teachers (Messrs. Edgar Barre, Oliver Lyons, Bernard Mutter, and Leopoldo Teller) walked through the arch for the first time and opened the school. By year's end, seventy boarders and thirty day students had enrolled. Today, with over 850 men of God, Saint Paul's strives to be the number one choice for parents on the Northshore. View this website for a brief pictorial of the past 100 years.

Saint Paul's, A Lasallian School

The Institute of the Brothers of the Christian Schools is a Catholic religious order of laymen whose mission is to provide spiritual and human education to the young, especially the poor. Founded by St. John Baptist de La Salle in 17th century France, today approximately 5,000 Brothers and 80,000 Partners serve nearly 900,000 students in about 1,000 educational ministries located in 80 countries. The Brothers of the Christian Schools is the largest religious order of Brothers in the Church dedicated solely to the mission of Christian education. The Institute's headquarters, *Casa Generalizia*, is located in Rome, Italy.


The Lasallian Region of North America (RELAN) is one of five global regions served by Lasallian ministries. It encompasses the United States and Canada, and contains four Districts: District of Eastern North America, District of Francophone Canada, District of the Midwest, and District of San Francisco New Orleans. The Region contains a network of 7 colleges, 53 high schools, 19 middle schools, and 3 elementary schools, as well as a number of youth care facilities, residential and day treatment programs for special educational and behavioral needs, retreat centers, after school programs, and summer camps. The Region's headquarters, *Christian Brothers Conference*, is located in Washington, D.C.

The District of San Francisco New Orleans was established on July 1, 2014. It was created by combining the legacy Districts of San Francisco and New Orleans-Santa Fe, which between them had provided nearly 240 years of continuous ministry through their schools and other educational works. Today's District includes 21 schools in eight states and Tijuana, Mexico, where over 130 Brothers and 1,300 Lasallian Partners serve nearly 13,000 students. The District's headquarters, *De La Salle Institute*, is located in Napa, California, with a second office located in Covington, Louisiana.

As the world around Saint Paul's Schools shifts and changes to focus on technology and advancement, Saint Paul's continues to do what it does best: Keep up with these changes. This tireless purist is achieved by a combination of both new classes and extracurricular activities. These avenues aim to equip a community of students, passionate about science and technology, with the skills and initiative to become the next generation of leaders and create positive changes in the robotics and technology fields.

The extracurricular side of this attempt can be seen in the rapidly expanding RoboWolves organization founded in 2014. The activity was created after the implementation of the Hornbeck Offshore Services PLTW Gateway to Technology program at Saint Paul's. During its first year, the

program only included pre-freshmen candidates. After only a single school year, the club was invited to participate in the VEX Worlds competition located in Louisville, Kentucky. For the past two years, Saint Paul's has been the only Louisiana Middle School Team invited to participate. The competition involves close to one thousand student led robotics teams from across the world. Since their initial invitation, the club has been invited back by the prestigious competition every year.

In addition to their highly sought after invitation to the international competition, the organization has also won a variety of awards from around the state. During their first year of competition, the RoboWolves were the RSR/Loyola VEX Tournament Champions, the winner of the State Middle School Excellence Award, and the Holy Cross VRC Tournament Champions. The following year, the club continued to showcase their talents by winning the Holy Cross VRC Tournament yet again, being rewarded the Excellence Award of the Holy Cross VRC Tournament, winning the Saint Paul's VRC Tournament, and being recognized as the Louisiana State Champions.

The organization also has exciting plans to expand their mission statement of technology and student run competition into new grade levels. As of now, the club remains open to pre-freshman, freshman, and sophomores. However, the club plans to expand to include all grade levels with a new addition every single year. This year promises to be the most successful yet with over forty students on the rooster. Their first competition is December 3rd at Holy Cross High School and they plan to host a competition in the Briggs Assembly Center in January for the local southern area schools.

The curriculum side of this technological push comes in the form of a newly christened AP Computer Science class, part of the Hornbeck Offshore Services PLTW Program, that aims to instruct students on how to design and implement computer programs that solve problems relevant to today's society, including technology, media, and engineering.

Students in the complex program will have the opportunity to follow a distinct AP framework that will teach everything for the Computer Science field from learning to write in the universal and highly recognized Java Script to learning how to conduct computer algorithms and other unique functions. Besides learning about the technique side of technology, they will also learn about the place of computers in today's world. The students will analyze the ethical, social, and global implications of computer use.

Founder's Week

One of the strongest and most eternal memories of Saint Paul's School comes in the form of the Five Core Principles. These principles form the very basis of our attitude and culture from the oldest students to the newest. The principles include rhetoric about concern for the poor and social justice, quality education, faith in the presence of God, inclusive community, and respect for all persons. While these beliefs and attitudes are always at the forefront of life at Saint Paul's, the school takes a special week to honor these principles in the form of Founder's Week. The week is dedicated to not only the founder of the Lasallian Education, Saint John Baptist De Lasalle, but also the Christian Brothers founders of Saint Paul's.

The format of the weeklong celebration always follows roughly the same pattern.

Each day takes on a varied core principal with different activities, lessons, and speakers.

On the day for quality education, teachers are encouraged to speak about their college education and give more information about their educational path. In addition to a student's core teachers, two special teachers are chosen to make an announcement to the entire school about their education. Concern for the poor and social justice is represented by a special assembly in which a past student, a charitable organization, or a current student will speak about their work in the community and the impact it has had on the area as well as the members of the community.

Wednesday highlighted Faith in the presence of God with five prayer services allowing the students to choose what service was the best for them: adoration in the Briggs Assembly Center, Joyful Songs in the new gym, reflections on the teachings of Mother Theresa in the theatre, a rosary at the Katrina Memorial, and meditation in Our Lady of Peace Chapel. Respect for all persons took on a new plan this year with the day now being categorized by an administrative led community building activity. The activity includes every student in the school answering basic questions about their favorite movie, family, and even hobbies. The students are then encouraged to meet other students and ask them about their answers to the questions. The aim is to break increase communication and build community among students and faculty on campus.

Then the entire school gathers in the gym to watch a dance tournament and a basketball tournament with all grade participation before the day is concluded with a school wide favorite: the Senior-Faculty volleyball game.

Saint Paul's School senior Eric Coston celebrated Founder's Week by traveling to the prestigious 36th annual Woodbridge Cross Country Classic in picturesque southern California where he competed against the very best in the nation. Other competitors boasted individual state records much like Coston himself. 










He was awarded a \$2,000.00 scholarship from The Kelly Gibson Foundation on behalf of the Mackel Foundation. 
