In 2012, at the bequest and generosity of the estate of Mr. Harry G. Friedman Class of 1933, a memorial plaque was designed and hung in the Eastern hallway in the lobby of LaSalle Hall. It was dedicated to the Memory of Mr. Harry Friedman and that of his brother, USA Lt. Col. Joseph Bernard Friedman, St. Paul's College 1935. Additional language on the plaque is as follows: "Honoring the

memory of all the St. Paul's Alumni who practiced the values learned at St. Paul's by

their patriotic service in the United States Military."

Over 150 Alumni are presently represented on the plaque which resides in the hallway of La Salle Hall adjacent to our current ROTC classroom. His knowledge of the campus and his skill abilities came in very handy on many occasions. Ironically, Israel officially "retired" on July 31, taking advantage of Christian Brothers' Retirement plan which allowed him to collect full retirement benefits while still working 20 hours a week at Saint Paul's. In addition to his part time work at Saint Paul's, Israel also worked as a bus driver (bus 66) for St. Tammany Parish School System.

A Batiste family member has been present on this campus for over fifty years. Both his grandfather, Jack Baptiste, and his uncle Bobby Baptiste, started working at Saint Paul's in the early 60's and stayed for thirty-seven years.






# Happy Birthday Saint Paul's



On Thursday, September 14, Saint Paul's celebrated the 106<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the opening of Saint Paul's College in 1911 by the Benedictines of Saint Joseph Abbey. On that day, forty-eight students, five Benedictine priests (Fathers Augustine, Adelbert, Aemillion, Martin, and Placid) and four lay teachers (Messrs. Edgar Barre, Oliver Lyons, Bernard Mutter, and Leopoldo Teller) walked through the arch for the first time and opened the school. By year's end, seventy boarders and thirty day students had enrolled. Today, with over 850 men of God, Saint Paul's strives to be the number one choice for parents on the Northshore. View this website for a brief pictorial of the past 100 years.

#### Saint Paul's, A Lasallian Catholic School

The Institute of the Brothers of the Christian Schools is a Catholic religious order of laymen whose mission is to provide spiritual and human education to the young, especially the poor. Founded by St. John Baptist de La Salle in 17th century France, today approximately 5,000 Brothers and 80,000 Partners serve nearly 900,000 students in about 1,000 educational ministries located in 80 countries. The Brothers of the Christian Schools is the largest religious order of Brothers in the Church dedicated solely to the mission of Christian education. The Institute's headquarters, *Casa Generalizia*, is located in Rome, Italy.

The Lasallian Region of North America (RELAN) is one of five global regions served by Lasallian ministries. It encompasses the United States and Canada, and contains four Districts: District of Eastern North America, District of Francophone Canada, District of the Midwest, and District of San Francisco New Orleans. The Region contains a network of 7 colleges, 53 high schools, 19 middle schools, and 3 elementary schools, as well as a number of youth care facilities, residential and day treatment programs for special educational and behavioral needs, retreat centers, after school programs, and summer camps. The Region's headquarters, *Christian Brothers Conference*, is located in Washington, D.C.

The District of San Francisco New Orleans was established on July 1, 2014. It was created by combining the legacy Districts of San Francisco and New Orleans-Santa Fe, which between them had provided nearly 240 years of continuous ministry through their schools and other educational works. Today's District includes 21 schools in eight states and Tijuana, Mexico, where over 130 Brothers and 1,300 Lasallian Partners serve nearly 13,000 students. The District's headquarters, *De La Salle Institute*, is located in Napa, California, with a second office located in Covington, Louisiana.

#### Homecoming 2017

Although Saint Paul's did not officially turn 106 until September 14, students were treated the day prior to colored cupcakes with bright blue and yellow icing in between their third and fourth blocks. "Snack Day," as it has been known to be called, is a monthly event where volunteers of the SPS mothers club serve baked goods and water by grade level to students, free-of-charge.

"The cupcakes were delicious," junior Daniel Wieseneck said. "Everyone loved the blue and gold colors."

By Monday, Sept. 18, the SPS Homecoming Week festivities were in full-swing. The Student Council conferred prior to discuss, among other business, the daily themes for "dress-down days." These days allow dress code leniency for students in order to promote a different form of uniformity, the uniformity of brotherhood.

"It's not entirely a Democratic process of building from the base up," Student Council Junior President Joshua Rovira said. "Rather, there is a format that we follow. Our tournament is the kickoff of the math competition season. We had two divisions this year: Magnet and MAO Convention winners vs. all other schools.

Usually Saint Paul's, as the host school, competes in the magnet school division. However, to even out the divisions, Saint Paul's competed in the second division. There were sixty-fix Saint Paul's students competing and approximately thirty running the tests and bringing papers to the grade room. As the host school, Saint Paul's students don't compete in the higher subjects.

An unbelievable amount of work goes into planning a math tournament, but an unbelievable amount of joy comes from experiencing the love of math that these students bring to the table. The tournament takes place across campus using the cafeteria, La Salle Hall, Benilde Hall and the Briggs Assembly Center.
