Holy Week

I'm a word nerd. I love what individual words can do and the power that they hold, especially when one word becomes sort of a mantra or theme of someone's presentation. I was thus struck last Thursday by Glen Ballard's Leadership Day talk to the students. Mr. Ballard is a famous song writer and composer who has written for Michael Jackson, Elton John, and many other famous entertainers. He told the students about his struggle to join the entertainment industry and the challenges he faced. He told them to "find your passion" and follow it because they will be working for a long time. I hope your son told you about this assembly and Mr. Ballard's wonderful talk and interaction with the student body.

I boiled down Mr. Ballard's message into: *Pursue your passion!* He kept repeating the word "passion" so often that I doubt if any student (even with their wandering attention spans) did not hear it. What a wonderful message for our students! What a wonderful message for us!

As Mr. Ballard spoke, I couldn't help but think of the etymology of the word passion: from the Latin *passio* meaning *to suffer*. Often, in pursuing our passions, suffering is required. Mr. Ballard described his suffering as he attempted to follow his music passion and become part of the recording industry in Los Angeles. But his suffering gave way to success. And his real message thus becomes: do what you love even if it involves suffering, as that will give way to love and success. I don't think any truly successful person never experienced some failure.

This week, we focus on The Passion, the ultimate suffering of our Savior, who loved us enough to die for us in order that we might gain eternal life. I can't help but link Mr. Ballard's message with the focus of this week. We are called, as Lasallian educators, to have passion for our vocation. Saint La Salle used the word "zeal" (from the Greek *zelos* meaning ardor) but the two are similar. We must love what we do even if it involves suffering, as that will lead to success, love, and happiness. Let's face it: our jobs are not often easy and not for the faint of heart. The same is true of parenting: your job as parent is not often easy and not for the faint of heart. You parent because you love!

As we remember The Passion this week, let us ask for grace to be *passionate* about our work – both whether as educators or as parents. And as I wrote to the faculty, if we are not, we need to go pursue something else. May the grace of Holy Week fill our lives and the lives of our students and children!

Touch the hearts of those tempted to solve problems through violence. Make our schools safe harbors, with atmospheres that encourage all to live your Law of Love. Infuse wisdom, vigilance, caring, compassion, and understanding in teachers. Help administrators make just and wise decisions. Help*

everyone to spread the message that You are with us always and everywhere -- and that only You have the answer to the problems we face. Amen.

Clarifying the Sunday Issue: Archdiocese issued "clarifications" about the "no Sunday events at Catholic schools":

If the event is all weekend (i.e. student retreat or play), it will be allowed. The Archbishop prefers for the event to be held after 1pm on Sun to allow Family time for Church.

- If there is a fair all weekend, it is OK to have the fair after 1pm on Sunday. However if the fair is just held on • Sunday, it must be moved to Saturday.
- If there is an Alumni Event, have it after 1pm on Sun.
- If it is a non-school sponsored event (i.e. play-off game), it is acceptable. •
- If it is an event out of town, we must make sure Mass is offered to the students on Sunday.
- Open Houses should NOT be held on Sunday.

Class of 2015 Graduation Date: We have finally finalized the Class of 2015 graduation date. It will be on SATURDAY, May 17, 2015 at 4 pm in the Briggs Assembly Center. What took so long? Since 1972, Saint Paul's has been having its graduation on the third Sunday of May and SSA has been having its graduation on the third Saturday of May. Archbishop Aymond is no longer allowing Catholic schools to graduate on Sundays. Hence, SPS must move its date. Here was my problem.

- I really don't want to have graduation on a weekday night.
- I don't want to conflict with SSA on the third Saturday of May.
- I was going to have it on the third Friday, but SSA informed me that that is their Senior Night.

I then thought about the second Saturday of May, but that would eliminate a full week of class instruction,

play havoc with our awards ceremonies, and, most importantly, would be on the same day as the State Track Meet

and State 5A baseball tournament. (the latter two events assume we would make it that far – which we have in the past.)

So I settled on the third Saturday in May – the same day as SSA, but at a very different time. They have their ceremony at 10 am. We will have ours at 4 pm, which will allow plenty of time for the SSA ceremony and lunch or family gathering afterward for the families. Why the concern about SSA? We have three Class of 2015 members who have twin or triplet siblings at SSA. Hence, I wanted to be sensitive to these families. It took a while to check with all of them. They were all VERY understanding and cooperative and think the 4 pm time will work well for their families. I am grateful to them.
