• **TDIH II:** In 1910, Mother Teresa is born. In honor of her birth, coincidentally on the same day as Brother Ralph's birth, I reprint a famous prayer which is purported to be hers. I've used it before but it's always worth re-reading:

People are often unreasonable, irrational, and self-centered. Forgive them anyway If you are kind, people may accuse you of selfish, ulterior motives. Be kind anyway. If you are successful, you will win some unfaithful friends and genuine enemies. Succeed anyway. If you are honest and sincere, people may deceive you. Be honest and sincere anyway. What you spend years creating, others could destroy overnight. Create anyway. If you find serenity and happiness, some may be jealous. Be happy anyway. The good you do today will often be forgotten. Do good anyway. Give the best you have and it will never be enough. Give your best anyway. In the final analysis, it is between you and God. It was never between you and them anyway.

Fri, Aug 28 (Memorial of St. Augustine; Regular; B C D E) Today we celebrate Augustine, a most influential scholar saint. His story offers us much by way of inspiration. From Catholic Online: *Augustine is the patron of brewers because of his conversion from a life of loose living, parties, and worldly ambitions. His turnaround and conversion have inspired many who struggle with a particular vice they long to break.*



This son of St. Monica was born in Africa and spent years in wicked living. One of the most intelligent men who ever lived and brought up a Christian, his sins of impurity and pride darkened his mind. Through prayers of his mother and St. Ambrose's preaching, Augustine became convinced that Christianity was the true religion. Yet he did not become a Christian because he thought he could never live a pure life. One day he heard about two men who had been converted, and he felt terribly ashamed. "What are we doing?" he cried to his friend Alipius. "Unlearned people are taking Heaven by force, while we, with all our knowledge, are so cowardly that we keep rolling around in the mud of our sins!"

Full of sorrow, Augustine flung himself out to the garden and cried, "How long more, O Lord? Why does not this hour put an end to my sins?" Then he heard a child singing, "Take and read!" Thinking that God intended him to hear those words, he picked up the Letters of St. Paul, and read the first passage. It was just what he needed, for in it, St. Paul says to put away all impurity and to live in imitation of Jesus. That did it! From then on, Augustine began a new life.

He was baptized, became a priest, bishop, famous Catholic writer, Founder of religious priests, and a great saint. On the wall of his room he had the following written in large letters: "Here we do not speak evil of anyone." Augustine overcame heresies, practiced poverty supported the poor, preached often and prayed with great fervor until his death. His holy life made up for the sins he committed before his conversion. The following prayer by Augustine is beautiful:

Late have I loved You, O Beauty so ancient and so new, late have I loved You! For behold, you were within me and I outside, and I sought you outside. In my unloveliness, I fell upon these lovely things that you had made. Thou were with me and I was not with You. I was kept from You by those things, yet had they not been from You, they would not have been at all. You did call and cry to me to break open my deafness. I tasted You, and now hunger and thirst for You; You touched me, and I burn for Your peace.

treatment that several of their students required last week and the resulting publicity.

The Ugly Department: I don't hide things from the SPS community when something falls short of our high ideals. Last week, I received an email informing me of inappropriate social media posts by one of our students. We investigated and it was true: offensive language, mockery of public officials, pictures of illegal and dangerous activities, etc. We made the student remove the offensive action and informed him that continued posts of this nature would jeopardize his place at Saint Paul's. I am embarrassed that a student would do this. Parents, please speak to your sons. We will take disciplinary action against any inappropriate use of social media!

Emergency Closings: With the formation of Hurricane Danny in the Atlantic last week, I remind all of the protocol established by the Office of Catholic Schools for emergency closings. From Superintendent Jan Lancaster:

As we head into the most active time of the year for tropical storm systems, I am writing to inform you of the updated protocol for school closures should a tropical system threaten our area. This protocol will also apply to other emergency closures, such as winter weather or tornado threats. Schools are to follow both the closure and reopening schedules of their civil parish. When the decision to close public schools in the civil parish is made, Catholic schools will also close. In certain circumstances, you may need to close before the civil parish or may not be able to reopen on the same schedule. Please join me in prayer that these protocols do not have to be put into effect. Note: SPS reserves the right to re-open when safe – even if public schools remain closed. We did this with Katrina, opening weeks before public schools.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 2015-____ AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF COVINGTON AMENDING THE FOLLOWING PROVISIONS OF THE COVINGTON CODE OF ORDINANCES: APPENDIX B, COMPREHENSIVE ZONING ORDINANCE OF 2010, PART 4. GENERAL PROVISIONS, SEC. 4.1.
