Heroin in St. Tammany: Who would have thought this would be a problem? The 35 heroin arrests during Holy Week and the 7 heroin-related deaths in St. Tammany since January are sobering statistics, mirroring a nationwide spike in this particular drug use. DEA Special Agent in Charge Keith Brown said the key is to address prescription pill abuse (since heroin and pain pills like Oxycodone are remarkably close chemically) that begins with young people who need better monitoring from parents. *It's so easy to see a high school athlete have an injury, get prescribed pain pills, and then use an entire bottle of 60 hydrocodones when he might have only needed two,* Brown said recently. Parents – please guard any prescription pain killers and monitor your son's use if he needs this medicine.

Apr 29 Assembly: I hope the students enjoyed our Apr 29 assembly. Here's some of what we did:

• Students entered the gym to the strains of "The Hallelujah Chorus" from George Fredrick Handel"s incredible oratorio entitled "Messiah." Too often associated with Christmas, this iconic Baroque masterpiece actually musically represents the joy that Christians should feel over the Resurrection. That Handel composed this work in just 24 days in 1741 borders on the miraculous. I explained to the students that when King George III first attended a performance of "Messiah" in 1742, he was so astounded by "The Hallelujah Chorus" that he stood up in amazement. Naturally, the whole audience also stood. So, today, when you attend a performance

of "Messiah", it is customary to stand for "THC." OK, enough music trivia! While the music played, junior Casey Fitzmaurice lit the prayer candle – now the large Paschal candle, symbolically representing Christ's resurrection. We prayed in a special way for those who have entered into God's Kingdom since our last assembly: Mrs. Elaine M. Williams, grandmother of Eric Coston '17 and Mrs. Mary Agnes Borck "Mab" Patin Valois, grandmother of Turner Valois '14.

- Introduced Mr. Jeff St. Romain, director of West St. Tammany Habitat for Humanity. SPS Renaissance made a donation to Habitat, which was presented to Mr. St. Romain by a group of **Habitat Wolves** and their moderator, Mr. Richard Pichon.
- Recognized and congratulated the **Gymnastic Wolves** for the following accomplishments:
 - Their big first place win on April 5th in the Baton Rouge Gymnastics Meet. Team members were Brennan Skinner, Colin Skinner, Ethan Lowry, Stevie Van Zandt, Seth Dragon, Alex Shelby, Drew Bratschi, and Blaze Burkenstock.
 - Ethan Lowry and Brennan Skinner were named to the 2014 Academic Composite Boys' Gymnastics Team.
 - Brennan and Colin Skinner earned U.S. Men's Gymnastics Academic All-American honors for two consecutive years and on Saturday, April 12, Colin qualified for the 2014 U.S. Men's Junior Olympic National Championships.
 - **Brennan** did not participate in the Region 3 Qualifying Championships because he opted to try out for the LSU Cheerleading Team. After three days of try-outs and interviews, he was selected to the team today. Geaux Tigers!
 - Recognized and congratulated the **Track Wolves** for a dominant season thus far. The Wolves are undefeated in the State of Louisiana to date with victories at the Christian Brothers Relays, the Saint Tammany Parish Championships, the Rummel Raider Ronnie Doyle Classic, and the District 6-5A Championships. The only hardware left unclaimed came at the All State Sugar Bowl meet at Tad Gormley Stadium. This meet is dubbed the largest high school track meet in the country with over 2100 athletes competing. We finished as the top team in the state with the 3rd highest point total, outperforming teams such as John Curtis and Edna Karr and falling only 2 points out of first place while losing to teams from TX and AL. We now have a threepeat in District Championships (only the 3rd parish Crown for Saint Paul's in the last 40 years and now two in a row) with this senior group claiming 25% of all the District titles in our school's history. At the District meet, two 40 year old relay school records were broken by this team as the 4 x 200 m relay team of Antwann Anderson, Max Robin, Marcus Gaines and Leyton Lavigne claimed first place while the 4x400 m relay, Leyton Lavigne, Eric Coston, Zach Albright and Mitch Brumfield bested the school record by two seconds in a second place effort. District Champions were as follows: 4x200 m relay- just referenced, 110 M hurdles (Deonte Soraporu), 300 M hurdles (Deonte Soraporu), 1600 m run (Eric Coston), 800 m run (Zachary Albright), 3200 m run (DC Lipani), Pole Vault (Max Illing), and the Triple Jump (Jalen Mcklesky).
- Recognized and congratulated the **Lacrosse Wolves** for placing second in state for the second consecutive year a fantastic accomplishment by a fantastic group of Wolves!
- Recognized and congratulated seniors Ross Hodgins, Parker Jaquillard & Luke Posner for being named 2014
 Scholar Athletes by the Allstate Sugar Bowl Chapter of the National Football Foundation. They were recognized at a

recent luncheon at Riverside Hilton in NO. Only 24 schools had a recipient of the award, and SPS was one of only two schools with three scholar athletes.
