

The President's Hebdomadal Blue Ribbon Newsletter Nov 16 – 29, 2015



In school & country, we are blessed with abundance. And so my final pre-Thanksgiving message concerns the same one I give each year at this time: the Lasallian commitment to the poor.

This commitment to the poor began with John Baptist de La Salle. The first schools were endowed parish charity schools, operating on shoestring budgets and often located in less desirable parts of town. Both rich and poor were welcome, provided all agreed to be treated as equals – revolutionary in those days! All were important.

Equally revolutionary was de La Salle's insistence on partiality. We often speak ofthe need for impartiality in dealings with students. Actually, St. de La Salle was very partial. Partiality was shown to those with less attractive qualities; they were to receive the most attention. Those with the least talents were to be supported and encouraged. Those who had extra food were to share it with those who had little. De La Salle was convinced that the poor needed the schools the most. The curriculum, therefore, combined practical & religious training, designed to help the poor succeed. Thus, service to the poor, both directly and indirectly, must be present at SPS if we are to be faithful Lasallians.

But it's not just Saint La Salle's thinking that compels us to care for the poor. Indeed, the **Concern for the Poor and Social Justice** is at the heart of Catholic social teaching. The United States bishops write: *In a world characterized by growing*

prosperity for some and pervasive poverty for others, Catholic teaching proclaims that a basic moral test is how our most vulnerable members are faring. In a society marred by deepening divisions between rich and poor, our tradition recalls the story of the Last Judgment (Mt 25:31-46) and instructs us to put the needs of the poor and vulnerable first.

As we prepare for Thanksgiving, let us be mindful of those who are not blessed with material comfort. Let us strive to reach out to them. Let us find ways to welcome them to SPS.

• TDI H: In 1691, things were not going well in the newly found Institute of the Brothers of the Christian Schools. I quote from Brother Donald Mouton, a Lasallian scholar: The group of teachers founded by John Baptist de La Salle was in a precarious situation. Personal antagonisms, opposition to the Founder's work, internal problems, and fragile health that almost led to his death toward the end of 1690 posed critical questions for De La Salle as to the very future of his enterprise. In this crisis, De La Salle decided to bind himself by vow with two other Brothers, Nicolas Vuyart and Gabriel Drolin, to establish the Society of the Christian Schools at whatever the cost might be, even if all others should abandon it. This "vow of association and union" pronounced on November 21, 1691, often referred to as the "heroic vow" was an act of

hope at a time when the work of the early Brothers was in serious jeopardy. Today, when times seem tough, the Brothers often refer to this milestone in our history. We give thanks for the "heroic vow"! Because of it, we're still around!

• Recognized and congratulated the students who participated in the Cyber Discovery Camp at LA Tech in June: St. Paul's sent a team to the 2015 Cyber Discovery Camp at Louisiana Tech University, a program sponsored by the US Department of Homeland Security. At the end of the week, the Wolves were crowned as the champions of the event and received an award of \$1,250 for the school! The team consisted of the following students: Jacob Coutrado, Tonner Dougherty, Lester Guttuso, Forge Mathes, and Andy Smith. Mr. Winston Capps and Mr. Matt Pinero moderated the team. The camp was an intense, multi-disciplinary camp that ran from 7:00am to 11:00pm for a week. The core curriculum of the camp focused on computer coding, robotics, cryptography (the breaking of codes), architectural design, drama, and essay

writing. The team was successful in every event but earned the bulk of its points in the four essay competitions, the cyber fort design, and the cryptography challenge. The team won the essay competition every day of the event and won the award for best fort design. And Mr. Pinero wrote me the following: Although what our guys did in the classroom and in the robotics competitions was impressive, perhaps the most impressive thing they did was win over the support of the other teams. They befriended a number of students from other teams by continually helping them in any way they could. This all paid off in the final competition. In the final competition the teams' robots had to collect marbles and return them to their forts. The team that returned the most marbles would win. Going into the last round our team was winning by four points over Catholic High, and 100 points would go to the winner of the round. Catholic had purchased a 30 second head start for the round in the camp auction, so we were at a disadvantage. Without being asked, both NOMMA and Southwood sacrificed their own success and used their robots to help bring marbles to our fort and block other teams from intervening. These schools wanted us to win because they respected our students and became friends with them. That, to me, was more impressive than anything else we had accomplished in the camp.

• Recognized and congratulated the many, many students who helped conduct the annual SPS Math Tournament. Individual winners included Adam Smith (1st in Pre-Algebra), Ben Klein (3rd Place in Pre-Algebra), Jonathan Bertucci (1st in Algebra I); Josh Devier (HM in Algebra I), Lenny Carollo (2nd in Potpourri), Jack Pellegrini (3rd in Potpourri). Team winners were Sean Hightower, Jesse Cheng, Adam Smith, & Collin Murray who won 1st in Pre-Algebra; Marshall Unkauf, Andrew Aceves, & Corbin Chitwood who won 2nd in Pre-Algebra; and John Paul Bourgeois, Chris Wilson, Beau Franklin, & Blake Ramsay who won third in Algebra I. We placed 2nd in the Whole School Test and 3rd in the Sweepstakes Division. Because it's our tournament, we do not enter students in any level of math above Algebra I. So we did pretty good with so few students participating!

- Ran out of time before I could do any more recognitions which will "roll over" to the next assembly! But since it was Veterans Day eve, I had the student robustly sing our National Anthem, after instructing them on proper etiquette when the anthem is played: hand over heart, stand at attention, take off any headgear. We then robustly sang the Fight Song for all of the activities going on around school.

This is an award that serves to memorialize our past, celebrate the present, and propel us into the future.


