
Wed, Nov 4 (9th Grade HR Breakfast; CNN & SSR during breakfast; D E F G)

Admissions: I annually get inquiries about "chances of getting in." Most qualified applicants who apply ON TIME gain admission. That's the key – applying on time. FYI, here is the official line which we presented at Open House: Saint Paul's strives to accept all students who have the ability to benefit from enrollment. All applicants are given serious consideration. In years when the number of such applicants exceeds the available space, the following policies, issued by the Saint Paul's Board of Trustees, guide the Admission Committee in its deliberations:

- We are committed to our Lasallian mission to be an inclusive school community, with a special sensitivity and outreach to those in need.
- We are committed to families who have traditionally been associated with our mission and vision as evidenced by previous enrollment and support.
- We are committed to students in Catholic elementary schools that have traditionally been supportive of our mission and vision and whose students have historically enrolled here.
- We are committed to students who practice the Catholic faith.
- We are committed to all other students as space allows.

Thus, acceptance or non-acceptance is not determined by any one factor, including academic achievement. Non-acceptance does not mean that a student is not qualified or deserving of enrollment here. We do not wish to turn away any deserving student, but sometimes our physical facilities prevent us from accepting all such students

Social Justice Month: The Church dedicates Nov to social justice. While many concentrate on such things as food drives, the Church reminds us that a commitment to social justice goes WAY beyond acts of charity – in involves working for change that will make us a more just society. There are 7 key themes that comprise our Catholic social tradition. Last Tuesday's Assembly: I hope the students enjoyed our Oct 27 assembly. Here's some of what we did:

• Entered the gym to the strains of the first movement from "Autumn", one of four violin concertos by Baroque composer Antonio Vivaldi (1678-1741) collectively known as The Four Seasons. I reminded the students that we were halfway through the season of autumn. I reminded them that in less than a week, we will begin November, with only two months remaining in 2015. I told the students that the sun, moon, stars and planets, indeed all of God's creations, have no choice but to cooperate with God's plans. Only humans have the ability to cooperate with God – or not. God loves us so much, that he gives us free will – unlike all of His other creations. I encouraged them to make a resolution as the weeks fly by to cooperate with God's plan for their lives, by growing closer to Him and following His way.

I also reminded the students that over 25% of the school year and almost 83% of the calendar year are over. I had them reflect: How have I used that time? Did I grow closer to God, family, and friends? Did I accomplish the goals I had set? Am I a better person? I exhorted them to make the most of the remainder of this calendar and school year.

- Prayed in a special way, as the prayer candle was lit by junior **Tyler Babcock**, for all the intentions which we brought into the gym that morning.
- Welcomed a group of 45 7th grade students from the local elementary schools who were spending the morning with us to see what makes Saint Paul's such a great place.
- Recognized and congratulated the Lasallian Young Leaders for all their work in making Founder's Week so successful. Their commitment to Lasallian core principles shone brightly that week!
- Projected on the screen a letter from Covington Mayor Mike
 Cooper congratulating the SPS Key Club for "adopting" several
 city streets around school and keeping them free from litter. I
 encouraged our students not to litter. Parents, please stress this
 with your sons, too!
- Then, as if by magic, The Ride of the Valkyries from Richard Wagner's famous Ring of the Nibelung started playing: – which signals that the Varsity Football Wolves had done something pretty significant; in this case, they polished off two more district opponents, Ponchatoula and Slidell, which sets up a big game against Mandeville.. Wild applause ensued.

• Then, as if by more magic, The Water Music by George Frederic

Handel started playing – which indicated that the **Aqua Wolves** were swimming. On 10/12, the AWs swam in the Northshore Championships and placed 2nd out of 15 teams, losing in the final race. I projected on the screen (love the new video and sound system in the new gym!) the following results:

- o Metro Prep Swimmer of the week and SPS Swim Team Co-Captain Harrison Prieto turned in a pair of solid swims with 1st place finishes in the 200 freestyle and 100 backstroke.
- o Co-Captain Jack Cheng stroked to a pair of golds in the 50 and 100 yard freestyles.
- Junior Kyle Hladky raced to a 1st place finish in the 100 butterfly, as well as a second in the 100 breaststroke.
- Junior Brenton Larmann swam to a 5th place finish in the 100 freestyle and a 7th place finish in the 50 free.
- o Junior Jordan Wyble swam to a 6th place finish in the 200 freestyle and an 8th place in the 100 free.
- o Junior Ian Fried scored 6 points on his way to a 3rd place finish in the 200 IM and a 7th place finish in the 100 breaststroke.
- o Junior Max Tepper scored 5 points on his way to a 4th place finish in the 500 free.
- o Sophomore Myers Morgan swam the Ironman double of the day's racing format, with a pair of

2nd place finishes in the 200 IM and 500 freestyle, racking up 14 points for the Wolves.

- o Sophomore Tonner Dougherty took the pregame talk to heart, and was the first to pounce off the blocks in both of his races, scoring a 6th in the 100 backstroke and a 10th in the 50 freestyle.
- o Freshman Jacob Eilers swam to a pair of 9th place finishes in the 200 freestyle and 100 backstroke. Jacob has been a consistent member of the practice squad this season and it is starting to show.
- o Freshman Matthew Lyon raced to a 6th place finish in the 100 butterfly and touched 8th in the 100.
- O 8th graders Alex Rawls, Drew Putfark and John Buckley showed versatility and strength in their events, and each of them scored 6 points on their way to 3rd place finishes. John swam to a 3rd place finish in the 500 freestyle. Alex raced to a 3rd place in the 100 butterfly and a 4th in the 100 backstroke. Drew flew to a 3rd place finish in the 100 breaststroke and a 6th in the 100 freestyle.

• I then showed the students an email I had received from

a 2015 alumnus as he started college to help explain why I use so much classical music in my assemblies. Here's what Walden Perry wrote me as he began college: Yesterday we started classes at Louisiana Tech, and something occurred that I thought you might like to hear. I'm double majoring in Computer Science and Music (Percussion), something I have had to extensively plan for to make it possible in 4 years. Even though I'm so excited about being able to actively pursue both of my passions, I was still nervous about starting classes. There is no denying it, college is a huge change. But something happened at my first class, Music Theory that changed my mind. After going over the syllabus, our teacher dived straight into a general overview of music history. We quickly discussed the medieval period, the Renaissance, the Baroque – The teacher asked: "Can anyone name a composer from the Baroque period?" My hand instantly shot up with George Frederic Handel. At that moment I knew that college wouldn't be all that bad. Thanks for everything and keep doing what you are doing. Even the little things like talking about a composer over and over again

can make a huge difference in someone's life. I know I always listened. I do intend to keep playing the music, Walden!

- Then, as if by more magic, The William Tell Overture by Gioacchino Antonio Rossini (an Italian baroque composer from 1792–1868) started playing which signals that the **Cross Country Wolves** are off and running. I recounted their latest accomplishments to date:
 - o Walker Shoot Out: 1st place Varsity! The Running wolves once again earned the number one ranking in the state coaches' poll by putting in an awesome performance at the Walker meet.

 Eric Coston ran a 14:39 to claim the race championship and he set a new course record for the Walker Meet. He was followed over the finish line by Spencer Albright, Stephen Schlottman, Colin Sullivan, and Henry Elliott. The Varsity placed first with only 60 points in a field of 31 schools and 256 runners. Overall, the team had 31 PR's at Walker as they look forward to the District Meet this Saturday at Money Hill. A special shout out to Reagan Hill, who finished every race this season, capping his run at Walker with another PR! Presenting the trophy were Eric, Spencer, Stephen, Colin, and Henry.
 - o St. Thomas Aquinas Meet: 1st place Junior High! And not to be outdone, the Junior High finished their season at the St. Thomas Invitational in Hammond, claiming the 1st place trophy with all five scoring runners in the top ten! Competing against 12 other schools, **Patrick Elliot** lead the Wolves with his first place finish, followed by **Ryan Hill in 3rd**, **Harrison Elliott in 5th**, **Blaine Sullivan in 6th**, **Nick Verret in 9th**. Other pre-freshmen who finished an amazing season are Sean Hightower, Michael Valliant, Alex Klocek, Walker Hebert, Sean Noel, Scott Sonnier, Jack Hanks, and Jack Grace. These runners have brought home 3 first place trophies and 2 second place trophies, have PR'ed every week, and broken St. Paul 2 mile records. They have also run 3 mile races against upperclassmen and left them in their dust. Their performances show the strength of the Wolf is the Pack... for years to come.
- Recognized and congratulated senior **John Cresson** who was admitted last summer to the Trent Lott Leadership Institute at University of Mississippi a highly competitive and prestigious program. John took two college classes: Political Science 101, *Introduction to American Politics*, which emphasizes constitutional principles of the U.S. government and Speech 102, *Fundamentals of Public Speaking*, in which John learnedlearn how to organize, prepare, and deliver speeches in a variety of public forums. Combined, these courses provided him with 6 hours of college credit. In addition, he spent one week in Washington, DC meeting with federal officials, including U.S. Representatives and Senators and touring attractions of the capital city. Additionally, he visited visit with leaders in industry and in the nonprofit sector.
- Recognized and congratulated (and projected a great picture) of the SPS participants in the St. Tammany
 Parish Hospital Student Volunteer Program. Of the ten boys chosen to participate in the program, 8 SPS
 students: Alex Oliveri, Carter Jarrell, Austin Hayes, Jack Statton, Nick Gordon, Briggs Simpson,
 Thomas Ruli & Rutger Fury. They spend at least 8 hrs per week for seven weeks in clinical care,
 ambulatory care, outpatient rehab, surgery, emergency, inflection prevention endoscopy, rehab and
 pulmonary care.
- Recognized and congratulated sophomore Andy Smith for representing SPS and Louisiana at the Congress of Future Science and Technology Leaders in Boston. Andy's participation was exemplary and I was sent an

Award of Excellence to present to him – which I happily did! Andy was taught by outstanding scientists as he pursued his passion for science.

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- Recognized and congratulated the students who participated in Grandparent Day over 800 people were in attendance. In particular, I recognized the Liturgical Band for their great music. Plus, I singled out senior Jacob Broussard and sophomore Carson Caulfield who gave moving tributes about their grandparents. Carson's was particularly moving as he lost his grandfather shortly after last year's GP Day due to complications from a boating accident. Carson encouraged all to make the most of the time with our loved ones.
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- Recognized and congratulated **The Marian Players** as they prepare to open "The Outsiders." This popular play is always a sellout, and I encourage the students to purchase their tickets early.
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- Informed the students about the Louisiana Festival of the Book which took place on Saturday, October 31. Of particular interest to SPS is that sophomore **Hayden Brewster** will read his 1st place winning essay in the Letters About Literature contest to the Festival. Second place winner **Ashton van Deventer** will also be honored. We gave Hayden an encouraging round of applause.
- Ran out of time before I could do any more recognitions which will "roll over" to the next assembly! We then robustly sang the Fight Song for all of the activities going on around school.
- As the prayer candle was extinguished by junior **Alex Nunez**, I reminded the students that they must leave the gym and be the Light of God to all whom they meet. The students exited to the strains of "Autumn" by Vivaldi. It was a great assembly! At least I thought so!


