Welcome to the final full week of October! Incredible! Times marches on; all we can do is make the most of it.

Five years ago Friday, Oct 28, 2011, Brother Alvaro Rodriguez Echeverria, then-Superior General of the Brothers of the Christian Schools, visited SPS. In his honor, we celebrated a memorable all-school liturgy and formed a Lasallian star. It was a magical moment in our school's history and the picture remains an iconic one. In his address to the students during Mass that day, Brother Alvaro made the following points which are worthy of review:



- Lasallians must be concerned with rights of child
- Lasallians must serve others, especially the poor
- Lasallians must engage in interreligious dialogue
- Lasallians must form quality relationships
- Lasallians must be people of faith
- Lasallians must have hearts without borders, allowing us to be concerned with all, both here and throughout the entire global community



And even though he's no longer Superior General, let's renew our commitment today to Brother Alvaro's vision of what a Lasallian school should be. Let's re-kindle the excitement of our centennial five years ago so that when SPS celebrates its bi-centennial in 2111, they will look back at our time and say "this was our finest hour" (apologies to Winston Churchill!) – even though I want SPS to greater in 2111 than it is today!



Southern Association Quality Review Team Visit: A group of six educators will visit SPS for three days this week, evaluating our school and, we hope, recommending that we continue to receive accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. We have been preparing for this visit for the past year and feel confident that all will go well. Please pray for the success of his evaluation of our Blue Ribbon School of Excellence.

Pre-Freshmen Etiquette Training: On Oct 25, 26, & 27, the Saint Paul's Renaissance Program, in an effort to augment the work of parents in the area of proper etiquette, has paired with Bosco's Italian Cafe to provide a short course on proper restaurant behavior. This event is in the BAC, not the restaurant like we used to do. We divided the pre-freshmen into three groups to provide a short course on restaurant etiquette followed by a meal catered by Bosco's. A staff member from Bosco's will instruct the boys in place settings, ordering, dealing with waiters, tipping, and making reservations. After the class, the boys will enjoy a meal, prepared by the restaurant, putting into practice what they have learned. The Saint Paul's Renaissance Program will cover the cost of the course and meal. The students will gather in the BAC when their PE or ROTC class falls after the lunch period. There are a few exceptions to this rule. Thus, the boys can learn about etiquette and eat without missing other classes. The students will wear the formal uniform. In case you are wondering, the menu will be corn bisque, Caesar salad, Chicken Alfredo with pasta, and bread pudding for dessert. Saint La Salle wrote extensively about "civility and decorum" for students, including detailed instructions on how to eat (e.g. *You should always keep the lips shut while eating so that you do not slurp as pigs do.... It is simply intolerable for you to eat using both hands....You must not notice if others have been served better portions than you.... It is rude to spit things you*

cannot swallow, such as bones, onto the plate or into your hand. It is even worse to let these things fall from your mouth). Hence, this activity is very Lasallian!

After School Issues: Assignment Hall and detention are in full operation. Parents, please stress with your sons the need



Last Tuesday's Assembly: I hope the students enjoyed our Oct 18 assembly. Here's some of what we did:

- The students entered the gym listening to a song called "Gaudeamus Omnes" by a late 16th and early 17th Century English composer named William Byrd. The title means "let us all rejoice" and I explained to the students that the whole Lasallian world, and, indeed, the whole Catholic Church was rejoicing as Pope Francis canonized seven new saints on Sunday, October 16 including Christian Brother Solomon, who was martyred during the French Revolution in 1792. We then showed pictures of the canonization ceremony, viewed a video on the life of Brother Solomon, saw pictures of the place of his martyrdom, read about the miracle attributed to him which paved the way for his canonization, prayer a special prayer to him and ended by singing "Honneur a Toi." (Ask your son the meaning of this Lasallian song.
- Prayed in a special way, as the prayer candle was lit by junior Nathan Bagnell, for those who have entered God's Kingdom since our last assembly: Mr. Charles Hebert, uncle of Nico Arcuri '17, Mr. Paul Addison Graham, Grandfather of Frankie'19 & Emile '20 Durio, and Mr. David Carambat, bother of SPS Science Teacher Mr. John Carambat
- Recognized and welcomed a group of 43 7th graders who were visiting campus on one of our Shadow Days. The student body applauded vigorously in welcome.
- Recognized and congratulated Coach Luke Barwick, who entered into the Sacrament of Matrimony on October 15 by
 marrying his wife, Nicole. Student Body President Will Murphy presented Luke with a small token of our
 appreciation. The students wildly applauded Luke and his bride.

- Recognized and congratulated the Varsity Football Wolves for their thrilling wins over Covington and Ponchatoula.
- Recognized and congratulated the Cross Country Team for the following accomplishments:
 - o On Saturday, October 8, the Varsity placed 1st in the Mississippi College/Watson Ford meet, which attracts some of the best teams in the south. The JV placed 3rd and the Junior Hi placed 1st.

The boys from St. Paul's took a sullen, quiet 12 year old "under their wing" and were incredibly patient with him. His mom said the St. Paul's boys did "wonders" for her son. By the end of the week, he was a totally different boy from when he first arrived. Your St. Paul's young men made a HUGE impact on him. We had a very successful week, and your young men played a very important role in that. It was a pleasure for him to meet these young men. I'm assuming they're exemplary St. Paul's students which gives me hope for the future. Our next host week is in November. We'd love to have more St. Paul's students participate. With sincerest thanks and gratitude. I then asked Jake and Patrick to speak to the students about the experience and encourage our boys to volunteer for the upcoming week.
