- This Day in History: On this day in 1945, at 8:16 a.m. Japanese time, an American B-29 bomber, the *Enola Gay*, drops the world's first atom bomb, over the city of Hiroshima. Approximately 80,000 people are killed as a direct result of the blast, and another 35,000 are injured. At least another 60,000 would be dead by the end of the year from the effects of the fallout. We pray that never again will atomic weapons be used!

- Purple Heart Day: Today in 1782, in Newburgh, NY, General George Washington created the "Badge for Military Merit," a decoration consisting of a purple, heart-shaped piece of silk, edged with a narrow binding of silver, with the word Merit across the face. The badge was presented to soldiers for "any singularly meritorious action" and permitted its wearer to pass guards and sentinels without challenge. After the war, the decoration was largely forgotten until 1927, when the US Army Chief of Staff sent an unsuccessful draft bill to Congress to "revive the Badge of Military Merit." On February 22, 1932, Washington's 200th birthday, the U.S. War Department created of the "Order of the Purple Heart." We remember all American soldiers who have been wounded, thus earning The Purple Heart.
- **TDIH:** The US Congress overwhelming approves the Gulf of Tonkin Resolution, giving President Lyndon Johnson nearly unlimited powers to oppose "communist aggression" in Southeast Asia. The resolution marked the beginning of an expanded military role for the United States in Vietnam.
- Particularly Preposterous Packaging Day -- Buy anything lately that was particularly hard to get out of the box or plastic wrap? Don't know how we celebrate this day. Did you ever succeed in getting the darn thing open? What do we older people do when even mainstream society can't open a simple bottle of aspirin, let alone a milk carton?

Fri, Aug 9 – (Feast of St. Teresa Benedicta of the Cross; Orientation Schedule; E F G A)

- Born into a prominent Jewish family in Poland in 1891, Edith abandoned her belief in God in her teens. A brilliant student, she earned a doctorate in philosophy in 1916. Through her studies, she became intrigued with Catholicism and converted in 1922, joining a Carmelite monastery in the Netherlands, taking the name of Sister Benedicta. When the Nazis occupied the Netherlands in 1940, the Dutch Catholic bishops denounced them. In retaliation, the Nazis arrested all Dutch Jews who had become Christians. Benedicta and her sister Rosa, also a Catholic, died in a gas chamber in Auschwitz on August 9, 1942. Pope John Paul II canonized her in 1998.
- **TDIH:** Richard Nixon becomes the only man in history to resign as President of the United States; Gerald Ford is sworn in as the 38th President of the US.
- **TDIH II:** On this day in 1945, a second atom bomb is dropped on Japan by the United States, at Nagasaki, resulting finally in Japan's unconditional surrender, thus ending World War II.
- Worldwide Art Day: Celebrate the arts today by drawing, composing, writing, painting, dancing, acting, or singing and look for ways to value the role that art plays in our lives!

Sat, Aug 10 (Feast of St. Lawrence)

- **TDIH:** News of the July 4th Declaration of Independence reaches King George III of England today in 1776.

Sun, Aug 11 (19th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

- Let's get the school year off to a great start by attending church services today. We encourage our Catholic Families to attend mass as a family today. We encourage our non-Catholic families to worship at place of choice.

School Safety: School safety remains a paramount issue for all of us, even in St. Tammany. Please discuss this with your sons. Know that in our faculty meetings, we will review all safety procedures that we have in place – and they are many. Safety is our priority – and it's EVERYONE'S JOB. **Report ANY rumor or threat to safety about which you hear.** Encourage your children to report, too. **If you**

come to campus, you must check in at the office for a Visitor Pass before you may walk around. Our prayers rise to heaven for a school year marked by safety and an elimination of violence everywhere.

First Day of School: Thu, Aug 8, is A FULL DAY OF INSTRUCTION for ALL students. This is considered a school day and attendance is expected. Students must be in their A Block class by 7:45.

- On Thursday, we have blocks A B C & D only. Students only need to bring books and supplies for Blocks A B C & D.
- Students will take ID & yearbook pictures on Thu & Fri during religion class, so they must wear SPS regular uniform (blue uniform shirt, khakis, brown belt, uniform socks, shoes in good condition, tee shirt -- optional but if worn must be white, grey, gold or blue) and abide by grooming regulations (especially hair and shaving -- all those special summer sartorial styles must be gone.) Students not in conformity will not be allowed to take pictures; disciplinary action is a possibility.
- Purchasing school pictures is completely optional. Pricing and order form info will be emailed to you.

Student-Parent Handbook Signature Card: The Student-Parent Handbook is posted on the Student Life page of our website. All students and parents must be familiar with our policies and agree to follow them. As evidence of that agreement, students and parents must sign a form attesting that they have read the Handbook, understand the rules contained within the document, and intend to follow them.

Print out the signature card (posted on the website under "recent news" and which is also the last page of the handbook) and bring it on August 8. It will be collected during English class.

From the Mothers Club:

- The Bookstore will be open on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday, Aug 5th 7th, from 9:00-5:00, and on Thursday, Aug 8th from 7:30 8:30 and during lunch.
- Pre-ordered supply packs will be available for pick up in La Salle Hall during this time.
- ALL required school supplies will be available for purchase. Avoid the crowds and support our school!!! Remember that all proceeds from the MC Bookstore go to help SPS.

Newsletters: All newsletters, report cards, and school communication will be EMAILED. Make sure you keep us informed if your email addresses change.

New Parent Reception & Information Meeting: A welcome reception and information meeting for **new parents** will be held on Mon, Aug. 19 at 6:30 pm in the Briggs Assembly Center. The reception

begins at 6:30 pm and an information meeting starts at 7:00 which will be over by 8:00. We hope you will be with us!

Odds and Ends:

- Students must be in their first block class by 7:45 am. Classes dismiss at 3:00 pm.
- Students must be in uniform compliance (including shirts tails tucked in) from the moment they step foot on campus.
- Car lines: There is no absolute designated drop off spot. Please be patient the first few days of school as traffic patterns form. Safety is paramount, so if you use Founder's Circle as a departure point, cars must drop off students in Founders Circle in the LEFT lane only you may not block traffic in the right lane to discharge the car occupants. Dropping off at La Salle Hall or the tennis courts is also OK.
- Traffic will be heavy heading into Covington this week as schools open. Please plan accordingly.
- Also, PLEASE observe traffic regulations. SPS is in a residential zone and speed limits are 25 mph –
 15 mph during school zone hours. Covington Police will actively enforce traffic laws around SPS.

New Students: Our Student Host organization will provide you with help for the first few days. The student hosts are easily spotted because they will be dressed in GRAY student host shirts instead of the blue uniform shirt. Feel free to ask a student host if you need help. They are friendly!

Orientation: Please discuss with your son the four assemblies he will have this week & next:

- A chapel prayer service
- A meeting with Level Teachers to review handbook and policies
- A meeting with the guidance department
- A meeting with Coach Ken Sears to review expectations of conduct. Note: during this assembly,
 Coach Sears will conduct the Archdiocesan-mandated Child Protection/Safe Environment
 presentation which informs students about the dangers of abuse, how to prevent it, and what to do if it is suspected. Please discuss this with your son.

Enrollment: We open this year with a near record enrollment – more than I had planned. Please stress with your son that you are giving him a gift by sending him to Saint Paul's – a gift that is wanted by others. Stress with him the obligation to make the most of the gift he is being given. Stress with him that attending Saint Paul's is a privilege and not a right. He can lose the privilege by making poor choices.

Telephone/Email Info: A listing of all SPS staff phone extensions/email addresses is posted on our new website.

Saint Paul's Cafeteria: Please note the following:

- Breakfast is served from 7:10 to 7:40 daily. The cost is \$1 a bargain.
- Lunch is served daily with a choice of hot lunch or sandwich lunch. The cost is \$2 another bargain.

- Money must be on account for a student to eat. Cash is not accepted on the serving line. Personnel will accept payment on Aug 5-7 (between 7-3:30 on Aug 5 and between 7-2:00 on Aug 6-7) and register (fingerscan) new students. A separate check must be brought to the cafeteria.
- Parents may sign up for ON-LINE payments which will also allow them to see a complete record of everything their son is buying. Go to http://www.schoolcafe.org/ and follow directions.
- FREE or REDUCED LUNCH/BREAKFAST: There is no stigma to apply for free / reduced lunch. NO ONE knows but the cafe manager. Request forms from me or the cafeteria manager. NEW: You may also apply online for free / reduced lunch by following these steps:
 - ✓ Go to www.Applyforlunch.com (or access the link from our website www.schoolcafe.org)
 - ✓ Click on "Start your Online Application"
 - ✓ Enter your Zip Code or State and select "Archdiocese of New Orleans" as the district.
 - ✓ Follow the wizard and use the guided help along the way
 - ✓ Continue to select "next" at the bottom of the page and "submit" when completed.

Should you list an email address, you receive an email confirmation that your application has been submitted. If you have any questions regarding Online Applications, please contact (504)596-3440 or (504)596-3434. Meal eligibility applications should be received prior to the 30th day of school or current meal benefits may change. **Students may also receive a free lunch by offering to help serve lunch during the lunch period.**

We are adding an additional "Grab n Go" serving line this year which will be outside to make things go even faster.

Attendance: The State of Louisiana limits the number of days a student may miss (whether excused or unexcused) and still receive credit. Saint Paul's adheres to these regulations. Consult the handbook.

Important Tax Info: The Louisiana Department of Revenue reminds parents that back-to-school shopping can qualify for a \$5,000 per-dependent tax deduction on their state tax returns next year by saving receipts. Items such as uniforms, supplies and TUITION are eligible for tax breaks on the income tax forms due May 15, 2013. The maximum deduction is \$5,000 per dependent student, he said. While there, I was waiting in line at a food stand and a group of kids, probably around 4th-6th grade and all wearing bright yellow shirts, got in the next line over...nothing out of the ordinary, just a typical school field trip. As the Spanish say, ino pasa nada! One of the kids turned and I read the front of his shirt; LA SALLE, with a star in the middle. I thought, "could these really be kids from another Lasallian school ...that I've happened to come across...in a food line...at a theme park...halfway across the world?" I decided to quell my curiosity by striking up a conversation with one of the boys in the group. After some pleasantries, I asked him what the LaSalle on his shirt meant, and he told me it was his school. I asked him if it was a Catholic school, to which he responded yes, and then asked if they prayed every day, and he said of course! By now, practically the entire group had paused to listen to the conversation between their friend and this foreigner. I looked at him, and said, "Acordémonos... (Let us remember)" to which the ENTIRE group of kids looked at me and said, "de que estamos en la Santa presencia de Dios (that we are in the holy presence of God)." I couldn't believe that had just happened, took a step back, and they were all still looking at me, seemingly more perplexed than I was. So I continued, "San Juan Bautista de la Salle...", and they answered "Ruega por nosotros! (Pray for us!)," and I concluded with "¡Viva Jesús en nuestros corazones! (Live Jesus in our hearts)," and they immediately and energetically responded "¡Por siempre!" The surprise at this chance interaction was mutual. The kids remained silent, trying to figure out just who I was and how I knew their prayer. I explained that I was from the United States and went to a Lasallian high school there, with the same prayers, mission, and core values of faith, service, and community. They told me how awesome that was and I assured them that it was even more awesome for me, seeing how even though we were completely different, we were able to make a connection with just a few words -- a truly fascinating manifestation of the universality of the Lasallian community. After I received my drink, I turned back around and smiled, the first boy I had talked to gave me a high-five, and I wished them a fun day in the park and said goodbye. This certainly made the rest of my day at the theme park even more enjoyable. Like I said, life never ceases to amaze me!
