The President/Principal's Newsletter for August 12-18, 2013

Welcome to the first full week of the 2013-14 school year. Due to hard work of many and the cooperation of all, we've had a mostly smooth opening. Thanks!

Last Tuesday's faculty meeting prayer service provided me with several memorable moments. Brother Louis Welker, one of our retired Brothers, urged the faculty to work "together and by association" and reminded us of the following words from Saint John Baptists de La Salle:

Be convinced that you plant and water the seed, but it is God who makes it grow; he is the One who brings your work to fulfillment. So, when you encounter difficulty in the guidance of your students, when some who do not profit from your teaching and you observe a reckless spirit in them, turn to God with confidence. Earnestly ask God to make his Spirit alive in you since he has chosen you to do His work.

After Brother Louis spoke, Student Council President David Conroy told the faculty of the need to model the behaviors we want in our students, because teenagers are quick to reject those who employ a double standard. His words were almost exactly the same as St. La Salle, who said "preach by example, and practice before the eyes of the young what you wish them to accept." And David "pulled no punches" and had some of us squirming as he gave examples: using Edline, being punctual, abiding by our faculty dress code, etc. – the very things that we hound our students about.

I invite you to join us for a year of "planting and watering the seed" – most appropriate with all the landscaping going on. I invite you, too, to adopt our school's theme for the year: to do the ordinary in extraordinary ways. Through it all, though, remember that it is God who makes the seed, your children, grow. But we must do our parts. I exhorted the faculty to look at each of their students not as they are now (a seed) but what they are capable of becoming (strong, mature, fruit bearing flora!) And I invited them to look at themselves, not as we are now, but as they are capable of being if we practice what David enjoined us to do and which St. Benilde practiced in his life – doing the ordinary in extraordinary ways.

Let's pray for and support each other as we begin this ministry together and by association, thus continuing the Lasallian tradition of transforming lives since 1680.

In 1941, he was arrested by the Nazis and sent to the concentration camp at Auschwitz, where on July 31, 1941, in reprisal for one prisoner's escape, ten men were chosen to die. Father Kolbe offered himself in place of a young husband and father. He was the last to die, enduring two weeks of starvation, thirst, and neglect. He was canonized by Pope John Paul II in 1982.

- Navajo Code Talkers Day: Today celebrates the young Navajo men who transmitted secret communications on the battlefields of WWII and played a vital role in helping America win the war.

School Picture Ordering Problems: I'm sorry that many of you had problems opening the order form that the photographer sent. If you want to order your son's school pictures, there's an easily opened order form on the school's website (www.stpauls.com) under "news" (lower left.) We also have order forms in the administration building. **It's not too late to order**. You can see what the pictures will look like by asking your son to show you his ID card that he received last week – if he hasn't lost it!

Phone Problems: We had phone problems last week so I apologize if you had trouble reaching us. We think all of the problems are resolved now and we should be back to normal as far as phones are concerned.

Internet Problems: Last spring we ordered a significant upgrade to our bandwidth in order to better accommodate the needs of our students. The company promised the work would be completed by the start of school. They did not live up to their promise and are scrambling now to complete the work — which is causing periodic outages in our service. They have said things will be completed this week. We'll see. In the meantime, we are practicing the virtue of patience.

New Cell Phone Policy: For better or worse, we have instituted a new policy: students may now use their phones during lunch but only outside. We were losing this battle so we made this concession – but we will be relentless in enforcing the no cell phone ban during class time and inside buildings. So if you need to call or text your son, do so during the lunch hour. With our new campus wide wi-fi, he can now use his phone to surf the internet if needed. And, yes, our security firewalls are in effect.

Student Email Addresses: We issued each student a unique Saint Paul's email address through which we will communicate with him. If a student asks about how to get to their new email, there's a link on Edline in the bottom right, it says **St. Paul's Gmail access.** The temporary password for all students is **stpauls1**.

Botanical Wolves: Our parent group continues to beautify the campus and now seeks to enlist student help. If students wish to earn on-campus service hours, they may do so by joining the Botanical Wolves

on Wednesdays after school to water and weed the new plant beds. We hope many students will help make our campus even more beautiful.

ALERT St. Tammany: If you haven't registered for this, I encourage you to do so. It will inform you when any event poses a threat to us. With ALERT St. Tammany, the Parish can inform you, by phone, based on your geographical location in the Parish, when your safety or well-being is at risk. Evacuation orders, security issues and health threats are among some of the reasons they would feel it necessary to use the Alert St. Tammany. Your information will be used only for this purpose. You can access the self-registration page at https://stpgov.onthealert.com/ and enter your contact info. I've signed up and will have the school react accordingly. We hope, though, that the service never has to be used.

Sports Passes: Clarification from Athletic Director Craig Ketelsen: We will sell our sports passes again this year to those who wish to purchase them. They are intended for those families who attend Varsity, JV, 9th, and/or 8th grade games to help defray some of the costs of being a fan. However, anyone who wishes to may purchase a sports pass. As always, the passes are good for 4 tickets to all regular season home varsity football games and general admission for you and your immediate family to all other contests. The passes **cannot** be used for the following:

1-SPS scrimmage vs. John Curtis, August 21. This is a football fund-raiser so your entry fee will support the football program.

2 – The Christian Brothers Jamboree, August 30. Due to contract obligations with Rummel, we are unable to use our sports passes for this contest.

Traffic Flow on Campus: If you drop off or pick up your son you are now aware of the congestion on the roadways in the morning and afternoon around our campus. We would like to ask your help in improving the traffic flow and safety. Please do the following:

- Consider an alternate pick up location for your son other than Founder's Circle. These include the drop off area by the Gene Bennett Sports Complex, the parking lot on the corner of 13th and Jefferson St. or the parking lot at LaSalle Hall on 11th Avenue. You can drive through these parking lots or wait in a parking space there without holding up traffic elsewhere.
- DO NOT pick up your son using the shoulder of 11th Avenue. This is a dangerous area with poor visibility and further backs up traffic when you stop to load or unload.
- If you use the LaSalle Drive (main entrance) car line, please wait to the left so that thru traffic can still move through our campus using the right lane.
- Coordinate with your son about where and when you will meet him in the afternoon. If he is not present when you drive through, please proceed to a parking lot and wait for him there. If you stop in the car line to wait, you are holding up all cars behind you.
- Remind your son to be on the lookout for your car as you drive up.

Our primary concern is safety, so please adhere to all speed limit and traffic rules in the school area. We are working closely with the Covington Police Department to find solutions to traffic around school. Working together we can improve both safety and circulation around our campus.

Our First Neighborhood Complaint: I received our first neighborhood complaint on Friday afternoon about student driving after school, especially students exiting from the new parking lot on Jefferson and 14th. We will take disciplinary action against students driving inappropriately – including possible loss of driving to school privilege. Take heed!

New Parent Reception & Information Meeting: A welcome reception and information meeting for **new parents** will be held on Mon, Aug. 19 at 6:30 pm in the Briggs Assembly Center. The reception begins at 6:30 pm and an information meeting starts at 7:00 which will be over by 8:00. We hope you will be with us! I'll send out more info this week.

Orientation: Please discuss with your son the four assemblies he had last week and through Tuesday of this week:

- A chapel prayer service
- A meeting with Level Teachers to review handbook and policies
- A meeting with the counseling department
- A meeting with Coach Ken Sears to review expectations of conduct. Note: during this assembly,
 Coach Sears will conduct the Archdiocesan-mandated Child Protection/Safe Environment
 presentation which informs students about the dangers of abuse, how to prevent it, and what to do if it is suspected. Please discuss this with your son.

Enrollment: Last week I reported that we would open with a near record enrollment. I was wrong. We actually opened with a record enrollment! Thank you! Please stress with your son that you are giving him a gift by sending him to Saint Paul's – a gift that is wanted by others. Stress with him the obligation to make the most of the gift he is being given. Stress with him that attending Saint Paul's is a privilege and not a right. He can lose the privilege by making poor choices.

Telephone/Email Info: A listing of all SPS staff phone extensions/email addresses is posted on our new website.

Saint Paul's Cafeteria: Please note the following:

- Breakfast is served from 7:10 to 7:40 daily. The cost is 1 a bargain.
- Lunch is served daily with a choice of hot lunch or sandwich lunch. The cost is \$2 another bargain.
- Money must be on account for a student to eat. Cash is not accepted on the serving line.
- Parents may sign up for ON-LINE payments which will also allow them to see a complete record of everything their son is buying. Go to http://www.schoolcafe.org/ and follow directions.
- FREE or REDUCED LUNCH/BREAKFAST: There is no stigma to apply for free / reduced lunch. NO ONE knows but the cafe manager. Request forms from me or the cafeteria manager. NEW: You may also apply online for free / reduced lunch by following these steps:
 - ✓ Go to www.Applyforlunch.com (or access the link from our website www.schoolcafe.org)
 - ✓ Click on "Start your Online Application"
 - ✓ Enter your Zip Code or State and select "Archdiocese of New Orleans" as the district.
 - ✓ Follow the wizard and use the guided help along the way
 - ✓ Continue to select "next" at the bottom of the page and "submit" when completed.

Should you list an email address, you receive an email confirmation that your application has been submitted. If you have any questions regarding Online Applications, please contact (504)596-3440 or (504)596-3434. Meal eligibility applications should be received prior to the 30th day of school or current meal benefits may change. **Students may also receive a free lunch by offering to help serve lunch during the lunch period.**

We added an additional outside "Grab n Go" serving line this year to make things go even faster.

Important Tax Info: The Louisiana Department of Revenue reminds parents that back-to-school shopping can qualify for a \$5,000 per-dependent tax deduction on their state tax returns next year by saving receipts. Items such as uniforms, supplies and TUITION are eligible for tax breaks on the income tax forms due May 15, 2013. The maximum deduction is \$5,000 per dependent student, he said. Extracurricular Activities: Clubs and teams are already forming. Encourage your son to get involved. Research shows correlations between academic achievement and extracurricular involvement.

Silent Sustained Reading: On Monday, we begin daily SSR (Sustained Silent Reading) during the first 15 minutes of Block 2. During this time, everyone in the school (students, teachers, administrators, and staff) will read silently for 15 minutes. This is not a time for homework, tutoring, studying textbooks or doing assigned reading, but is designed to make reading a school-wide priority by reading for pleasure. We hope to develop a population of self-motivated readers. The program was created over 30 years ago at the University of Vermont and over the years has resulted in increased vocabulary development, reading fluency and comprehension, writing quality, improved standardized test scores, increased background knowledge on a wide range of topics, and increased reading time out of school. Students were instructed to bring their own reading material but we will have classrooms stocked with magazines, novels, short stories, etc. Help your son prepare for this initiative and have him come prepared on Monday and every day thereafter. You might want to consider initiating a family SSR time, too! I'll keep you posted as to how things go.

Student – Parent Handbook: The signature card indicating that you and your son have read and agree to abide by the Handbook is overdue. It can be found on our web site home page under "news."

Cafeteria: Again, for those families experiencing difficult financial times, the free and reduced lunch/breakfast program can help. **Applications can be picked up from me or the cafeteria manager**. This does not embarrass your son as no one knows. It's all very confidential. Also, even if a student doesn't qualify for free/reduced lunch/breakfast, he can receive a free meal by helping to serve in the lunch line. It actually can be fun – I do it occasionally myself! Have your son approach me if he is interested.

Lost &Found: We are already finding shirts, books, lunch boxes, etc. left around campus. PLEASE stress responsibility with your. And please CLEARLY mark his clothing with his name to facilitate return of lost items. BTW, the lost and found locker is located outside the School Attendance Office.
