 - 09.2% of high school boys made a plan as to how they would attempt suicide during the past year.
 - According to Dr. Lloyd Kolbe, former Director of Adolescent School Health at the CDC, behaviors and attitudes developed during childhood are responsible for most causes of death, illness & disability, in the US.
 - So what is a Lasallian school's response to the above? For Saint La Salle, the school was a place of safety and salvation. He would accept nothing less. As we work with our students, we attempt to be attuned to ALL of their safety issues: physical, mental, social, and spiritual. And let's help them stay healthy!

His work won the hearts of his students by his care for their spiritual and professional development. He died at 52 with a reputation for sanctity. Teen Life Counts: Our annual suicide prevention program begins this week with the sophomores and continues over the next two weeks. The two part program will teach students how to identify the warning signs of depression and suicide, how to talk to a troubled friend, and where to go for help. They are also taught the importance of breaking a secret to save a life and the danger of alcohol and substance abuse, particularly by those who are depressed or suicidal. Please contact the Counseling Department should you have any questions or concerns regarding this program.

This program is important. We have already dealt with a couple of students this year who either wrote or voiced suicidal thoughts. And we are still one of our students whose sister committed suicide in Aug. We take seriously ANY written or voiced suicide thought. Our policy is to contact parents immediately, stay with the student until a parent arrives, and excuse the student from class until cleared by a mental health professional. St. Tammany Parish continues to have an unusually high rate of suicide, and we must do all we can to prevent it. Thanks to Counselor Caroline Cheatwood for organizing and for Mrs. Mimi Voelkel and Jewish Family Services for putting on this program.

If anyone is interested in volunteering with the Teen Life Counts school-based suicide awareness and intervention program, please contact Mimi Voelkel at mvoelkel@ charter.net. Once trained, volunteers will be asked to present the program in high schools throughout the Greater New Orleans area.

Mock Crash: Another leading cause of teenage deaths is auto accidents. Last year at this time, our juniors and seniors witnessed a mock crash due to impaired driving. It was powerful. The State of Education: The College Board recently released its 2013 SAT Report on College & Career Readiness. The report reveals that fewer than half (43% to be exact) of all SAT takers in the high school class of 2013 were academically prepared for the rigors of college-level course work. This number has remained virtually unchanged during the last five years. From the report: With our country struggling to compete in the global marketplace — and with millions of skilled jobs left unfilled — there is a heightened focus on understanding how our students are performing academically and in ensuring that they are college and career ready. While some might see stagnant scores as no news, the College Board considers them a call to action. These scores can and must change. Read the complete

I informed them that once again, an SPS mom who has had five sons graduate from Saint Paul's, has given us hundreds of hundreds of rosaries for free distribution through religion classes. I encouraged them to keep a rosary in their pockets and pray a "Hail Mary" or decade when waiting or walking. We are grateful to this SPS mom for fostering our devotion to Mary!

- Recognized and congratulated junior Beau Briggs who did something pretty phenomenal for a young man: donated over \$10,000 to two local charities (the Covington Food Bank and the Kelly Gibson Foundation,) through his golfing efforts. Beau obtained pledges for each eagle or birdie he made at his tournaments last summer. Beau chose The Covington Food Bank because it is an organization that focuses on helping impoverished families in the Greater Covington area. He has volunteered in the past for this worthy cause and has seen the impact it makes on the community. He knows the Covington Food Bank makes a difference in many peoples' lives. He chose The Kelly Gibson Foundation because it is a community-driven charity dedicated to improving the lives of those who live in New Orleans and the surrounding areas with an emphasis on supporting children's athletic programs, first responders and military initiatives. 
