- Columbus Day Observed
- **TDIH:** In 1913, for the first time, Henry Ford's entire Highland Park, MI automobile factory is run on a continuously moving assembly line. We've come a long way, Henry!

Tue, Oct 8 (Pack Time; C D E F)

- Alvin C. York Day: Sgt. York is the most decorated American soldier in World War I. From the Sgt. York website: On Oct 8, 1918, after being pinned down, York took his fateful walk into history. He and 16 other soldiers... were given the unenviable task of silencing the machine guns that halted the advance. It was a cold, wet morning. Rain mixed with sleet added to the gloom of the fog that draped the landscape. As the soldiers worked their way around the hill, the men on the left flank stood exposed in the creek bottom. German machine gunners opened fire, wounding or killing nine Americans, including York's best friend. York was on the right flank beneath the crest of the hill in a natural depression, which he used to kill nine of the men who operated the guns. In the meantime, his comrades opened fire on the Germans, and in a few minutes 25 were dead. The Germans surrendered to what they thought was a superior force, and York and the American survivors escorted 132 prisoners to American forces some 10 miles away. Sergeant York was awarded his nation's highest decoration, the Medal of Honor, for his actions [that day.]
- Face Your Fears Day: Consider what life might be like if you conquered some of your greatest fears. Face Your Fears Day gives you the chance to stand up to your fears, overcome them, and to seize the day.
- National Pierogie Day: Pierogies are Eastern Europe's equivalent of ravioli or tortellini essentially

Today is the feast of the Christian Brother Martyrs of Turon, canonized by Pope John Paul II: Saint Brothers Cirilo Bertrán, Marciano José, Julián Alfredo, Victoriano Pío, Benito de Jesus, Benjamin Julián, Augusto Andrés, Aniceto Adolfo and Saint Father Inocencio. From the Brothers' website: In 1934, Turón was the center of anticlerical hostility. The Brothers' school was an irritant to radicals in charge because of the religious influence it exerted. The Brothers defied the ban on teaching religion & openly escorted students to Mass. On the First Fri of Oct, authorities broke into the Brothers' house on the pretext that arms were hidden there. They and their chaplain were arrested and marched to the cemetery where they were shot. Brother Cirilo, the Director, was 46 and Brother Marciano was 39. Brother Julián was 32 and all the rest were in their twenties. They were arrested.

Year of Faith: On Oct 11 of last year, Pope Benedict XVI declared

a Year of Faith that will end Nov 24. As stated above in TDIH, Oct 11 marks the 51st anniversary of the opening of the Second Vatican Council and the 21st anniversary of the Catechism of the Catholic Church. Police & Principals: At our monthly meeting last week, the Covington PD advised that the city (and the whole area) is experiencing a rash of car burglaries. In almost every case, cars were unlocked. Lock your cars. SPS was commended for Safety Week. While all schools had done lockdowns, we were the only city school to have done a complete set of drills, especially the evacuation drill. I thanked CPD for their assistance with heavy traffic events over the next two weeks: homecoming, J n R, Grandparent Day, & the Mandeville game.

Catholic Secondary Principal's Association of Archdiocese met last week at Archbishop Hannan High. Some issues:

In her transparent spirit, Superintendent Jan Lancaster explained the Office of Catholic Schools
operating budget. She also unveiled some financial strategies to help insure the viability of Catholic
schools.

• Admissions Process (surprise!): some principals are complaining that some high schools are violating policy by using Application Day testing as part of their admission process. The policy says that the test can only be used for placement, not admission. Heated discussion ensued on both sides of the issue. No resolution was achieved (surprise!) and it will be brought up again (joy!) at our next meeting. FYI, SPS uses the test for placement only. Other admissions issues surfaced – almost all of which involve the south shore only (thank you, God, for Lake Ponchartrain!) – and in one of my rare speaking moments at these meetings, I reminded my colleagues that the same issues we were discussing that day are the same issues we were discussing 20 years ago and some of the same proposals being brought forth are the same ones we discarded 20 years ago – in other words, the problems are insolvable and only made worse by a shrinking pool of students and the rise of the charter schools on the south shore.



• LHSAA (another surprise!): Executive Director Kenny Henderson met with us to discuss the latest meeting of the School Relations Committee – which has proposed some pretty radical propositions for the January LHSAA meeting. These include the elimination of traditional school attendance zones and making each parish an attendance zone. Thus any student in the parish could enroll here in 8th or 9th grade and become immediately eligible. Once school of first choice is declared, however, a transfer back to their home public school would make them ineligible for one year – a very different situation from today. Also, "in system" administrative transfers

would be allowed. For example, if a student from SPS wanted to transfer to Hannan or a Jesuit student wanted to transfer to Holy Cross, as long as both principals agreed, the student would be eligible (since SPS and Hannan and Jesuit and Holy Cross are all part of the same "system.") What would not be allowed, however, without losing an eligibility year, is cross parish transfers. Thus a Jesuit student could not transfer to Rummel without penalty as those two schools, while in the same system, are in different parishes. Confusing? You bet! Another proposal would let each classification (5A, 4A, etc) decide on the "select v. non-select" football playoff system. Mr. Henderson also said that as yet, no proposal seeking to expand the "select v. non-select" playoff system to other sports has been proposed. It was a VERY interesting part of the meeting. These all have to be voted on by LHSAA principals in January.

Lunch with the Arch: The Presidents (or principal where there is not a president) of the Catholic high schools lunched with Archbishop Gregory Aymond at his residence (very nice!) last Friday. The Archbishop continues to show a keen interest in and commitment to the high schools. While we have areas of disagreement (e.g. Sunday activities), our common Catholic commitment is strong. There was no official "agenda" to the meeting, but we discussed a number of topics, finances, admissions, and the future of Catholic education in the archdiocese.

Last Tue's Assembly: I hope the students enjoyed our Oct 01 assembly. Here's some of what we did:



- Then, miraculously, George Frideric Handel's *Water Music* started playing which signaled that it was time to recognize The SPS Swim Team, aka Aqua Wolves. I first told the students the story of the *Water Music*, how it was written by Handel for King George I of England. It was first played in 1717 when George I threw a party on his royal barge and sailed up the River Thames (I made sure the students knew how to pronounce "Thames.") George loved the music so much that insisted that Handel play it over and over the musicians were thus exhausted upon the completion of the trip.

The *Water Music* remains one of the most beloved and popular pieces of classical music and is used at SPS graduation, ring ceremony, and 8th grade promotion ceremonies as the recessional music.

As for the Aqua Wolves, here's the narrative written by Coach Bill Babcock which I read to the students about last week's meet: While the score showed a 110 to 60 edge to a very deep Mandeville team, the Aqua Wolves got their march towards a great state championship meet off to a great start by winning five of 11 events against the team that will be heavily favored to win the Northlake District meet this year. Super Sophomores Griffin Guzan and Harrison Prieto led the Wolves with double wins. Guzan captured the 200 individual medley and the 500 freestyle and Prieto dominated the 50 free and 100 backstroke. The Dynamic Duo teamed up with Junior Jacob Elliot and Senior Co-Captain Will Warwick to win the 200 medley relay in an eye popping 1:46.42, a very fast early season time. Other top three finishes were: Elliott - 3rd 100 breast stroke, freshman Kyle Hladky 3rd 100 fly, Warwick - 2nd 100 free & 3rd 200 free. The 400 free relay of Guzan, Elliott, Prieto and Warwick touched 2nd, and the 200 free relay of Hladky, Winston McDonald, William Munn and Jack Dubreuil stroked in at third.

- Recognized and congratulated junior **Ethan Rodriguez** for his recent achievements. Ethan came in 1st place in javelin at the local Junior Olympic qualifiers. He participated in the AAU Club Championships in Disney World at the beginning of July. Ethan placed 2nd in javelin with a throw of 156'11". On July 29, he participated in the Junior Olympics in Detroit, MI. He placed 1st in javelin with a throw of 161'3" and is the new 15-16 yr AAU National Champion for javelin. He also placed first at the AAU Regional Qualifiers at Tad Gormley Stadium in June.
- And then, as if by magic, Antonio Rossini's William Tell Overture started playing which signaled that our Cross Country Team was still accomplishing great things. In the Gulf Coast Stampede on Sept 14, Varsity finish 1st (with Zachary Albright, Eric Coston, DC Lipani, Spencer Albright, & Michael Burke finishing in the Top 20) and JV also finished 1st. In the Christian Brothers Invitational, the Varsity finished 1st and JV finish 1st did you expect anything else which Eric Coston, DC Lipani, Spencer Albright, Michael Burke & Nicholas Taylor finishing in the Top 10.
- I then had the students reflect on the Number 100 and how it holds so much importance. I then segued into Coach Ken Sears' 100 varsity victory as SPS head football coach in our recent win over Jesuit. Here are the stats I presented to the students which Ken Sears has accumulated in his 15 years as head football coach:

 - o AD Craig Ketelsen and players **Ross Hodgins, Justin Sciortino, and Matthew Clark** then presented Coach Sears with some appropriate gifts on this special occasion: a football signed by the current team, a small plaque, and a beautiful framed poster of photos of Coach and his teams, courtesy of team photographer Joey Michel.
