Thank you teachers and thank you Christian Brothers for making my years at Saint Paul's the best years of my life.

Important Driver's License Requirement: Effective September 16, a new requirement was added to the driver's license issuance process for all minor applicants. My Wolf Pack was absolutely focused on the film and not a sound was made during the viewing. When it was over, I asked them why we showed this video. Their responses were spot on: to show us how much we have; to show us never to give up; to show us how much we can achieve no matter what the circumstances. With a lump in my throat and a tear in my eye, I told them that I needed to start thanking God for the important things: my arms, my legs, my eyes, my ears, my health, my mind. Suicide Prevention: As the culminating activity of the sophomore suicide prevention program, Mrs. Kristi Hart and her son, sophomore Christian Jarrett, will speak to all the sophomores this week in World History classes. As I hope you know, Mrs. Hart lost her daughter and Christian his sister to suicide last July, after a battle with drug addiction. Mrs. Hart and Christian want to tell Kaycee's story as a lesson for us all. It should be a powerful presentation, and I hope our sophomores speak with their families about it. We pray that good comes to our students from hearing the story of Kaycee and that no other family will experience the pain of losing a loved one in this manner. We have already dealt with several suicide ideations this year from students who feel that their problems are overwhelming. Again, our protocol calls for taking ANY mention of suicide seriously: we call parents, and the student must undergo screening by a mental health professional before he can return to school. Parents, please speak with your sons about this important topic.

The Good, the Bad, and the Ugly Department:

- The Good: 98% (maybe even 99%) of what's going on at SPS!
- **The Bad:** We've had five students in the past five weeks suffer an attack of appendicitis. SPS has a Medical Advisory Team, composed of several local physicians. We consulted with them and they have assured us that no environmental conditions cause appendicitis. Thus, there is nothing at SPS

contributing to this. The doctors have assured us that the young men had to have had weakened immune systems which allowed bacteria or virus to bypass the body's natural immune systems and inflame the appendix. Fortunately, the laparoscopic surgery being used gets the young men up and running in no time. For that, we give thanks to God. A football player actually was back in action two weeks later! We will continue to monitor the situation and consult with our physician resources.

• **The Ugly:** I've deliberately waited a couple of weeks to write about this – and my focus is not on the "who" but the "what." Please make it your focus as well.

We suspended and imposed other consequences on a student recently for cyber bullying. Coach Sears and I were shown stuff written about another student on Instagram (which I have no clue what it is or how to use it) which absolutely crossed the line of human decency. I will not tolerate this. The irony? The "cyber bully" is ordinarily a wonderfully good, caring, and responsible young man who has done very well here. I NEVER would have thought he would do something like this. Students are just not realizing how this stuff will come back to haunt them. It is not anonymous; it is not harmless; it is not socially acceptable; it will come back to haunt them.

Parents, I again URGE you to check your son's Twitter, Vine, Instagram, Facebook and whatever other social media accounts that he may have. Discuss proper use with him. Explain how this can follow him for years. And he may not even tell you he has these accounts or that he uses them properly. Ask for proof. People are showing me "tweets" (I don't understand how to do this either!) and I'm shocked at the language being used. I can't imagine that parents would allow their sons to write like that. And I'm probably only seeing the "milder" stuff! My heart is heavy.... but we'll take action whenever a student crosses the line and it is brought to our attention – which we encourage parents and students to do when they are the victims of such unacceptable conduct.

PLEASE: Our Attendance Office is being taxed to the max. Under ordinary circumstances, it is difficult enough to keep track of the students. When you call Erin and request "immediate" dismissal for a student, it places an unfair burden on her. If a student must leave school early, please send a written note with your student and have him check in with the attendance office when he comes to school to get a dismissal slip for the time requested. This is the policy in our handbook – which you pledged to uphold at the beginning of the year when you signed. And we just can't stop everything to deliver an assignment, a lunch, a message – we just don't have the personnel. Thanks for understanding.
