



The President/Principal's Newsletter for Nov 18 – Dec 01, 2013



In school & country, we are blessed with abundance. And so my final pre-Thanksgiving message concerns the same one I give each year at this time: the Lasallian commitment to the poor.

This commitment to the poor began with John Baptist de La Salle. The first schools were endowed parish charity schools, operating on shoestring budgets and often located in less desirable parts of town. Both rich and poor were welcome, provided all agreed to be treated as equals – revolutionary in those days! All were important.

Equally revolutionary was de La Salle's insistence on partiality. We often speak of the need for impartiality in dealings with students. Actually, St. de La Salle was very partial. Partiality was shown to those with less attractive qualities; they were to receive the most attention. Those with the least talents were to be supported and encouraged. Those who had extra food were to share it with those who had little. De La Salle was convinced that the poor needed the schools the most. The curriculum, therefore, combined practical & religious training, designed to help the poor succeed. Thus, service to the poor, both directly and indirectly, must be present at SPS if we are to be faithful Lasallians.

But it's not just Saint La Salle's thinking that compels us to care for the poor. Indeed, the **Concern for the Poor and Social Justice** is at the heart of Catholic social teaching. The United States bishops write: *In a world characterized by growing prosperity for some and pervasive poverty for others Catholic teaching proclaims that a basic moral test is how our most vulnerable members are faring. In a society marred by deepening divisions between rich and poor, our tradition recalls the story of the Last Judgment (Mt 25:31-46) and instructs us to put the needs of the poor and vulnerable first.*

As we prepare for Thanksgiving, let us be mindful of those who are not blessed with material comfort. Let us strive to reach out to them. Let us find ways to welcome them to SPS.

- **TDI H:** In 1691, things were not going well in the newly found Institute of the Brothers of the Christian Schools. I quote from Brother Donald Mouton, a Lasallian scholar: *The group of teachers founded by John Baptist de La Salle was in a precarious situation. Personal antagonisms, opposition to the Founder's work, internal problems, and fragile health that almost led to his death toward the end of 1690 posed critical questions for De La Salle as to the very future of his enterprise. In this crisis, De La Salle decided to bind himself by vow with two other Brothers, Nicolas Vuyart and Gabriel Drolin, to establish the Society of the Christian Schools at whatever the cost might be, even if all others should abandon it. This “vow of association and union” pronounced on November 21, 1691, often referred to as the “heroic vow” was an act of hope at a time when the work of De La Salle and the early Brothers was in serious jeopardy.* Today, when times seem tough, the Brothers often refer to this milestone in our history. We give thanks for the “heroic vow”! Because of it, we're still around!
- **Great American Smokeout Day:** The American Cancer Society marks the 38th GAS Day today by encouraging smokers to use today to plan to quit, or to plan in advance and quit smoking that day. By quitting — even for one day — smokers will be taking an important step towards a healthier life — one that can lead to reducing cancer risk. And let's extend this to e-smoking, too! Remember,

- Recognized and congratulated **The Dire Wolf, our Ultimate Frisbee Team.** Senior David Conroy gave a brief presentation about the team. Last season was a rebuilding year under the leadership of David. The team had moderate success finishing 2nd in the Beowulf tournament, 3rd in the BRHS

Ogre Open, 13th in the south's premier spring tournament in Atlanta, and 3rd in the State Championships. This season the Wolf has 2 teams, both varsity and junior varsity, and is off to a fast start with a 9 and 3 record losing only to Catholic High. The team breezed through bracket play in the Beowulf Classic on Oct. 26th, losing in the finals to Catholic, 9-7 in overtime. The junior varsity did very well considering their 2 and 3 record, besting Catholic's JV and Rummel's varsity, so the future bodes well for the WOLF. This past weekend, a lean pack of 11 wolves made a lengthy early morning commute to Mansura, La to play in the 2nd Annual Leif Ericson Fall Classic hosted by Avoyelles Charter School. With bracket wins over Jesuit and Avoyelles and a loss to Catholic, St. Pauls faced a familiar pesky foe in Baton Rouge HS in the semifinals. The low scoring duel went to sudden death with the Dire Wolf prevailing 9-8 in a 75 minute thriller. In the finals against Catholic, the pack was outmanned having only 2 subs to use, compared to Catholics constant replacing of full teams of fresh legs throughout the match. Catholic led at half by only one point. St. Pauls could only do so much in the second half as the game wore on. The Dire Wolf became the cramping, limping, tired Wolf falling 13-7 in a gallantly fought competitive game. The Dire Wolf is led by Captains David Conroy and Joe Tanner. The entire Dire Wolf team then stood and we gave them a rousing round of applause.

- Then, miraculously, George Frideric Handel's *Water Music* started playing – which signaled that it was time to recognize The SPS Swim Team, aka Aqua Wolves. The Greater New Orleans Metro Swimming Championships at UNO on Nov 1 & 2, showcased the talents of swimmers from over 30 high schools in the Metro New Orleans area. The AquaWolves showed they were rounding into championship form this past weekend, breaking two team records, winning two individual events and finishing in a dead-heat tie for fourth place with Rummel:
 - The 200 medley relay of **Harrison Prieto, Jacob Elliott, Griffin Guzan and Will Warwick**, finished 2nd setting a new team record.
 - **Griffin Guzan** finished second in the 200 individual medley and became only the third St. Paul's swimmer to break two minutes in this event.
 - **Harrison Prieto** finished a strong 12th in the 50 free with a 23.56 clocking.
 - In the 100 butterfly, **Kyle Hladky**, qualified for the state meet finishing 11th.
 - In finals, **Guzan** raced his specialty like a man on a mission, crushing the field, shattering his school record and inching ever closer to his goal of All American consideration.
 - In the 200 freestyle relay **Jack Dubreuil, William Munn, Kyle Hladky and Jacob Elliott finished** 11th with every swimmer a full second under their personal best times.
 - In the 100 back, freshman **Kyle Hladky** swimming his third intense race of the meet, held on to 16th place with a 1:02.16.
 - The finals were a very special moment for **Harrison Prieto** who earned a Metro Championship.
 - Moving to the 100 breast stroke, **Senior Co-Captain Will Warwick** stroked in at 15th place, picking valuable team points going into the final 400 freestyle relay.
 - The quartet of **Guzan, Hladky, Prieto and Warwick** were primed and ready to finish the meet on a high note. All four raced to personal best times, dropping their prelim seed time three seconds to a 3:29.30 and moving up one place to fifth.

The final score had the AquaWolves tied for fourth, which also ties our highest finish ever in these championships. The team is ready for state which takes place at the end of this week.

- Ran out of time before I could do any more recognitions – which will “roll over” to the next assembly! (Yes, I’ve got Eagle Scout material, confirmations, and many other things on my list!) But before we dismissed, I again reminded the students of the meaning of Veterans Day. I asked them to respectfully stand and to sing a rousing, but respectful, rendition of Our National Anthem. And, wow, did they! It was great!
- We then robustly sang the Fight Song for all of the activities going on around school.
- As the prayer candle was extinguished by junior **Lane Sumrall**, I reminded the students that they must leave the gym and be the Light of God to all whom they meet. The students exited to the strains of “The Stars and Stripes Forever.” It was a great assembly!
