# Echoes from the Past - Founders' Circle - Final Part


Continuation of the Founding Brothers' History

Founders' Circle



Brother Nauphary Marie (Joseph Cortial) – Brother Nauphary entered the junior novitiate in Vals in November 1892 and received the brothers garb at the noviate in Le Puy on October 28, 1900. He earned an elementary teacher's license and taught in France until the anti-religious laws of 1904 caused the closure of the schools. He was among the brothers that travelled to Mexico. He was in Monterrey, Mexico when the Carranza revolutionaries captured the city in July 1914 was arrested and imprisoned. Yielding to pressure from the foreign consuls in Monterrey, the governor released Brother Nauphary on the condition that he show up at the railroad station to be deported to the Texas border.

Brother Nauphary was sent to the New York District where he struggled to master English. In 1918 he was assigned to the community taking over the operation of Saint Paul's College in Covington. He managed fairly well teaching the lower elementary students. One of the novices wrote: "His English was terrible, but his conviction when he talked to us about spiritual matters and the spirit of St. John Baptist de La Salle left us with the impression that he was living what he spoke about." In 1940 has was assigned to De La Salle in Lafayette where he stayed until he died.

Brother Nilammon (Jean B. Laurent) – Brother Nilammon was born on February 23, 1874 in the Loire Valley, France and received his religious habit on November 24, 1890. He too was driven from Mexico during the Carranza Revolution of 1914. After leaving Mexico, he was assigned to one of the schools in Las Vegas, New Mexico. He arrived at Saint Paul's from Las Vegas on June 25, 1918 as the first director of Saint Paul's College. His task was to recruit students to the new school. Brother Nilammon was shy and was not equipped with the necessary skills needed for Public Relations. He was a great success with the prefects and students, but no so much with the brothers. After two years, he was




returned to Mexico where he worked as a procurator for the Province. He later returned to Europe where he died in a retirement home in Le Puy in 1966.





# Echoes from the Past - Founders' Circle - Final Part (cont)



Brother Osmond Paul (Pierre Charbonnet) – Brother Osmond Paul was born on January 18, 1885 in Cubelles (Sauges) France. He entered the novitiate in Le Puy on May 29, 1901 and received the religious habit on July 2, 1901. He taught in France until 1909 and then joined his brothers in Queretaro, Mexico. He left with them during the Carranza Revolution in 1914 and taught in Syracuse, New York. In 1918 he was in the founding community that took over Saint Paul's College in Covington. He was the head prefect at that time. His stay was short for he was assigned to St. Peter's College in New Iberia, Louisiana in August of 1919. He returned to Saint Paul's in

1935 as the assistant principal and was appointed principal from 1935-1941. Brother Osmond started the first football game with Covington High School. Saint Paul's won 19-7. He taught in many of the schools of the district including Landry Memorial High in Lake Charles, Louisiana, Mullen High School in Denver, Colorado and Saint Michael's College in Sante Fe, New Mexico. He retired to De La Salle in Lafayette and died on February 16, 1974.



Brother Nanthier Prosper (Jean P. Alle') - Brother Nanthier was born on January 10, 1882 in the village of Chassagnes de Ribennes and entered the junior novitiate in Mende at the age of 16 and received his brother's garb in the novitiate in Le Puy on July 12, 1899. He earned an elementary teaching license and was one of the brothers that left France during the anti-religious laws of 1904 and moved to Mexico. When he was forced out of Mexico with his fellow brothers and priests in 1914, he then moved to San Francisco. In 1918, he was called to help with the running of Saint Paul's School in Covington. In 1923, he was sent to Lafayette until 1927 when he was assigned to Sante Fe, New Mexico. He provided health

care services to the students at Saint Michael's College for 22 years. In1949 he returned to Lafayette, Louisiana and died at the age of 87.





# The Saint Paul's School



Student Center Re-opens

It seemed, for a while, like no one at Saint Paul's wanted to talk about it. Teachers would avoid questions and few could find answers. But after

months of construction and renovations, the Student Center, which has been renamed the Briggs Assembly Center, is officially completed and was dedicated on Tuesday, February 19. On this day, all the students and faculty flooded into the remodeled building but could hardly fill the entire space. Although no square footage has been added to the building's footprint, religion classrooms that lined the side facing LaSalle Hall were removed to allow for a larger stage area and more space for hundreds of additional seats.

The Dedication Ceremony hosted many guests: David and Carolyn Briggs, their sons, Travis, Tyson '94, and Rhett '00, and members of the extended family, Covington Mayor Mike Cooper '71, the architects, Fauntleroy Latham Weldon Barre, who worked on the building, and members of the Board of Trustees of the school. Brother Ray Bulliard, FSC, Principal/President welcomed faculty, students and guests. The first official event in the remodeled building was the singing of the traditional hymn, "Rise Up, O Men of God." Saint Paul's Chaplain, Father Matthew Clark conducted the prayer service.

Anyone who has attended awards banquets, senior graduations, or masses from previous years at Saint Paul's might have noticed that the sound system in the Student Center simply did not get the job done. Its awkward echoes, and fluctuating volumes, could not harmoniously project the liturgical band's music or Brother Ken's piano to audiences, with the installation of a new sound system, which happens to be one of Brother Ray's favorite additions, The Briggs Assembly Center can rival any movie theater in sound quality. Junior Nicholas Sibley, who sings in the liturgical band, said, "The new sound system will definitely help show the hard work that the members of the liturgical band have put forth. Not only will it help us in our masses and prayer services, it will help in all other ceremonies held in the Briggs Assembly Center such as homecoming dances and senior graduation." We are grateful to PSX Audiovisual Technologies and Mobile One Auto Sound, Inc. for their diligence and donations.

Workers planted numerous bushes, flowers, and small trees and paved new sidewalks and parking spots around the building. A beautiful new façade mirrors the style of the recently renovated LaSalle Hall. The new drainage system will never again allow the green space in front of the main entrance to flood. Brother Ray put it best: "this latest renovation, which has fixed structural problems, expanded assembly space, modernized the amenities and beautified the appearance, will take us far in to the future."

The land upon this closed-in Briggs Assembly Center stands looked a lot different in the 1950s when hundreds of pine trees covered it. Despite challenging economic circumstances, the Christian Brothers of that time scraped enough money together to build a covered, open air structure to afford a place where the students could play basketball and games. Later as the school grew and grew, Principal Brother Cassian Lange, under much pressure and scrutiny, gave the Student Center walls making it a second gym. While we are spoiled today, the Student Center waited until the 1970s for air conditioning thanks to Principal, Brother David Sinitiere. Then finally in 1995, the generous donations of Doctor J. Robert Flautt, valedictorian of the Class of 1931, allowed for the expansion and modernization of this building and gave it its basic look of today.

But as of today, in 2013, Saint Paul's remembers David Briggs and his family whose generosity has allowed this latest renovation. Mr. Briggs has over the years constantly aided our school and made it a better place to grow up. With one of his grandsons currently attending Saint Paul's, sophomore Beau Briggs, Mr. Briggs is completely dedicated to the wellbeing of the school and will remain diligent in its support for years to come. Finally, in a special way, we remember Mr. Brigg's beloved mother. Mrs. Dorothy Davlin Briggs, who made great

Finally, in a special way, we remember Mr. Brigg's beloved mother, Mrs. Dorothy Davlin Briggs, who made great sacrifices to afford her children a faith based education. A plaque has been placed in the Briggs Assembly Center honoring her. Part of it reads, "Overcoming challenging life conditions, while clinging fervently to her Catholic Faith, Dorothy dedicated herself to her children and sacrificed greatly to assure their education within a Catholic school environment."

Saint Paul's School will constantly remember this family everyday as students pass by the building's doors.



## Faculty Retreat Day

"We stress to our students the importance of the Lasallian principle of service to others, so we ourselves should serve others," said junior chemistry teacher Jan Gardner. "Our example to our students says much more than our words."

The teachers put aside their textbooks and pencils and performed a wide array of jobs: painting, trimming, siding, hammering, roof decking, door and window installation, and many more duties necessary for the completion of a Habitat home.

This service day left a lasting impression on all the faculty of Saint Paul's school. Mrs. Jordan said, "This work simply felt good. I am glad I used my time for a worthwhile cause." Karen Hebert reflected, "This was a wonderful faculty retreat day. We were able to work together and, at the end of the day, see a finished project. Saint John Baptist De LaSalle, Founder of the Christian Brothers, said students learn best by example, so hopefully the example we set will encourage our students to reach into our community and help those in need, which is one of the five Lasallian Core Principles. Also, many of us were able to acquire some new skills; I know I have never hammered that many nails ever." Jan Gardner echoed Ms. Hebert's words: "Looking at the walled-in house I worked on was very gratifying because it made me feel that, in some small way, I had moved a family one step closer to having a house to call home. 
## Marian Players
