Gaudete! Rejoice! Advent is almost over! The coming of the Lord is near!

Last year I quoted Brother Tim Coldwell, Provincial of the New Orleans-Santa Fe Province of Christian Brothers, on the occasion of his Gaudete Sunday message to the Brothers. Since I had a rough week and am not in a rejoicing mood, his words are worth reading again as we enter the final week of the first semester (more reason for rejoicing):

Holiness isn't looking like we shower daily at Lourdes. It's doing the daily with enthusiasm, fervor and zest. Bring a smile and a laugh and a peace to your reading, teaching, administering, worshipping, counseling, socializing, or adoring. Fr. James Martin [a Jesuit writer] says it better: "Joy evangelizes!"

What a great Gaudete Sunday week thought! On this third week of Advent, therefore, when the pressures of semester's impending end, the rush of the holidays, my own personal challenges, and the world being filled with unspeakable acts of evil bring stress to us all, I must remember to rejoice – so whatever happens this week, I intend to "bring a smile and a laugh and a peace" to it – and I invite you to do the same as we look forward to Friday at 11 am! In that way, we will be holy! In that way, we will have Gaudeted (yes, I made up that word!) In that way, we will be better prepared for December 25. In that way, we will bring light to those whose lives are filled with gloom. Somehow, as difficult as it may be, we must rejoice!

Mon, Dec 16 – (Regular; E F G A; exam review in A)

- **TDIH:** In 1773, the "Boston Tea Party" occurs when a group of Massachusetts colonists disguised as Mohawk Indians board three British tea ships moored in Boston Harbor and dump 342 chests of tea into the water. If you think the ships were British or only a couple of dozen people were involved or the Boston Tea Party was a violent and reckless event, read on. The three ships holding the British tea were built in America and owned by Americans according to [Boston Tea Party Ships & Museums](#). The museum also states hundreds took part in the event, with 116 individuals taking credit for it. The Sons of Liberty carefully planned and executed the Boston Tea Party according to the museum, which could have attributed to the absence of violence and confrontation. The three-hour event occurred on Dec. 16, 1773, because "American colonists believed Britain was unfairly taxing them to pay for expenses incurred during the French and Indian War," according to Historic Tours of America.

But it was the first controlled, sustained flight in a heavier-than-air craft, one of the great moments of the century.

Santa Fe: Brother Ken and I survived the trip to Santa Fe. The city was gripped in a cold snap (16 degrees each morning!) and it snowed lightly each day. Our meeting was productive as we Brothers grappled with issues essential to our lives and our mission. After a long and intense day of meetings, we treated ourselves to dinner at my favorite restaurant – Maria's where I savored the chile rellenos. Thanks for keeping things together in the absence of Brother Ken and me. As nice as Santa Fe was, however, I

gave a prayer of thanks when Southwest Airlines flight 1262 touched down at Louis Armstrong Airport and I knew I would soon be back on the holy ground of Saint Paul's School.

The Clumsy, Gawkish, Lumbering President/Principal: After getting out of Brother Ken's car as we arrived from the airport on Mon night, I fell flat on my face on the concrete – and the concrete won. I have no one to blame but myself for not looking before leaping – something I preach constantly to the students.

Christmas Holidays: I worry about our students over the holidays b/c of the temptations to which they will be exposed. Parents, please take time to encourage your sons to make healthy choices over the holidays. Towards that end, I again offer the following from Psychemedics (our drug testing company) newsletter.

Study Confirms: Teen Marijuana Use Linked to Declines in IQ: *Teens who routinely smoke marijuana risk a long-term drop in their IQ, a new study suggests. The researchers didn't find the same IQ dip for people who became frequent users of pot after 18. "Parents should understand that their adolescents are particularly vulnerable," said lead researcher Madeline Meier of Duke University. Study participants from New Zealand were tested for IQ at age 13, likely before any significant marijuana use, and again at age 38. The mental decline between those two ages was seen only in those who started regularly smoking pot before age 18. Pot is the most popular illegal drug in the world. Within the United States, 23 percent of high school students said they'd recently smoked marijuana, making it more popular than cigarettes, the federal government reported in June. "I think this is the cleanest study I've ever read" that looks for long-term harm from marijuana use, said Dr. Nora Volkow, director of the National Institute on Drug Abuse, which helped fund the research. Meier and colleagues reported their work in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences. It was funded with governmental grants from the United States and Britain, and a foundation in Zurich. The study drew on survey data from more than 1,000 people in New Zealand. In addition to IQ tests, they were interviewed five times between ages 18 and 38, including questions related to their marijuana use. At age 18, 52 participants indicated they had become dependent on marijuana. Ninety-two others reported dependence starting at a later age. Researchers compared their IQ scores at age 13 to the score at age 38 and found a drop only in those who had become dependent by 18. Those deemed dependent in three or more surveys had a drop averaging 8 points. Among participants who'd been dependent at 18 and in at least one later survey, quitting didn't remove the problem. IQ declines showed up even if they'd largely or entirely quit using.*

Lost and Found: Last week, we had phones, wallet, watches, gym bags, and innumerable items of clothing turn in – especially sweatshirts, which tend to get shed when a cool morning warms up in the afternoon. It's discouraging how our students don't take care of their belongings. Please speak with your sons about responsible stewardship.

Responsible Stewardship: Last week, we had several students who found a large wad of money – and dutifully turned it in to Coach Sears. A senior turned in some cash wrapped up in a Sam's Club receipt that he found in the hallway – and turned it in to me. We had watches, wallets, phones, calculators turned in last week. Our lost and found brims with clothing, books, and especially sweatshirts and lunch boxes. Parents, please discuss **responsible stewardship** with your sons.

My Son's _____ Was Stolen: Yes, occasionally that happens – in spite of our best efforts to proclaim the 7th Commandment. Way more often, however, a student has misplaced the item and it's around school somewhere and found after a furious search. We constantly get students bringing found items to the office (see above). Last week, we had a student claim that his i-pad was stolen. He was adamant that it was stolen! When he called his mom, she informed him that the i-pad was at home. We get far more stories of honesty than theft. But we continue to be vigilant. Please discuss honesty with your son. If he needs something so badly that he's ready to steal, have him see me and I'll do my best to get it for him honestly – honest!

Uniform Shirts: We have a large number of pre-owned uniform shirts in good condition if your son has outgrown his and purchasing new ones is difficult for you. Just come to the Admin Bldg. Nothing will be done to embarrass your son. We also have a number of khaki pants available – all for the taking.

New Cafeteria Online Payment Vendor: The Archdiocese of New Orleans changed its online vendor. Beginning December 16, 2013, School Payment Solutions will be the new software solution for making payments to a student's cafeteria account. Access the cafeteria site as usual.

It's a Wonderful Life Rerun: I printed this last year but it's worth another read, as *IAWF* is one of those Christmas classics that many enjoy seeing over and over. And Ms. Charbonnet's Theater III (film) class studies Frank Capra's classic. Here's what Capra said about the film: *It's a Wonderful Life wasn't made for the oh-so bored critics or the oh-so jaded literati. It was my kind of film for my kind of people. ... A film to tell the weary, the disheartened, and the disillusioned; the wino, the junkie, the prostitute; those behind prison walls and those behind Iron Curtains, that no man is a failure. To show those born slow of foot or slow of mind, those oldest sisters condemned to spinsterhood, and those oldest sons condemned to unschooled toil, that each man's life touches so many other lives. And that if he isn't around it would leave an awful hole. A film that said to the downtrodden, the pushed around, the pauper, "Heads up, fella. No man is poor who has one friend. Three friends and you're filthy rich." A film that expressed its*

love for the homeless and the loveless; for her whose cross is heavy and him whose touch is ashes; for the Magdalenes stoned by hypocrites and the afflicted Lazaruses with only dogs to lick their sores. I wanted to shout to the abandoned grandfathers staring vacantly in nursing homes, to the always interviewed but seldom adopted half-breed orphans, to the paupers who refuse to die while medical vultures wait to snatch their hearts and livers, and to those who take cobalt treatments and whistle -- I wanted to shout, "You are the salt of the earth. And It's a Wonderful Life is my memorial to you!"

A Word about Exams: Semester exams begin on Dec 17. The schedule is posted on our web site under “news” and also at the end of this newsletter. Remember that exams are SEMESTER exams which will cover the entire semester. The **semester grade** (the only grade that counts in GPA and the only grade on the transcript) will be averaged in the following manner: 40% for Quarter 1; 40% for Quarter 2; 20 % for the semester exam. Encourage your son, therefore, to take his exams seriously. **It's time to start reviewing.** A good review avoids last minute cramming. Learning how to study for semester exams will aid your son considerably in college.

Care and Vigilance: We've got one week left to go. The best way to prevent any difficulty is through the Lasallian virtues of caring and vigilance – which will be in full force. Teachers will teach until the very end and proctor exams diligently. **Parents, please remind your students to adhere to ALL procedures & policies.** We will show care to the students, but we will be vigilant.

Adopt A Family: We again have identified several needy families in the local St. Tammany Parish area and have “adopted” them in order to provide them with a wonderful Christmas. Students on each level will shop, wrap and deliver the gifts. It's a very educational endeavor in social justice. We encourage your son to participate if he is able. Donations will be accepted for the next two weeks.

Mission Collections, Adopt a Family Projects, and Other Worthy Causes: We encourage our students to be generous with these causes. However, I again want to reassure parents that we DO NOT want to cause an economic hardship for our families. Please speak with your son about charitable giving. Perhaps you can reread as a family the parable of the Widow's Mite. Our teachers are aware that not every student can give or give a lot. PLEASE let me know if your son is feeling uncomfortable with our appeals. And that goes for you, too. Let's face it – tuition does NOT cover the cost of running Saint Paul's. Hence, we have fundraisers. We pray for the financial health of all.

Sweatshirts & Cold Weather: Only Saint Paul's outwear is permissible in cool/cold weather. I have a number of pre-owned SPS sweatshirts in good condition. **If your son needs an SPS sweatshirt and money is tight right now, just have him come see me. This will be handled confidentially and appropriately.** Remember that ONLY SPS cool weather clothing is allowed.

A SERVE TEN Reminder: Five service hours are due. Students must fill-out and turn in completed "Serve Ten" forms to the Counseling Department in order to get credit for their service hours. We have been advertising MANY service opportunities. Remember that service hours are mandatory, not optional.

2014-15 Admission Process: We are accepting application from new students for next year. If you know of someone interested, they should already have filed their application. We do allow a “grace

period” but it’s really time to submit the application if they are interested. Naturally, interested parties should feel free to contact me if they have questions.

Current Student Re-Registration for 2014-15: For those of you who plan ahead, here’s the process:

- Current 8th graders will be asked to register during the last two weeks of January. We need to know if any current 8th graders do not plan on returning next year in order for us to know how many new 9th graders we can accept.
- Current 9th – 11th grade students will be asked to register during the first two weeks of February.
- Current 12th graders – well, they don’t have to worry about registering for SPS next year!
- In all re-registration for 2014-15, a \$300 registration fee will be due.
- **Also, if your son does not plan on returning for the second semester of this year, please let me know ASAP.**

Important Driver’s License Requirement: Effective September 16, a new requirement was added to the driver's license issuance process for all minor applicants. All minor applicants must produce proof the applicant has either received a diploma or is currently enrolled in a high school program. This is done through a school attendance form from his or her high school prior to applying for a driver's license.

PLEASE: Our Attendance Office is being taxed to the max. Under ordinary circumstances, it is difficult enough to keep track of the students. When you call Erin and request “immediate” dismissal for a student, it places an unfair burden on her. If a student must leave school early, please send a written note with your student and have him check in with the attendance office when he comes to school to get a dismissal slip for the time requested. This is the policy in our handbook – which you pledged to uphold at the beginning of the year when you signed. And we just can’t stop everything to deliver an assignment, a lunch, a message – we just don’t have the personnel. Thanks for understanding.

Christmas Holidays: School will be closed from Dec 20 in the afternoon through Sunday, Jan 5. Teachers will not be available for grade discussions during this time. The business office, counseling office, and administration offices will be closed. Please anticipate any needs, e.g. transcripts, drivers license forms, etc. I’ll be in my office on most days catching up and you should feel free to call me. I’ll help if I can, but I don’t always know how! Thanks for understanding the need for the staff to have an uninterrupted Christmas break.

Tutoring: The National Honor Society offers tutoring each Tue and Thu during ALL of Lunch in LaSalle Hall Room 205 and each Wed and Thu from 7:15AM in LaSalle Hall Room 212. It’s easier to be tutored early in the than to wait until later in the quarter. Get a jump on exam study by visiting our NHS tutors! The tutors are friendly and helpful! To borrow a line from a popular commercial “put these men to work!”

Community Coffee Seals: We are now collecting these, too, which can be redeemed for cash to help SPS. Your son should bring them to his math teacher.

PLEASE – SAFE DRIVING: Parents – set an example for the students! Students – the neighbors are watching (and filming!) and we will take action! This applies at all times: after school, after practice, on

weekends, at games, etc. Please obey the traffic laws: speed limit, no tailgating, no texting while driving, buckle up, etc. Thank you!
