Tuesday, Feb 18, is the death anniversary, in 1564, of Michelangelo, artist, architect, and sculptor. Commissioned by Pope Julius III to paint the ceiling in the Sistine Chapel, Michelangelo was also the architect of part of the massive church of St. Peter's in Rome, and he designed its great dome. Michelangelo, however, thought of himself mainly as a sculptor. Two of his most famous pieces of sculpture are "David" in Florence and the "Pieta" in St. Peter's.

Michelangelo often saw potential in things that other people did not see. On one occasion he was seen studying carefully what others saw as simply a large block of marble. Someone asked him what he was doing. He said "I can see an angel imprisoned in this marble and I must set it free." He then began the long and skilled job

of carving a beautiful angel out of that marble.

Although Michelangelo lived 100 years before St. John Baptist de La Salle, our Founder also saw potential in people that others did not see. He saw the children of the "artisans and the poor" who were "far from salvation"

and, while others did not care about them, he knew they had potential. He founded the Christian school to develop that potential and change those "blocks of marble" into "beautiful angels."

As Lasallians, we are called to do this. We are blessed to have teachers who do this, but I encouraged them again this week to adopt the "eye" of Michelangelo in their work. Who knows what potential is "imprisoned" in each of their students? In a Lasallian school, everyone is important. I encourage you, as parents, to do the same with your sons. May we each be the sculptor that releases the beauty and potential of the young men of Saint Paul's School!

We'll let Jeff take his time getting acclimated to the Northern hemisphere again, including getting the OK from local doctors, and then we'll start using his prodigious talents. The Old Guidance Office: After much discussion, we have decided to re-locate the Office of Development from its present location in a house on 11th Avenue and into the old guidance office building, which has stood empty for the past two years since we moved the guidance office into the newly renovated La Salle Hall. The decision was three-fold: more space, more visibility on campus, and more reliable communications via our campus network. Accordingly, we have begun needed repairs (roofing) and interior re-hab. We hope to have everything finished in a couple of months and make the move before the end of the school year. By the way, do you know the history of the building? Allow me to quote from "The Saint Paul's Story" from the year 1949:

With the advent of increased numbers of boarders each year, the facilities in the infirmary had become overtaxed. It was also necessary to provide living quarters for a registered nurse on the property. Accordingly, a new infirmary building had been planned, and the New Orleans chapter of the St Paul's Parents' Club had agreed to underwrite the expense of the building over a ten year period. An attractive, modern, one-story construction of steel and brick was completed in record time. Brother Cassian [the principal at the time] himself worked on the project to save money. It had room for fifteen beds in semi-private rooms, a large dispensary, private quarters for a nurse and one private room with bath.

We ceased using the building as an infirmary in the mid-1990's and then moved the counselors into it. BTW, the counseling office used to be where Mrs. Wiggins and Mrs. Schmitt's classrooms are! And when I was counselor in the 1980's the office was where part of the faculty lounge and Mrs. Allen's room are now? Confused? We've come a loooonnnngggg way!

2014-15 Registration: Please note the following:

- **Current 8th graders**: Your deadline has passed. Thanks for your faith in us. 171 out of 173 current 8th graders have indicated their desire to say with us. We have not heard from 1 and only 1 parent said her son will not return. I'm humbled. Contact me if you have any questions or problems.
- **Current 9th 11th grades**: registration materials were EMAILED last week. You have until Feb 21 to register.
- Current 12th grade: You don't need to register for SPS for 2014-15! Rejoice!
- Registration will involved the payment of the \$300 registration fee.

Annual Fund: Thanks to those who have responded to my request. For clarity, I offer the following:

- Almost all private schools conduct annual funds; many are high pressured; ours is not.
- The Annual Fund funds tactical, short term projects, e.g. technology, special programs (e.g. engineering). The Capital Campaign funds large infrastructure projects (the \$4 million La Salle Hall renovation.)

In reviewing the proposed SPS calendar, please keep the following in mind:

- While state law only requires 175 instructional day, archdiocesan policy requires 177 days.
- A minimum of 3 faculty days must be scheduled.
- The Year must be evenly divided into two semesters.

- St. Tammany public schools open on Aug 8 a day after I'm proposing
- St. Tammany returns from Christmas on Jan 5 (the day I'm proposing) which is a Monday.
- St. Tammany ends the year on May 22, the same day I'm proposing
- As we did this year, we eliminate Book Day and begin on Aug 7 with a full day of instruction.
