I hope summer is proving to be a renewing one for your family. Too often, summers become hectic and chaotic with plans and projects – such as celebrating all those things in the paragraph above. With so much happening, it is easy to lose focus about important things. May the above words of Saint Paul help us provide to refocus! And even though we might be enjoying blueberries or horseradish, we need to "direct [our] thoughts to all that is true!" By doing so, the "God of peace" will be with us. Such is my prayer for you.

I hope, too, that you are preparing for the opening of the 2014 - 15 school year – a year which continues the unbroken chain of educational quality that began at Saint Paul's back in 1911. August 7th will soon be here! Much work is being done to prepare. Please note the following:

Prayer Request: On July 1, the Christian Brother Districts of New Orleans-Santa Fe and San Francisco will join together to form a new District of San Francisco New Orleans. This is an historic but bittersweet day for the Brothers as it recognizes that the two provinces are shrinking in number, growing older, and finding it more or less impossible to exist independently. NOSF began in 1921 and San Francisco even before that, so there is sense of loss and vulnerability. On the bright side, we look to the future with hope as we accept the challenge of becoming one district. For the Brothers, it will mean many changes -- but not all at once. We humbly ask you, therefore, to pray for us as Saint Paul's becomes part of the New District of San Francisco New Orleans. I'll be writing more about this in the future.

Exciting Curriculum Enhancements: Through the generosity of Hornbeck Offshore, we are adding the following Project Lead the Way Programs to our already technology-rich curriculum:

- Gateway to Technology (GTT) program for all of our pre-freshmen. Here's a description of the program from PLTW: Through topics like robotics, flight and space, and DNA and crime scene analysis, students will find their natural curiosity and imagination engaged in creative problem solving. The GTT program provides a strong foundation for further STEM learning in high school and beyond, challenging students to solve real-world problems like cleaning oil spills and designing sustainable housing solutions. Using the same advanced software and tools as the world's leading companies, students see the application of math, science, technology, and engineering to their everyday lives. This will be the science class for the pre-freshmen. Mr. Mark Richard and Mrs. Julie Beck are being trained this summer to teach the program, robots and computers are being ordered, and two classrooms are being specially furnished to offer our pre-freshmen this exciting and innovative science class.
- Computer Science and Software Engineering an upper division elective. Here's the description: CSE implements the College Board's 2013 CS Principles framework. Using Python® as a primary tool and incorporating multiple platforms and languages for computation, this course aims to develop computational thinking, generate excitement about career paths that utilize computing, and introduce professional tools that foster creativity and collaboration. CSE helps students develop programming expertise and explore the workings of the Internet. Projects and problems include app development, visualization of data, cybersecurity, robotics, and simulation.

We could not have afforded these new programs without the support of Covington-based Hornbeck Offshore and five of its top executives (all of whom are SPS dads) who have collectively pledged \$500,000 and other in-kind support toward a strategic academic endowment of our elective business and PLTW engineering professional curricula here at SPS. I am again grateful to Todd & Donna Hornbeck, Jim & Pam Harp, John & Nikki Cook, Tim and Lisa McCarthy and Sam & Jill Giberga. By the way, Hornbeck Offshore is also one of the corporate athletic sponsors of our new digital football scoreboard, which is begin installed this summer and will be ready for football season! Lots of exciting things on the horizon!

Attention Pre-Freshmen: Our Lasallian Youth Leaders are planning a special **Orientation Session for our incoming 8th graders** on Mon, Aug 4, from 4-9 pm. More info will be sent directly to 8th graders, but we hope you will mark this date on your calendars and plan to be present. Naturally, attendance is strictly optional, but the evening will be a fun and information introduction to SPS.

Tuition: Please note:

- Tuition was due on June 1st. If you financed tuition with Resource Bank, the first bank payment was also due in June.
- Late tuition is subject to a 1% finance charge.
- Call our Business Office at ext. 1005 or me at ext. 1001 for questions.
- Class schedules will NOT be sent to students who have not paid tuition or who are not current in their bank payments. Tuition bank payments must be current in order for students to begin school on August 7
- Please inform me if your son will not be attending Saint Paul's.

Summer Reading and Virtual Bookstore: All students have summer reading. The following is from Curriculum Coordinator Joe Dickens:

- To make obtaining your son's English reading materials as facile as possible, we have contracted MBS Direct to run our virtual bookstore. Any novel, play, or workbook he will need for English will be listed including new and used editions, and in some cases, eBooks. We offer this service for convenience, variety, and savings.
- The first purchase you'll make will be for his English summer reading. Simply go to our website at www.stpauls.com, click the "Order Your Books Here" button on the left, and you'll be directed to our virtual bookstore. You'll choose his summer reading title based on his placement in English. Payment will be handled on-line through MBS Direct, and the books will be shipped by UPS straight to your home.
- The titles for your son's summer reading will be available for purchase through our virtual bookstore, and the materials that he'll need for the academic year will be available in July.
- Next, all summer reading questions for English and social studies (if he's in honors or AP history/civics) are posted on our website. Please note that your son will independently have to obtain his own summer reading books for social studies if he is in honors or AP. Click on the link for summer reading at the bottom of our homepage, www.stpauls.com, and find the class(es) applicable to your son.

The First Day of School on August 7:

- Thursday, August 7, is a FULL DAY OF CLASS INSTRUCTION. Here's the plan:
 - Books will be in the classrooms and teachers will distribute them directly to students during the first class meeting;
 - Pictures and ID cards will be taken and issued during religion classes during the first two days (Aug 7-8). You will be sent information for ordering pictures.
 - o The cafeteria will be open M W, Aug 4-6, from 8-2 for you to place money on deposit if your son will be using the Archdiocesan Food Service. Students must have money on account for them to receive food from the cafeteria. Breakfast is served for \$1 and lunch for \$2. It's a bargain. And don't let your son say "the line is too long." After the first few days last year, all students were served within twenty minutes.
- The complete 2014 -15 calendar can be found on our web site (www.stpauls.com). NOTE: To comply with the State of Louisiana attendance policy, we are vigilant in insisting that students not miss school. PLEASE DO NOT SCHEDULE VACATIONS DURING SCHOOL TIME.
- And speaking of Edline, in late-July we'll send Edline codes and SPS email addresses to new students to activate their accounts. Edline allows parents to check grades and assignments.
- NOTE: All students must wear their DRESS UNIFORM on either Aug 7 or 8 the days they will take school pictures. Pictures will be taken during RELIGION CLASSES, so if your son's religion class is during Period A, B C or D, he wears his dress uniform on Thu, Aug 7. If his religion class is during Period E, F, or G, he wears his uniform on Fri, Aug 8. How will you know? The schedule we will email you will indicate the religion period.

Mothers Club Book Store: The Bookstore will be open on Monday, August 4th from 9:00 am - 6:00 pm, and Tuesday - Wednesday, August 5th-6th, from 9:00 am - 4:00 pm. All required school supplies will be available for purchase, as well as St. Paul's apparel. Students who ordered the Pre-Pack supplies will be able to pick up their orders during this time. The deadline to take advantage of this optional program is July 1st. The website is http://www.prepacksupplies1.com/.

Our regular bookstore hours of operation will start on Thursday, August 7th.

Cafeteria and Free / Reduced Lunch Program: If you wish to apply for free / reduced lunch, you can now do so on-line. There is NO stigma in applying and NO ONE knows. Nothing is done to embarrass your son or identify him as a free / reduced student. From the Archdiocesan Food Service:

Applying for your child(ren)'s school meal benefits is now faster, safer & easier than ever. To apply please visit our website at: www.schoolcafe.org and click on the link "Click Here to Apply for Reduced/Free Lunch" on the home page to begin your application. This service is provided to you free of charge by School Food & Nutrition Services of the Archdiocese of New Orleans.

Entering your application online is quicker, easier, and more accurate than filling out a paper application. Our step-by-step process and guided help makes applying for school meals simpler and easier to understand than ever before. Processing times are faster; therefore benefits are applied quicker too!

Listed below is what you will need to provide during the on-line application process:

- The names and incomes of every member of your household
- The school, grade, & birth date of every student in your household
- Your social security number and electronic signature
- A valid email address and phone number for communication purposes about the status of the application.

Service Hours: Summer is a great time for your son to start and even complete his service hour requirement of 10 hours. Remember that service hours must be done for those in need. Doing chores around the house does not qualify – your son should already be doing chores around the house. We are particularly stressing this year the need to help the truly needy. The Covington Food Bank, Habitat, parish mission trips, nursing homes – all of these provide legitimate service hour opportunities.

Remember that two special awards are given at the end of the year for service hours: The Brother Alfred Service Award for 50+ service hours and the Order of Saint La Salle Award for 100+ service hours. I'm always edified by the number of students who qualify for these awards. Let's aim for 100% of the student body earning these awards this year!

Class Schedules: Schedules will be emailed (if tuition is paid or bank payments current) by July 20 or very shortly thereafter.

Dress Code: Here it is again. I reiterate: the school is the final judge of uniform compliance:

ONLY SPS sweatshirts/outerwear will be allowed in cool / cold weather EVEN FOR SENIORS.

- ONLY **regular tan** khaki pants / shorts (NO cargo) will be allowed. If the pants are too light or too dark, we will insist that the student buy tan khaki ones.
- ONLY shirts sold by Bayou Uniform (13488 Seymour Myers Blvd) are allowed. If your son's shirts have shrunk (shirt tails MUST stay tucked in) or have holes, he MUST buy new ones.
- ONLY white, blue, gray, or gold T-shirts may be worn under uniform shirt.
- ONLY PLAIN (no metal decorations) BROWN belts will be allowed.
- SPS socks will still be required. These can be purchased at Bayou or in the bookstore.
- We have a supply of slightly used SPS shirts and sweatshirts (in good condition) which I am happy to give away. Please approach me if your budget is tight. You and your son will not be embarrassed in any way.
- We will continue to use the "formal" uniform on special occasions (school masses, ceremonies, etc). This uniform will include a school tie (purchased at Bayou Uniform) and ANY plain, white long-sleeve dress shirt. Long khakis with dark shoes, socks and belt are also part of the uniform which are purchased anywhere by the student.
- **NEW THIS YEAR**: As an additional level of safety, students will be REQUIRED to WEAR THEIR ID CARDS on a daily basis. We will supply them with an SPS lanyard when they received their cards on either Aug 7 or 8. This will also help with the cafeteria, as ID cards are used to check out and also with the attendance office, as ID cards are used to check in.

Football: Varsity players leave for camp in late July. Junior high football (8th) begins after school opens. Any 9th grader (freshman) interested in football should report to the gym on Monday, July 8, at 7 am with his LHSAA forms and physical.

Band: The Marching Wolves invite all students to consider joining one of the premier band programs in the area. Even beginners are welcome! Note the following:

- A new member orientation will be held on Mon and Tue, July 15 & 16, from 9 4 and Wed, July 17, from 9 2. Come join the Marching Wolves. It's a great experience
