Once again, welcome to 2014-15 school year – the beginning of the fourth year of our second century of life! I'm glad last week's mammoth newsletter didn't scare you off! I tried to make this one shorter!

As we begin a new year of Lasallian education at SPS, I invite you to reflect on the theme we have chosen for the year: **make courageous choices.** To Lasallians, this theme is in honor of Servant of God Brother James Miller, FSC – who gave his life for the people of Guatemala. In case you aren't aware, being declared "Servant of God" by the Catholic Church is the first step toward formal sainthood. Thus, Brother James has been recognized by the Church as a model of emulation and worthy of canonization.

As Brother Louis Welker writes: Brother James Miller was martyred on Feb 13, 1982. He knew the risks of ministering among the poor of Guatemala. Family and friends tried to dissuade him from going back to Guatemala fearing for his safety. He responded in a letter: "I trust God's Providence and I place my life in his hands." I met him when he stayed with us on his way back to Guatemala....He was a good man with a hearty laugh and a jack of all trades. A little over a month later he was shot down in front of the school while repairing a wall. It was a warning to the Brothers to back off in their fight to keep the young men in the school from being forced into the Army.

We certainly pray that no one will suffer martyrdom for acting courageously, but the "ultimate sacrifice" of Brother James can inspire us to make courageous choices, as each day provides us with many opportunities to do so – which I'll address in newsletters and with students in assemblies.

Sometimes, making courageous choices just means doing the ordinary in

an extraordinary way – our theme for last year. This should fill all of us with hope, as we can all do this!

As we work with faculty on making courageous choices as Lasallian educators, we **encourage you, as parents, to work with your sons in a similar manner. Don't let him get by with "just enough", whether it's grades or chores or a simple "good morning, Mom and Dad!"** Exhort him to sainthood by making courageous choices by doing the ordinary in an extraordinary way. You and the sons will hear more about this theme from me throughout the year. I invite you to join me, together and in association, in making courageous choices. I look forward to traveling that path with you.

hope for his recovery. We arranged for round the clock sitters, so he was kept comfortable. A native New Orleanian, Brother Gregory earned a PhD in European History from the University of New Mexico. After a respected and long (well over 60 years!) career in higher education and an international reputation, having taught most of his life at The College of Santa Fe and De La Salle University in Manila with guest stints all over the world, Brother retired to Saint Paul's in March of 2013 due to health reasons. We were honored to have had him with us for the past year and a half. Due to his infirmities, he was unable to physically attend school events on our campus, but he kept up with what was going on here. His encyclopedic mind and razor sharp wit kept the Brothers informed and entertained. I am confident that he was met in heaven by Saint John Baptist de La Salle and all our holy brothers, who welcomed him into his new community.

Eternal rest grant unto Brother Gregory, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon him.

May he rest in peace. Amen!

School Safety: School safety remains a paramount issue for all of us, even in St. Tammany. Please discuss this with your sons. Know that in our faculty meetings, we will review all safety procedures that we have in place – and they are many. Safety is our priority – and it's EVERYONE'S JOB. Report ANY rumor or threat to safety about which you hear. Encourage your children to report, too. If you come to campus, you must check in at one of three offices (Administration Building, Counseling Center or Records Office for a Visitor Pass before you may walk around. Our prayers rise to heaven for a school year marked by safety and an elimination of violence everywhere.

First Day of School: Thu, Aug 7, is A FULL DAY OF INSTRUCTION for ALL students. **This is considered a school day** and attendance is expected. Students **must be in their A Block class by 7:45.**

- On Thursday, we have blocks A B C & D only. Students only need to bring books and supplies for Blocks A B C & D.
- Important Info About Uniforms for August 7: On Thursday, August 7, students who have religion class in Periods A, B, C or D must wear DRESS UNIFORM for school pictures. Students who have religion in periods E, F or G wear regular uniforms on Thursday.
- Important Info About Uniforms for August 8: On Friday, August 8, students with religion class in periods E, F or G wear DRESS UNIFORM for pictures. Students who had their pictures taken on Thursday wear regular uniforms.
- Important information About Grooming: Student must be in compliance with our grooming regulations (especially hair and shaving -- all those special summer sartorial styles must be gone) in order to take school pictures; disciplinary action is a possibility.
- Purchasing school pictures is completely optional. Pricing and order form info was mailed to you with the Mothers Club mailing several weeks ago.

Student-Parent Handbook Signature Card: The Student-Parent Handbook is posted on the Student Life page of our website. All students and parents must be familiar with our policies and agree to follow them. As evidence of that agreement, students and parents must sign a form attesting that they have read the Handbook, understand the rules contained within the document, and intend to follow them.

Print out the signature card (posted on the website under "recent news" and which is also the last page of the handbook) and bring it on August 7. It will be collected during English class.

Odds and Ends:

- Students must be in their first block class by 7:45 am. Classes dismiss at 3:00 pm.
- Students must be in uniform compliance (including shirts tails tucked in) from the moment they step foot on campus. On Thursday, August 7, students who have religion class in Periods A, B, C or D must wear DRESS UNIFORM for school pictures. Students who have religion in periods E, F or G wear regular uniforms on Thursday. (Yes, I know I'm repeating this but some people have bet me that I can't pull this off!)
- Car lines: There is no absolute designated drop off spot. Be patient the first few days of school as traffic patterns form. Safety is paramount, so if you use Founder's Circle as a departure point, cars must drop off students in Founders Circle in the LEFT lane only you may not block traffic in the right lane to discharge the occupants. Dropping off at La Salle Hall or the tennis courts is OK.
- Traffic will be heavy heading into Covington this week as schools open. Please plan accordingly.
- Also, PLEASE observe traffic regulations. SPS is in a residential zone and speed limits are 25 mph 15 mph during school zone hours. Covington Police will actively enforce traffic laws around SPS. See below for new traffic regulations.

New Students: Our Student Host organization will provide you with help for the first few days. The student hosts are easily spotted because they will be dressed in GRAY student host shirts instead of the blue uniform shirt. Feel free to ask a student host if you need help. They are friendly!

Orientation: Please discuss with your son the four assemblies he will have this week & next:

- A chapel prayer service
- A meeting with Level Teachers to review handbook and policies
- A meeting with the guidance department
- A meeting with Coach Ken Sears to review expectations of conduct. Note: during this assembly, Coach
 Sears will conduct the Archdiocesan-mandated Child Protection/Safe Environment presentation which
 informs students about the dangers of abuse, how to prevent it, and what to do if it is suspected. Please
 discuss this with your son.

Enrollment: We open this year with a very healthy enrollment. Please stress with your son that you are giving him a gift by sending him to Saint Paul's – a gift that is wanted by others. Stress with him the obligation to make the most of the gift he is being given. Stress with him that attending Saint Paul's is a privilege and not a right. He can lose the privilege by making poor choices.

Cafeteria School Lunch / Breakfast Programs:

- SPS participates in the federal school lunch/breakfast program managed by the Archdiocese of New Orleans. Saint Paul's does not directly manage the food service program; we follow the directives of the Archdiocese and the cafeteria workers are employed by the Archdiocese, not SPS.
- Breakfast (\$1) is served from 7:15-7:35 am. This is a GREAT program and many students use it.
- Students may buy lunch (\$2.25) On most days, there is a choice of hot lunch or sandwich lunch.
- Students may not "order out", e.g. pizza, or have

lunches delivered. WE CANNOT DELIVER LUNCHES TO STUDENTS. Please do not ask us to do so.

- Students participating in the cafeteria program must make an initial payment before school opens. This may be done on Aug 4 between 7 and 2:30 and Aug 5-6 between 7 and 2:00. A separate check will be needed. Students may NOT "charge" a meal if no money is on account.
- Students MUST use their ID cards for check out in the cafeteria. A temporary ID will be issued them on Thu, Aug 7, for use at lunch that day.

- Parents may sign up for ON-LINE payments which will also allow them to see a complete record of everything their son is buying. Go to http://www.schoolcafe.org/ and follow directions.
- FREE or REDUCED LUNCH/BREAKFAST: There is no stigma to apply for free / reduced lunch. NO ONE knows but the cafe manager. Request forms from me or the cafeteria manager. NEW: You may also apply online for free / reduced lunch by following these steps:
 - ✓ Go to www.Applyforlunch.com (or access the link from our website www.schoolcafe.org)
 - ✓ Click on "Start your Online Application"
 - ✓ Enter your Zip Code or State and select "Archdiocese of New Orleans" as the district.
 - ✓ Follow the wizard and use the guided help along the way
 - ✓ Continue to select "next" at the bottom of the page and "submit" when completed.

Should you list an email address, you receive an email confirmation that your application has been submitted. If you have any questions regarding Online Applications, please contact (504)596-3440 or (504)596-3434. Meal eligibility applications should be received prior to the 30th day of school or current meal benefits may change. **Students may also receive a free lunch by offering to help serve lunch during the lunch period.**

Attendance: The State of Louisiana limits the number of days a student may miss (whether excused or unexcused) and still receive credit. Saint Paul's adheres to these regulations. Consult the handbook.

New Driving Policy: The driving habits of some students (speeding, revving of engines, screeching of tires, etc) are causing me a great deal of grief with the neighbors. I have spoken at length with some neighbors and also with the

Covington Police. The neighbors are declaring war on unsafe driving – and I'm supporting them. As our handbook states, driving to school and parking on our campus is a privilege, not a right. Accordingly, we are taking the following steps:

- Covington Police will increase their presence and issue tickets;
- Neighbors have been instructed to take pictures or get license plates of speeding or unsafe drivers and send the information to us:
- SPS has increased the number of faculty street supervisors after school;
- SPS has instituted a series of monetary fines (beginning at \$50 for a first offense) against students shown to be violating traffic laws around school;
- SPS reserves the right to revoke the driving to school privilege which we have already done with one student who enraged the neighborhood on the last day of school in May.

We have tried to address this issue with students, but some are not getting the message. Hence, we will take stronger steps. Parents of students who drive to school – please stress safe driving with your sons. A car can be a lethal weapon if not used responsibly.

Off to a Good Academic Start: Help your son develop proper attitudes and habits for success. Show confidence in his ability; work with him to set realistic academic goals. Help him develop an orderly study environment. Teens enjoy chaos, so the trick is to help your son create enough order in his chaos for proper study to occur. Designate a place and time to study.
