Welcome to the start of the second quarter and congratulations on an excellent first one! Now is a good time to remind ourselves of and recommit ourselves to the fundamentals of what we do and why we do it. 

Last Tue's Assembly: I hope the students enjoyed our Oct 07 assembly. Here's some of what we did:

• Listened to a stirring rendition of *Hail Holy Queen Enthroned Above* as performed by the Music Ministry of Mary Queen of Peace Parish. I explained the significance of this traditional Catholic hymn to Mary and reminded students that October is a month the Church dedicates in a special way to Our Blessed Mother. I informed them that once again, an SPS mom who has had five sons graduate from Saint Paul's, has given us hundreds of rosaries for free distribution through religion classes. I encouraged them to keep a rosary in their pockets and pray a "Hail Mary" or decade when waiting or walking. We are grateful to this SPS mom for fostering our devotion to Mary!

I also reminded the students that 25% of the school year and 75% of the calendar year are over. I had them reflect: How have I used that time? Did I grow closer to God, family, and friends? Did I accomplish the goals I had set? Am I a better person? I exhorted them to make the most of the remainder of this calendar and school year.

- Prayed in a special way, as the prayer candle was lit by junior Logan Haydel, for the following who have entered eternal rest since our last assembly: junior Brock May's maternal great grandmother; senior Peyton Cuccia's great uncle; Mrs. Eleanor Hawley Scherer, grandmother of sophomore Joshua Scherer; Mrs. Lillian Moran Stalter, grandmother of freshman Matthew Stalter; and Mr. Ernest Prieto, grandfather of junior Harrison Prieto. Mr. Prieto was a 1953 alumnus of Saint Paul's and very proud of his association with the school. Since it was the feast of Our Lady of the Rosary, we recited a "Hail Mary" for the repose of these souls and the consolation of the families.
- Welcomed a group of 30 7th grade students from the local elementary schools who were spending the morning with us to see what makes Saint Paul's such a great place.

- Called on Junior **Nick Oubre** to introduce another guest on campus: 7th grader Sean Noel, who started the Warm Hearts Drive several years ago. SPS is again participating in this drive to college used, but still usable, jackets, sweaters, blankets, gloves and other items to help keep those in need warm for the winter. Sean gave a moving reflection on poverty and was extremely articulate for a 7th grader. He informed the student body that Saint Paul's was the top donor in last year's drive. I'm sure we'll participate well again this year.
- Recognized and congratulated the **SPS Student Hosts** without whose help we could not have put on Jazz n Roll. The hosts, as usual, were magnificent. They helped set up and take down the event in addition to working the evening. They received rave reviews from all.
- Recognized sophomore **Hayden Ocman** by bringing him on the court while I told the student body about the automobile accident he was in last week. The car in which Hayden was riding hit another car. Hayden thought quickly to get the lady out of the car before paramedics arrived. The car had flipped, and the side door wouldn't open. Hayden talked to her through the driver's window, got her to open the hatchback on her SUV, and got her out through the back with the help of a passerby. When asked about it, he responded that he was worried that the lady was trapped and the car would catch fire. The victim of the accident was amazing; she was more worried about boys than herself because he was very upset. Hayden acted with a lot of courage and equanimity. I told the boys their personal safety is always paramount, but anytime they can help someone in this situation takes courage which we pray for every day. Well done, Hayden!
- Then, as if by magic, The William Tell Overture by Gioacchino Antonio Rossini (an Italian baroque composer from 1792–1868) started playing which signals that the **Cross Country Wolves** are off and running. I recounted the accomplishments to date:
 - St. Michael's Bayou Boogie: Varsity & Jr Hi both took 3rd Place
 - Episcopal Round Table: Junior Hi was 5th out of 30 teams and Varsity was 3rd out of 29 teams; Sophomore Eric Coston placed 1st out of 281 runner.

 - Newman Invitational: Junior Hi was 2nd and Varsity was 1st
 - Watson Ford Invitational in MS: Junior Hi was 2nd, JV was 3rd and Varsity was 1st. Once again, Eric was 1st with Spencer Albright, Stephen Schlottman and Collin Sullivan in top 10 in Varsity. Jonathan Bertucci was 1st in Junior Hi with Connor Walmsley in the top 10. Well done, Wolves!
- Recognized and congratulated the **football program** for its great showing so far: Junior High is playing hard,
 9th & JV are undefeated and Varsity is 4 1 and undefeated in District. Recognized and congratulated **Kenny Sears**, **Jr**. for being named the WWL Prep football player of the week after the McDonough 35 game.
- Ran out of time before I could do any more recognitions which will "roll over" to the next assembly! We then robustly sang the Fight Song for all of the activities going on around school.
- Before we dismissed, I reminded the students that Oct 7 was You Matter To Me Day and encouraged them to tell those people in their lives about whom they care that "you matter to me." I hope your son came home and did so. To practice, I had them turn to each other and say "you matter to me." And they did so!

• As the prayer candle was extinguished by junior **Colin Ross**, I reminded the students that they must leave the gym and be the Light of God to all whom they meet. The students exited to the strains of "Hail Holy Queen Enthroned Above." It was a great assembly! At least I thought so!

Meet the Schools of the Lasallian District of San Francisco New Orleans: So far I've highlighted La Salle High School in Yakima, WA, La Salle Catholic College Prep in Milwaukie, OR, De La Salle North Catholic in Portland, OR, Justin-Sienna High School in Napa, CA, Christian Brothers High School in Sacramento, St. Mary's College HS in Berkeley and DeMarillac Academy in San Francisco. This week, it's Sacred Heart Cathedral in San Francisco.

While Sacred Heart Cathedral's roots date back to the mid-1800s, the present school dates to 1987, when Sacred Heart High School, which was conducted by the Daughters of Charity, merged with Cathedral High School, which was conducted by the Christian Brothers. The school is situated in the heart of San Francisco's cultural center. SHC students benefit from the prime location, near San Francisco's City Hall, the opera and the ballet. As with any urban campus, however, safety and security are issues and the school has extensively trained security personnel and safeguarded facilities. As a "merged" school, they strive to keep the traditions of Saint John Baptist de La Salle and Saint Vincent de Paul, founder of the Daughters of Charity. They are a Bring Your Own Device school and have the largest high school library in northern CA. Some interesting clubs: The Tea Club (yes, they sit around and drink tea!), the Yoga Club

(remember, we're in San Francisco!), the Japanese Club (they explore Japanese culture, view Japanese films, play Japanese video games (who knew?), eat Japanese food, etc.) and a Badminton Club. Their tuition and fees total \$18,200 and over \$24,000 for international DAY students! Wow!

Warm Hearts Drive: Our annual collection of gently used coats, jackets, sweaters and other such items is currently underway. Last Tue, the organizer of the drive, 7th grade Sean Noel, spoke to our student. Here are his remarks – pretty remarkable for a 7th grader!

I've had the privilege of serving as a speaker for the St. Paul's assembly for several years. I've shared with you my three service projects, including 'St. Tammany Remembers', a program I founded to honor and recognize our local veterans, 'Sean's Factor', a non-profit to raise funds to send children and teens with Hemophilia to a medically-staffed summer camp for free and finally, my sister Annie and I are in our 8th year of collecting blankets, hats, gloves and socks (basically anything that can keep you warm) for our "Warm Hearts".

We collect the items throughout a 3 parish region, and then sort them and distribute them throughout five local parishes: Washington, St. Tammany, Tangipahoa, Orleans and Jefferson. To date, we have collected more than 10,000 items, some of which are even given to other states during major disasters such as the devastating tornados in Mississippi and Hurricane Sandy in New Jersey.

St. Paul's has the distinction of being our largest contributor within "Warm Hearts". Again, this school is our largest collection site. Thank you, St. Paul's.

I have no doubt that many of you don't realize the significance of your single donation. You don't grasp the impact that one blanket makes in your community. And that's normal. We are blessed to live in one of the more affluent parishes in the state. Many of you will never know someone who has been touched by homelessness or poverty. When you are hot, you turn on the air conditioner; when you are cold, you turn on the heat, grab your new coat and its all fine...

But that scenario is <u>not</u> the reality for many of our fellow citizens. Less than 18 blocks away from this very school, an entire family did not eat dinner last night. Within this parish, there are children and elderly citizens without adequate housing or electricity. It's a very real picture, and I don't mean to depress you with that knowledge, but I do encourage you to be more aware.

It doesn't take much to make a difference. When you go to the linen closet and choose a clean blanket to donate, or go through your closet and pick out that coat that doesn't fit anymore; picture in your mind who will be receiving that "gift". And I do refer to your donations and efforts as "gifts", because they truly are. If you use a little bit of your allowance money and take the time to purchase a new bag of socks, you are changing the world.

That's a big statement to claim for just bringing in something to keep someone warm. But it's true. When you decide today that **YOU** will go to purchase the items to donate, or that **YOU** will go through your closet, **YOU** are then the hero. If you just tell someone else to do it, (like your mom) then **the outcome is the same, but are you really getting the point of "service"?**

"Service" doesn't have a monetary minimum. "Service" doesn't mean bringing in the most or the nicest. "Service" is not delegating to another. "Service" is not doing it because you have to.

Now let me tell you what service "IS". The dictionary defines service as "an act of helpful activity; to help; to aid." I can't think of better way to improve our community and our world than to "aid". You don't have to come up with a brand new program; you don't have to raise a million dollars. You just have to aid that one person.

Just help one person. Just serve one person.


St. Paul's will be collecting for our "Warm Hearts" campaign starting tomorrow until October 23. The name of our program serves two purposes. I like to say that if you give someone a blanket, not only will they have a warm heart, but you will, too.

If I have given you just one motivation today regarding service, it would be to actually picture in your mind that one person your blanket is going to warm. Students of St. Paul's, I challenge you. Change the world. Serve.

The Political Season: With elections taking place soon, I remind all of the regulations of the Archdiocese of New Orleans concerning political activity and Catholic institutions. From the Archdiocesan Policy Manual:

- Church organizations may not at any time participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or
 distributing of statements), any political campaign on behalf of, or in opposition to, any candidate for public
 office.
- Church facilities cannot be used for any meeting, lecture or other activity sponsored by any political party or candidate. Parish and other church facilities may not be used for any activity related to the support of or opposition to any candidate for political office nor as forums for partisan debate.

- Catholic institutions may not make statements (oral or written) supporting or opposing any candidate for public office in any manner....Further, no statements may be made which label a certain candidate, such as referring to the candidate as pro-abortion or anti-peace, etc.
- The archdiocesan newspaper, parish bulletins, and other parish or archdiocesan sponsored publications are
 - not to accept political advertising in support of or opposition to any candidate for public office or in support of or opposition to a political party.
- Catholic institutions may not provide financial support to any candidate, political action committee, or political party.
- No Catholic institution may distribute or authorize distribution of campaign literature or other campaign material on its premises, including parking lots.
- I have provided these regulations to our faculty and insisted that they abide by them.
