Three years ago this Tuesday, Oct 28, 2011, Brother Alvaro Rodriguez Echeverria, then-Superior General of the Brothers of the Christian Schools, visited SPS. In his honor, we celebrated a memorable all-school liturgy and formed a Lasallian star. It was a magical moment in our school's history and the picture remains an iconic one. In his address to the students during Mass that day, **Brother Alvaro made the following points which are worthy of review:**

The boys let him know the entire St. Paul's community had been praying for him. The first thing he said was, "I can't wait to get back to school!" Wow! Not, "I can't wait to get home", or "I can't wait to get out of the hospital" but, "I can't wait to get back to school!" What a testament to St. Paul's! Mrs. Russ was so surprised that with everything the boys have to do, they took the time to come over on a school night to visit Zac. St. Paul's scored 159 points, Slidell 126, Covington 42 and Christ Episcopal 13. Five different swimmers won individual events as the team racked up an important 62% best times in the meet. Leading the AquaWolves charge was team Tri-Captain **Jack Dubreuil**.

Sophomores **Jordan Wyble** and **Ian Fried** picked up their first varsity wins. Freshman **Morgan Myers** continued his run of improved times by winning the 100 backstroke and touching in at third in the 100 butterfly. The 400 freestyle relay of Fried, Myers, **Brenton Larmann** and Tri-Captain **William Munn** closed out the meet with a win. Other AquaWolves in the scoring bracket were: Brenton Larmann who touched second in the 100 butterfly and fourth in the 200 freestyle. William Munn placed third in the 100 breaststroke and fourth in the 50 freestyle. Freshman **Tonner Dougherty** splashed in at fifth in the 100 breaststroke and

sixth in the 200 freestyle. Junior **Sam Nuss** picked up seventh place points in the 200 and 100 freestyles. Sophomore **Max Tepper** placed 8th in the 200 freestyle and 9th in the 100 freestyle. Soph **Oliver Sibley** scored fourth in the 100 breaststroke and 9th in the 50 freestyle. And Freshman **Ashton Callender** picked up his first varsity points with a second place finish in the 100 backstroke. Both the 200 medley relay of Callender, Sibley, Morgan and Munn and the 200 free relay of Dubreuil, Nuss Larmann and Tepper placed second. The eighth graders got into the act with **Matthew Lyon** and **Justin Streckfus** swimming very well with Lyon winning the 50 butterfly.
