On Monday of this week, we observe an important anniversary. What I've printed below is a repeat, but it's one of our significant foundational stories – both in our history and God's plan -- and needs to be read yearly. Enjoy.



From the History Channel's "This Day in History" for Mar 9: Pancho Villa Raids U.S.

On March 9, 1916, several hundred Mexican guerrillas under the command of Francisco "Pancho" Villa cross the U.S.-Mexican border and attack the small border town of Columbus, New Mexico.... President Woodrow Wilson orders the U.S. Army into Mexico to capture the rebel leader dead or alive.

Other than historical curiosity, why should we at SPS care about this anniversary? Because in an unwitting and unintentional way, Pancho Villa helped start Saint Paul's.


According to the historical records on the web site of the Christian Brothers of the former New Orleans - Santa Fe Province (www.cbnosf.org/mexican%20revolution.htm) Mexican revolutionaries besieged the city of Zacatecas in 1914, where Christian Brothers had conducted a school for six years. Two Brothers were killed and 14 were imprisoned.

On July 6, the sister of the finance minister to the First Chief of the Revolutionaries hosted Pancho Villa for dinner. During this meal she interceded for the Brothers. Her son had attended the Brothers' school at Monterey. Villa consented and the Brothers were conveyed by rail coach under guard to El Paso. The Jesuit priests took them in, gave them necessities and advised them to travel to Santa Fe. The French consul arranged for train tickets, and the Brothers arrived

at Santa Fe on July 13. Some of these Brothers later returned to France. Others were sent to different American communities, while some remained and helped establish the new District of New Orleans-Santa Fe. The unknown Brother who wrote the Historical Sketch, awed by the courage and dedication of these Brothers, remarked, "... for a more exemplary or edifying body of religious men, it would be very difficult to find."

Some of those same brothers, exiled from France in 1904 due to religious persecution and who went to Mexico only to be driven out in 1914, would eventually settle in Covington to assume ownership of Saint Paul's School. The rest, as they say, is history. Had Pancho Villa not released the Brothers from prison, they may never have found their way here.

Scripture tells us that God's ways are not our ways. Could there

be a more relevant example of how God brings good out of evil, strength out of weakness, salvation out of despair? Could the Hand of God be any more obvious in our school's existence? Could we have any doubt that our work today is God's work -- a continuation of that miraculous journey to Covington, those incredible stories of heroic men giving their lives for the sake of the Lasallian Mission?

Today, we are the ones entrusted with that Mission. Today, we must be faithful. Today, we are the cooperators with God in His plan of salvation. Today, we must honor our ancestors and, yes, thank Pancho Villa for granting the Brothers a release from prison and a safe journey from Mexico. Who knows what good will come from our work today -- even when times are tough and the future blurry? May our Lenten journey give us eyes of faith!

Mar 03 Assembly: I hope the students enjoyed our Mar 03 assembly. Here's some of what we did:

Students entered the gym to the strains of Antonio Vivaldi's "Spring" from his famous "Four Seasons Suite." I explained that Vivaldi is a famous Baroque era Italian composer who lived from 1678 – 1741. I reminded them that Baroque music is dramatic and powerful and that Vivaldi musically interpreted the difference seasons with amazing precision. And why was I emphasizing the season of spring? In addition to signs of spring springing up all over, we are in the season of Lent – and the word "lent" comes from an Old English word meaning "spring." It's a time for our relationship with God to "bloom" just like the spring flowers. It's a time for us to bask in the warmth of God's love, just like we bask in the warmth of spring following the cold of winter. And as the days lengthen, it's a time for us to lengthen our commitment to "put off the things of night" and walk in the daylight.

While the music played, **junior Jordan Dominguez** the prayer candle – now purple for Lent – was lit. We prayed in a special way for those who have entered into God's Kingdom since our last assembly: **Mrs. Dora Mohon**, grandmother of **Chris Weintritt**; grandfather of senior **Alex Zenor**; and **Mr. Mike Swords**, uncle of freshman **Logan Swords**. And we also prayed for those who have joined this world -- **Benjamin Cobb**, newborn brother of freshman **Zachary Cobb**.

- Introduced two guests who were at the assembly: Brother Duane Gregory, a member of the retired Christian Brothers Community at SPS, who turned 90 years young last week. Brother Duane served in the Army Air Force in WW II prior to joining the Brothers. He remains active in his retirement, serving as a Eucharistic Minister for the hospital. We gave him a rousing round of applause. I also introduced Mrs. Aline Harbison Associate Director of Catechetical Leadership for the Archdiocese of New Orleans who was making her first visit to Saint Paul's.
- Congratulated the State Champion Soccer Wolves. Because we will have a special assembly, as is our custom for state championship teams, I didn't go into a lot of detail but wanted them to know how incredibly proud of them we are. Coach Moser has done an incredible job with our soccer wolves!

- Recognized and congratulated the members of the All District Wrestling Team for District 6 of Division I: First Team Members include Cole Houser, Stevie van Zandt, Billy Harrison, Hunter Bourgeois, Seth Dragon, Sam Dufour, Chase Cochran and Kyle Schech. Second Team Members include Jared Thieler, Shane Ulfers,

Blake Huff, Matt Krutzfeldt, Colin Francis, & Christian Fortner. And Coach Craig Ketelsen was named Coach of the Year! Well done, Wrestling Wolves!

- Recognized and congratulated Keegan Lange, Kameron Lange, Yehia Elkersh, and Tanner Bruner for winning BEST IN STATE in the 2014 -2015 Verizon Innovation App Challenge. The students designed an app that would allow someone to post new theories and ideas relevant to science and be able to receive feedback from interested community members. The boys won the "Best in State" prize for their design. They entered regional competition but were beaten by a technology school in Florida More than 1,000 app concept submissions were received, which made selecting the Best in State winning teams highly competitive. In their award letter, Verizon wrote: *Your app concept, SIRA, earned top points in your state for its creativity, innovative design, and application of STEM principles to the development process. On behalf of the Verizon Foundation, we congratulate you on your Best in State success.*
- Recognized and congratulated six seniors who represented SPS in the Technology Student Association (TSA) TEAMS Engineering competition at UNO on 2/27: SPS won 2nd place and were only 2 points behind the winners (Dominican), who have been in this completion since well before Katrina. It was our first foray into this competition and now we know how to better prepare. Participants were: Matthew Dysart, Keegan Lange, Brent Neal, James Pagnutti, Andrew Richard, & Joe Tanner. The team presented their trophy to Trevor Watkins.
- Again, I ran out of time before I ran out of recognitions which will carry over to the next assembly. We ended with the whole student body standing and singing a very moving rendition of

Lunch with Archbishop Aymond: On Friday, I lunched with Archbishop Gregory Aymond and the presidents of the other Catholic high schools in the Archbiocese of New Orleans. The Archbishop hosts a luncheon for presidents each semester to show his support of Catholic education and to invite our feedback on issues facing us. As usual, he was most gracious and inviting, listening to us and offering his prayer and support. He addressed the following issues with us:

- Thanked us for cooperating with the "no Sunday events" policy. He acknowledged that not everyone agrees with the policy and he "respects" that disagreement. He also acknowledged that the policy had created a few problems but feels the good outweighs the bad. He did stress that even though we may participate in Sunday events scheduled by other agencies (parades, tournaments, etc.) we have an obligation to provide a mass opportunity for our students.
- Urged us to consider joining the Louisiana Tuition Donation Rebate Program to allow low-income students the opportunity to attend Catholic schools. We have an obligation to do this, said the Archbishop, because we are Catholic. So far, no Catholic high school has signed on. SPS is currently looking at this program, but no decision has been made.
- Asked us to consider further opening our schools to special needs students. Some schools take none. He stated that we have an obligation as Catholics to be open to these students. SPS agrees.
- Expressed concern about what's happening in the religion classes. He says he's hearing from more and more young people that religion classes are "too cerebral" and don't help the students "live" the Catholic life. He has plans to address this and so do we.
- Then, he addressed the following issue: pornography addiction. He is concerned about the growing addiction to pornography among young people, and asked what we, as schools, are doing about it. He's hearing this in confessions as are other priests. We'll be looking at ways to address this with our students. Technology obviously makes porn very accessible to our students. Parents, I hope you are discussing this with your sons. It was quite a luncheon!

2015-16 Calendar: St. Tammany Parish Public Schools has published next year's calendar. They will begin on Fri, Aug 7. Accordingly, I have completed our calendar, which follows their calendar when possible. We must schedule 178 days per archdiocesan policy. We therefore will start on Thursday, August 6 WITH A FULL DAY OF INSTRUCTION and NO book day – which corresponds to what we did this year. Please plan vacations accordingly.

Important Driver's License Requirement: A new requirement was added to the driver's license issuance process for all minor applicants. These forms can be obtained in the administration building or the counseling center. **Several students went for licenses over the holidays and were turned away because they didn't have the form – in some cases they waited several hours before being turned away!**
