I shared the following with our faculty this week. The words are from a recent talk given by Pope Francis to a group of Italian teachers. The words could have been written by St. John Baptist de La Salle, as the Pope's view of the role of the teacher is exactly what our Founder had in mind. I pray that Saint Paul's remains faithful to the following words:

In a society that struggles to find points of reference, it is necessary that young people find a positive reference in the school. It can do so or become so if it has within itself teachers that are capable of giving meaning to the school, to study

and to culture, without reducing everything only to the transmission of technical knowledge, but aiming to build an educational relation with each one of the students, who must feel accepted and loved for who he is, with all his limitations and potentiality....You must teach not only the contents of a subject, but also the values of life and habits of life. ...To learn the content, a computer is sufficient, but to understand how one loves, to understand what the values and habits are that create harmony in society, a good teacher is necessary.

The Bad Dept: On April 29, the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) released *The Nation's Report Card:* 2014 U.S. History, Geography, and Civics, and the findings were bleak. Less than 30 percent of U.S. eighth graders managed to score proficient or higher on any of the assessments. Twenty-seven percent reached that level in geography; 23 percent did so in civics, and only 18 percent in history. The state of social studies education is bad.

Tickets and caps/gowns will NOT be issued to any student who still has an obligation to the school. Seniors will be dismissed by 11 at the latest.

- Fri, May 15: Mandatory attendance at morning awards ceremony followed by final graduation practice.
