


The President's Newsletter for May 18 - 24, 2015 The Penultimate (look it up) Edition!



Done in Covington, Louisiana on this 12th day of May, in the year of Our Lord, 2015. With "Rise Up O Men of God" playing in the background, the juniors then rose and moved into the senior section, thus officially commencing their senior year. It was a moving experience.

- As is our custom, we then sang a rousing rendition of the fight song it was moving and wonderful.
- I then treated the assembly to the final selection from Handel's *Messiah*: "The Amen" and marveled how Handel, for 3 minutes and 46 seconds, took one word and make an incredible musical statement to end his masterpiece. It was a fitting end to our year.
- I then thanked the student body for a great year and closed by apologizing if I omitted recognizing anyone during year. I reminded the students of their obligation to love and serve the Lord and each other both now and throughout the summer. We exited to the strains of Mouret's "Rondeau", leaving the gym for the last time for 2014-15. It was a wonderful assembly! I had a great time!

Teens and Personal Finance Survey: Junior Achievement's 2015 Teens and Personal Finance Survey, sponsored by The Allstate Foundation, examines teens' attitudes and behaviors around money management. For the first time in the survey's 16-year history, parents in addition to teens were surveyed to draw comparisons between the responses of the two groups. Some surprising differences emerged:

- Paying for College: 48% of teens think their parents will help pay for college while only 16% of parents say they plan to pay for post-secondary education. Because of the rising college costs, there is a 32% spike in the number of teens considering a local community college instead of a four-year college or university.
- Parents' and Teens' Differing Views On Money Management: 89% of parents say their child learns about money from them. 34%, however,more than a third (34 percent) say they do not discuss money with their children and "let the kids be kids." But many young people want to learn more about managing money from their parents. A vast majority of teens (84 percent) say they look to their parents for information about how to manage money.
- Percentage of parents who say their child learns about money from them: Surprisingly, when parents do talk to their kids about money, there is a significant gender divide in the conversation. Specifically, girls are more likely than boys to say their parents don't talk to them enough about money management (40 percent versus 24 percent) and about paying for college (34 percent versus 23 percent). Moreover, boys are more likely than girls to report that their parents help them keep track of money (31 percent versus 20 percent). The survey shows that some parents may inadvertently be favoring their male children when they discuss money matters.
- Gender Gap in Future Expected Earning Power: The survey's key findings reveal that women— both teens and parents—have lower expectations about potential earning power than their male counterparts.

Looking Ahead for Those Who Are Returning Next Year:

- Tuition for 2015-16 is due on June 1st; the first payment for bank financed tuition is also due June 1st. Students will not receive their schedules in July and cannot start school in August if tuition/bank loans are not current.
- If your son is registered for next year and you change your mind during the summer about his attending SPS, PLEASE let me know AS SOON AS POSSIBLE.
- Summer reading assignments are on our website.
- BE VIGILANT during the summer there are many temptations that will face your sons this summer. Drug testing will resume in the fall!
- Thursday, August 6, is the first day of school. This is a full day of instruction, not the traditional Book Day. Attendance is expected.
- A complete 2015-16 school year calendar is posted on the website. Be informed that the state has tightened the
 attendance policy and Saint Paul's is complying. PLEASE DO NOT SCHEDULE VACATIONS DURING SCHOOL
 TIME.

I'm Still Begging: I had an excellent response last week! Thanks to those who each week respond to my request. But PLEASE – I need everyone's help, **including alumni and grandparents**. For clarity, I offer the following:

- Almost all private schools conduct annual funds; many are high pressured; ours is not.
- The Annual Fund funds tactical, short term projects, e.g. technology, special programs (e.g. engineering). The Capital Campaign funds large infrastructure projects (the \$4 million La Salle Hall renovation.)
- You may "pledge" your gift and pay later or in installments (monthly, etc.). More and more families are using automatic credit card monthly payments of \$10 or \$20 dollars. WONDERFUL!
- Gifts of stock are welcome.
- No gift is too small. I repeat: no gift is too small! What's important is that everyone participates.
- If you are contributing to the Capital Campaign or financially supporting SPS in some other way, I understand! Thanks. Can you send \$10 to Annual Fund so I can show an increase in participation?
- Please consider helping if you have not already done so and are in a position to do so. Many thanks!
