Welcome to the third week of the 2015-16 school year. Due to the hard work and cooperation of many, we continue to have a wonderfully smooth opening of school. Thanks for being with us!

I stole, er...borrowed the following from Brother Nick Gonzalez, president of Cathedral High School in El Paso, who wrote it for his faculty, and I shared it with our faculty. It's a great message for parents, too, which stresses Saint La Salle's emphasis on relationship: between teacher and student and, by extension, between parent and child. Here's what Brother Nick wrote:

De La Salle reminded the first teachers that they were ambassadors of Jesus Christ, His direct representative to the students entrusted to their care. The goal of every day was "to write the letter dictated by Christ, not with ink but with the spirit of the living God, not on tablets of stone but on the hearts of children." That brief quote sums up the Lasallian school.

In order to write the letter, Lasallian teachers must first listen to God. Their agenda may need to be put aside to do what God instructs. Daily prayer is a necessity to fulfill this. De La Salle's contrast between stone and flesh is important. We can carve into stone but must be gentle with flesh. God wants hearts won over not through brutal force but through the teacher's affection and good example.

Let us pray for the grace to be zealous about the spiritual state of our students and sons. Let us pray for the grace to listen to God's good counsel and to act on it daily. May our gentle affection lead them to God!

I respectfully suggest that parents are "ambassadors of Jesus Christ" to their children. I further suggest that your job as parent is to "write the letter dictated by Christ with the spirit of the living God" on the hearts of your children. And I suggest that gentleness and affection – which parents demonstrate in abundance and can teach us teachers something –are the keys to doing this.

Great message, Brother Nick! Thanks! We send our prayers and best wishes to all at Cathedral High School, which has been providing Lasallian education to the young men of El Paso and Juarez since 1925! May the week and year ahead be filled with extraordinary doses of writing with the spirit of the living God! Thanks for being part of the 2015-16 edition of the Saint Paul's School and also part of 335 year tradition of the amazing Lasallian Family!


- **TDIH:** In 1896, prospectors find gold in Alaska, setting off the Klondike gold rush.



Wolf Pack Time: Our revised advisory program (now known as Wolf Packs) debuts on Tuesday. Here are the highlights of the program:

- All students are assigned to a Wolf Pack which will meet every other Tuesday. The Wolf Pack is a grouping of a single faculty member and a selection of students. Most, but not all, returning students have the same faculty advisor as they did last year. A many factors were involved in forming Packs but any adjustments were done out of necessity. Students will be informed on Mon about which Wolf Pack they are assigned to.

- The "re-branding" of the program to Wolf Packs is intended foster more of a 'pack' mentality to promote a stronger relationship within the group.
- A committee of teachers and students plans each Wolf Pack time.
- During Pack Time, we still deal with important topics of discussion when such topics are deemed relevant and necessary (bullying, safety, etc.). We also emphasize **DOING** things to reinforce the topic of the day as opposed to just talking.
- The success of the program relies upon everyone's openness to the structure. Many people, teachers and students work hard to make this program relevant and enjoyable.
- Senior leadership and mentoring is stressed, especially between seniors and Pre-freshmen. This is Big Brother program.
- I hope your son has positive things to say about our first Wolf Pack time on Tuesday.

From Archbishop Gregory Aymond Concerning the Boy Scouts: *On July 27, 2015, the National Executive Committee of the Boy Scouts of America ratified a resolution that removes the national restriction on openly gay adult leaders and employees. This*

policy change also affirms that

chartered organizations may continue to use religious beliefs as criteria for selecting adult leaders in the scouting units they charter. The National Catholic Committee on Scouting has stated that "the resolution respects the needs of Catholic-chartered organizations in the right to choose leaders whose character and conduct are consistent with those of Catholic teaching." At this time the Archdiocese of New Orleans will continue to charter units with the Boy Scouts of America and, in keeping with our right to religious liberty, work to ensure that the

adult leaders in our units are role models in living our Catholic faith. The archdiocese, in conjunction with the USCCB and the National Catholic Committee on Scouting, will continue to monitor and evaluate developments as the BSA resolution is implemented.

From Archbishop Aymond and Auxiliary Bishop Cheri: Our bishops are calling for dialogue and personal reflection in the ongoing discussion and debate regarding the removal of monuments which link us to historic events related to slavery. Their statement is worth reading. Here's the link:


Congratulations To:

This significant expansion of Holy Cross School, which has offered quality Catholic education in New Orleans since 1849, will put them in compliance with the Archdiocesan grade configuration mandate.

Cafeteria Payments: To pay on line, go to the web site www.schoolcafe.org and then My School Bucks comes up. Create an account. Put your son's name, DOB and school. You DO NOT have to enter the Student ID.

Traffic: Please drive carefully and, if your son drives to school, stress traffic safety with him. We've already learned of a few accidents on the way to and from school. Saint Paul's is located in a residential neighborhood, so be VERY careful when approaching campus. Covington Police will ticket violators – and we will take disciplinary action as well.

Lost & Found: Lunch boxes, uniform shirts, books, shoes – all sorts of things are being left behind on campus – almost all with no names on them. Please stress with your sons to need to keep track of his belongings. Putting his name on items helps, too. Lost & Found cabinet is located outside of the Attendance Office.

Seniors: Want to earn \$200 or more in one day? The St. Tammany Clerk of Court has opportunities for you as an Election Commissioner on Election Days. 17 year old US citizens enrolled in 12th grade as well as 18 year old and older registered voters are eligible. Service Hours: We remind all of our students of their obligation to do at least 10 hours of service this year. Last May, a number of seniors did not receive their caps and gowns because they had not completed their service hours. If a student does not want to help others by giving of his time, Saint Paul's is not the place for him.

Important Tax Info: The Louisiana Department of Revenue reminds parents that back-to-school shopping can qualify for a \$5,000 per-dependent tax deduction on their state tax returns next year by saving receipts. Items such as uniforms, supplies and TUITION are eligible for tax breaks on the income tax forms due May 15, 2013. The maximum deduction is \$5,000 per dependent student, he said.
