On Friday, the universal Church celebrates the Feast of the Guardian Angels. This feast was a favorite of St. John Baptist de La Salle. The school year in France began on October 2 during that time, and the function of guardian angels became a metaphor that La Salle used often in exhorting the brothers to take seriously their work of Christian education of youth. In honor of this feast, I again offer the following words from Saint La Salle. We certainly need our angels today!



- Children need good teachers, like **angels**, to help them learn Christian truth.
- Like **angels**, teachers help students understand the truths in the gospel and guide them in such a manner that they will be led to put these truths into practice.
- It is your duty to act towards the students in the manner in which your guardian **angel** acts toward you. Your angel inspires you and helps you keep clear of whatever obstacle you might encounter
- It is your duty, like the **angels**, to go up to God every day in prayer so that you can learn all you can about how and what to teach the students; and then come back down to their level to teach them what God taught you..
- You share in the ministry of guardian **angels**, helping students know the truth, and practice it. To do this, though, you must have great zeal for your work.
- As **angels**, you must cheer the faint-hearted, support the weak and be patient toward all. Is this what you have been doing? Has your zeal been ardent enough?
- Ask God for grace to watch so well over students confided to you that you take every possible care to shield them from fault. This must be your main concern.

I'm asking the teachers, this week and every week, to view themselves as guardian angels to the students entrusted to their care!

I'm asking parents, this week and every week, to view yourselves as guardian angels to the children that God has blessed you with!

And I'm asking students, this week and every week, to view yourselves as guardian angels to your friends and families!

- **TDIH:** In 1542, California was discovered by Portuguese explorer Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo upon his arrival at San Diego Bay.


- National Good Neighbor Day: Let's be good neighbors today and every day.

Tue, Sep 29 (Feast of Ss. Michael, Gabriel, & Raphael, Archangels; regular; B C D E)

- Today's feast honors Michael, Gabriel and Raphael -- the only named archangels in the Bible.
 - o **Michael** (meaning "Who is like God?") is mentioned in the Book of Daniel as Israel's protector, acting as captain with other angels to thrust earth's evil rulers into the flames. His status as conqueror of God's enemy is further stressed in the Apocalypse (12:7-9) where he and his angels cast down Satan and his rebellious followers. Michael is also portrayed as an intercessor with God for mankind.
 - o **Gabriel** (meaning "God is my strength") appears in four biblical episodes: twice to the Daniel to explain Messianic visions; once to Zachary to announce the birth of John the Baptist; & once to Mary: "Hail thou who art full of grace, the Lord is with thee! Blessed art thou among women!"
 - o **Raphael** (meaning "God has healed") plays an important part in the Book of Tobias, where he was sent by God to assist Tobias by curing his blindness.
 - o May these three great angels protect us at Saint Paul's, where we have almost 100 students and faculty who have "Michael" as a first or middle name & 4 who have Gabriel! Happy Feast Day to them all!
- **TDIH:** In 1954, Willie Mays, centerfielder for the New York Giants, makes an amazing over-the-shoulder catch of a fly ball hit by Cleveland Indians first baseman Vic Wertz to rob Wertz of extra bases in Game 1 of the 1954 World Series. - National Taco Day: Enjoy! From the NTD web site: The history of the taco is unknown. While I'm not a proponent of inappropriate writing or students reading inappropriate literature, I do think that some entities have "gone overboard" in banning books, e.g. Huckleberry Finn, Of Mice and Men, To Kill A Mockingbird, Romeo and Juliet — all of these classics and more have been banned in some schools. Drug Testing: We received results from our first batch of drug tests. While the overwhelming number of them were negative, we did, unfortunately, have a few positive results. I'm depressed. I again offer the following latest research from the Journal of Modern Medicine (courtesy of Dr. Ann Kay Logarbo): Adolescents who smoke marijuana on a regular basis face a decline in intelligence and brain function, even if they quit using the drug as adults. The findings are the first to associate a drop in neuropsychological functioning with cannabis use....The findings suggest that cannabis has a neurotoxic effect on the adolescent brain, causing declines in intellectual functioning, especially in executive function and processing speed. Participants who began smoking marijuana as adults saw a small or no drop in intelligence or functioning. and defense attorneys, bailiff and jurors. In Teen Court the defendant has admitted guilt; therefore; the jury's responsibility is to determine a constructive sentence. Teen Court hearings are held in a local courthouse with strict confidentiality. Licensed attorneys serve as judges. Defendants are questioned by both the teen defense and prosecution attorneys to determine the circumstances of the offense. After careful consideration of the facts and circumstances, the teen jury determines a fair and constructive sentence, which may include community service and participation in future teen court sessions, counseling, attending educational programs, writing essays and letters of apology and repaying the victim. Our future lawyers are getting incredible real world experience.


