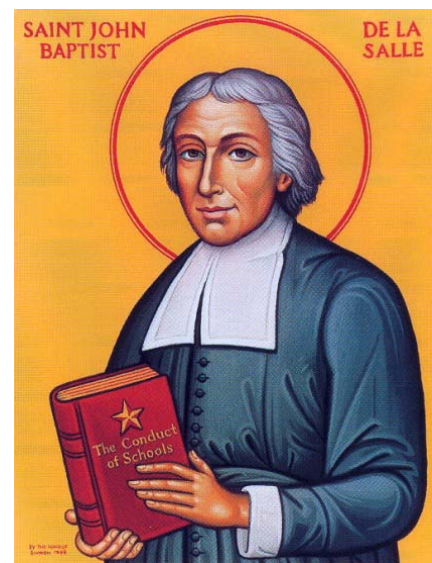
Welcome to the start of the second quarter and congratulations on an excellent first one! During this week, our Lasallian Young Leaders will help us celebrate the educational giant who founded the Brothers of the Christian Schools and whose work we continue today at Saint Paul's School. They have many activities planned for us this week, and I am most grateful for all of their hard work. Each day has a Lasallian Core Principle as a theme, and activities of the day revolve around that theme.

The LYLs moved Founder's Week to the fall this year for several reasons: increased chance of better weather (we had a terrible spring storm on Field Day two years ago) and the already crowded field of springtime activities. Plus, by focusing on our Founder now, we still have three quarters to better implement his vision and mission!

I shared the following words of St. John Baptist de La Salle with the faculty in their newsletter and encouraged them to use these words of St. La Salle to inspire them in their work. Again, I respectfully suggest that the words are equally applicable to your work as parents:



- ***It is God who has called you to this form of service [parenting];***
- ***Every day God calls you anew to the needs these children have;***
- ***It is God's own work that he entrusts to you;***
- ***Your presence among young people brings salvation to them;***
 - ***Be satisfied with what you can do, since God is satisfied with it, but do not spare yourself in what you can do with grace; and believe that, if you want it, you can do more with the grace of God than you think.***
- ***In you, and through your [parental] ministry, these children encounter God, who knows each of them by name, who loves them, and who goes out searching endlessly for those who have gone astray.***

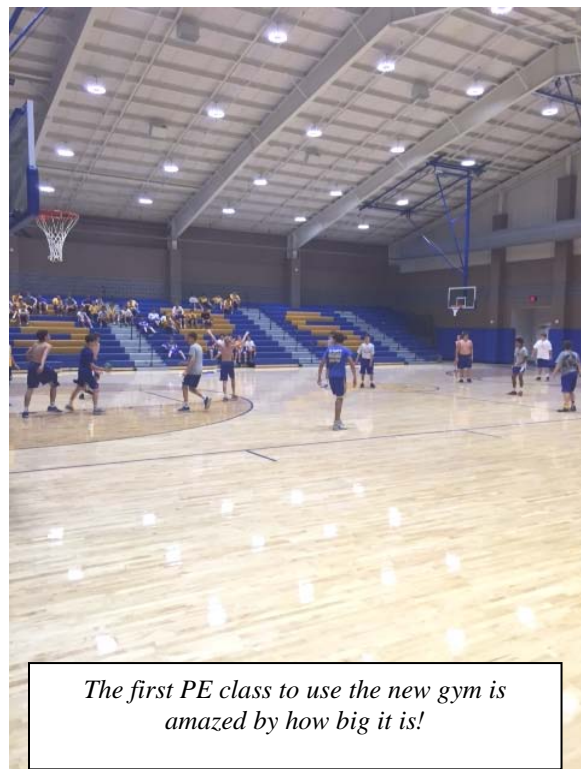
- **Dictionary Day:** In 1758, Noah Webster, considered the Father of the American Dictionary, was born. In his honor, read a dictionary today; learn a new word!

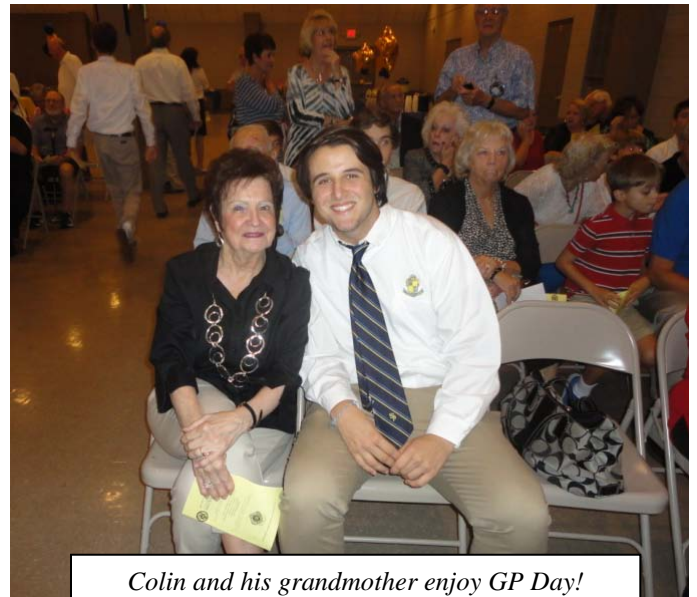

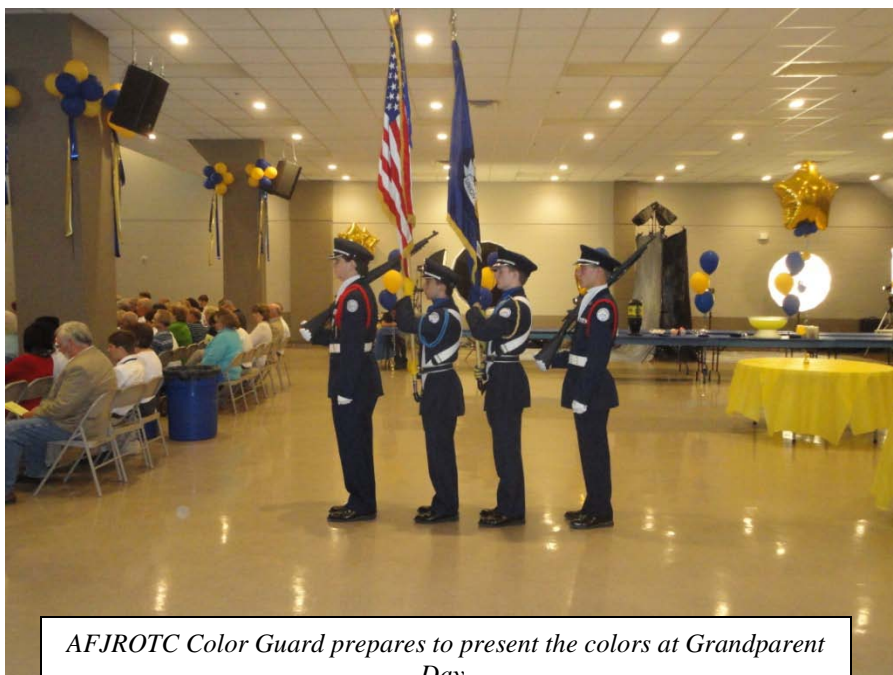
