Four years ago this Wednesday, Oct 28, 2011, Brother Alvaro Rodriguez Echeverria, then-Superior General of the Brothers of the Christian Schools, visited SPS. In his honor, we celebrated a memorable all-school liturgy and formed a Lasallian star. It was a magical moment in our school's history and the picture remains an iconic one. In his address to the students during Mass that day, **Brother Alvaro made the following points which are worthy of review:**

## Next Dress Uniform Day: Monday, November 2!

**Gene Bennett Sports Complex Dedication:** The official blessing went well with many people in attendance, including Gene's family. Thanks to the Development Team of Danielle, Shellie, Mimi, Al, Karen, Andrew, the Brass Band, the maintenance Crew, Phil & PE coaches and all who helped make it so successful. The gym played to rave reviews. And I was deeply touched when student council president Leland and vice president Adam presented me with a bronze wolf in honor of the occasion.

Coincidentally, it was exactly one year ago last week that the building permit for the new gym was issued. It's worth

remembering the courageous decision the Brothers made in 1955 to build what is now "the old gym." Here's the story, as taken from *The Saint Paul's Story*, written by Brother Ephem Hebert.

It became impossible to play any basketball games in the old gym [the theater] inasmuch as the court was not regulation size. The hoopmen from St. Paul's had to go over to Covington High every afternoon to practice, and all of their games had to be played away from home. Brother Conrad [who was President at the time] decided to build another gym with the funds which he had available, which amounted to about \$25,000. He knew most of the work would have to be done by the

Brothers and boys, and they were more than willing to pitch in.... This arrangement worked well since it gave the Brothers and boys the opportunity to use their unskilled labor to the fullest extent. The site for the new gym was cleared, the foundations dug, the steel was set in place and all was in readiness for pouring the concrete at the end of April, 1955. Brother Alex had procured two concrete mixers for the occasion. Brother Ephrem worked one mixer and Brother Alex the other, while Brother Conrad directed the movement of the boys. Starting at five o-clock in the morning of May 31 and continuing on through the day, the thirty five seniors from the class of 1955 worked constantly, pausing only to eat a sandwich now and then. At five o'clock in the afternoon, the job was finished; one hundred and twenty yards of concrete had

been mixed and poured into the forms....During the summer Brother Alex directed the work of bricklaying, plumbing, electrical work, etc. while Brother Ephrem did the carpentry work on the side roofs of the dressing rooms, hung the doors, etc. The floor was laid in October of the same year [by the way, the current floor is the original floor!] again with the labor of the boys. The completed gym had cost \$40,000. The gym was ready in April, 1956, and was dedicated to Brother Alex. Brother Conrad named the building The St. Jude Center, as everyone had thought that it would be impossible to get a fine gym like this so quickly at so low a cost.

## May future generations say that we, too, were courageous in our decision to build a new gym for our students – which cost over 100 times what the 1955 gym cost!

**There He Goes Again:** Halloween is this Saturday; it's not my favorite day. I beg parents to preach safe choices with their children. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) says the scariest Halloween activity is drinking and driving, with 52 percent of all national fatalities on Halloween night from 2007 to 2011 involving a drunk driver. In addition, NHTSA points out that drinking and driving is one of the reasons why teenagers are involved in three times as many fatal crashes as all other drivers.



**Christian Brothers Services:** During last Monday's faculty meeting, representatives from Christian Brothers Services discussed medical and retirement benefits with our faculty and staff. They presented a great deal of information in an understandable and time-sensitive manner. I even learned a couple of things. Our faculty left the meeting feeling good about their retirement and health plan benefits. I would match our plans against any other school, including the public sector.

While our meeting focused on medical and retirement plans, Christian Brothers Services goes way beyond these two benefit areas. The school's auto, property, liability, workman's compensation, student accident, and unemployment insurance programs are all with
