Alleluia! He is risen!

Welcome to the sixth week of the fourth quarter of the 2015-16 school year! Only four weeks left to go!

Two years ago this Wednesday, Apr 27, Pope Francis canonized the late Pope John XXIII and the late Pope John Paul II. In the Catholic Church, "canonization" makes the person an official "saint" of the Church. The Church stresses that both former popes were canonized because of personal holiness, not politics or Church governance. Few can dispute that both were among the most influential 20th Century spiritual leaders. Accordingly, I offer you the following quotations from Saint John XXIII and Saint John Paul II as we begin the final month of the school year. First, from Saint John XXIII:



- See everything, overlook a great deal, correct a little.
- o A peaceful man does more good than a learned one.
- Anybody can be Pope; the proof of this is that I have become one.
- The feelings of my smallness and my nothingness always kept me good company.
- o Men are like wine some turn to vinegar, but the best improve with age.
- o It is easier for a father to have children than for children to have a real father.
- o Consult not your fears but your hopes and dreams. Think not about your

frustrations, but about your unfulfilled potential. Concern yourself not with what you tried and failed in, but with what it is still possible for you to do.

And from Saint John Paul II:

- As the family goes, so goes the nation and the whole world in which we live.
- o Freedom consists not in doing what we like, but in having the right to do what we ought.
- From now on it is only through a conscious choice and through a deliberate policy that humanity can survive.
- The great danger for family life, in the midst of any society whose idols are pleasure, comfort and independence, lies in the fact that people close their hearts and become selfish.
- To maintain a joyful family requires much from both parents and children. Each family member must be, in a special way, the servant of the others.
- Violence and arms can never resolve the problems of men.
- Young people are threatened... by the evil use of advertising techniques that stimulate the natural inclination to avoid hard work by promising the immediate satisfaction of every desire.



• This Day in History: In 1862, Union troops take possession of New Orleans after Confederate General Mansfield Lovell surveyed his tiny force and realized that resistance was futile. If he resisted, Lovell told Mayor John Monroe, the city would be bombed, causing severe damage and casualties.

- National Zipper Day: Have you ever thought about what your life would be like without zippers? Backpacks, blue jeans, gym bags ... the list is endless. On April 29, 1913, Swedish-born scientist Gideon Sundback was issued a patent for his "Hookless Fastener." The rest is history. Yoshida Kogyo Kabushibibaisha is the world's largest zipper manufacturer. You are likely to see "YKK" engraved on many of your own zippers. It measures 6,000 feet long and was commissioned as a publicity stunt for the hotel's nightclub, "Zippers."

- Happy Birthday Louisiana! From the official Louisiana Website: On April 30, 1812, the United States admitted Louisiana as the 18th state into the Union. Louisiana was the first state to have a majority Catholic French- and Spanish-speaking population, reflecting its origins as a colony under France from 1699-1763 and Spain from 1763-1803. Following the Louisiana Purchase in 1803, Louisiana's road to statehood was not all smooth. Federal law required citizens of a newly admitted territory to apply to congress for statehood, and the admission of the Orleans Territory as the 18th state followed years of lobbying efforts by prominent citizens—both American and Creole (French-speaking Catholics). Finally in 1811, Democratic President James Madison signed the bill allowing the people of Louisiana to form a state constitution. Following the state constitutional convention in New Orleans, on April 14, 1812, President Madison signed the bill approving statehood. The bill designated April 30, 1812, as the day of formal admission. Join me in praying for our state on its birthday!

What this group of pre-freshmen did, under Julie and Marie's leadership, was truly extraordinary – back to back invitations to the World Championships. St. Benedict's Prep in Newark: If you missed the CBS Sixty Minutes segment on this incredible school recently, set aside 15 minutes to watch the powerfully moving profile. The 7-12 school, which serves 550 boys from low-income neighborhoods in Newark, NJ, has a 98 percent graduation rate. In large measure, it is run by the students themselves. They look after one other with great love and care, a testament to the school's motto, "Whatever hurts my brother hurts me." Correspondent Scott Pelley reports that students at St. Benedict's call each other "brother," and every morning "celebrate a revival," singing songs, praying, and chanting: "You can be any good thing you want to be. Go and conquer!" Student leader Bruce Davis explains, "Benedict's men are different than the guys you see outside.....We learn what we're willing to accept, which is nothing but the best, nothing but finishing what we started." The school year at St. Benedict's is 11 months, and although tuition is \$12,000, 80 percent of students pay only half that amount. That leaves the school's headmaster, Rev. Edwin Leahy, with the challenge of filling the gap with the support of alumni, corporations, and philanthropists. Students earn the right to wear the school's black hoodie, fashioned after the habit of the Benedictine monks, only after completing a set of rigorous requirements, including a 55-mile hike along the Appalachian Trail. The 60 Minutes Overtime video that features the hike is well worth the watch. In it, Pelley reflects on the deep camaraderie the students share: "That's what you have in that school, boys taking care of each other," he says. 

Important Driver's License Requirement: A new requirement was added to the driver's license issuance process for all minor applicants. All minor applicants must produce proof the applicant has either received a diploma or is currently enrolled in a high school program. This is done through a school attendance form from his or her high school prior to applying for a driver's license. These forms can be obtained in the administration building or the counseling center.

Louisiana Income Tax Tuition Deduction: Under LA Revised Statute 47:297:10, those with children in private and parochial schools who file LA income tax returns are allowed a deduction for tuition and other qualifying expenses. Don't forget to take advantage of

this benefit for the 2015 tax year. The Archdiocesan lobbyist feels the statute appears somewhat vulnerable for 2016.

Summer at Camp Abbey: As many of you will have heard by now, Camp Abbey was included in the flooding which struck much of the north shore on Friday, March 11th. The extent of the damage to the camp and the anticipated repair time has yet to be determined, but they remain optimistic. The Archdiocese is committed to getting the camp up and running as quickly as possible.
