
Mon, Mar 20 (Regular; C D E F) - Feast of St. Joseph observed today since March 19 was a Sunday



• Today's feast was special to Saint John Baptist de La Salle. The morning and night prayers of the first Brothers included a special prayer to Joseph and in the Brothers' Rule of 1705, the Brothers were instructed to gather at 1 pm (before afternoon classes) to recite the litany of Saint Joseph, the "patron and protector of the Institute." And a holiday was given in those early days on the feast of Saint Joseph! (Oh, for the good old days!) In his meditation for the feast of Saint Joseph, Saint La Salle says: You have been charged, like Saint Joseph, with a holy work very similar to his and requiring that your

piety and your virtue be more than ordinary. You have been made responsible for your students just as Saint Joseph was made responsible for the Savior of the world. Take Saint Joseph as your model to make yourself worthy of your ministry.

- For the December 10, 2016 test date, about 251 students registered, with currently at least 241 students with reportable scores. Of those who tested, 10% of students come from the underserved learners' population. Test results have already been sent to 104 colleges and universities across 28 different states from the Dec test.

Mar 14 Assembly: I hope the students enjoyed our March 14 assembly. Here is some of what we did:

Students entered the gym to the strains of Antonio Vivaldi's "Spring" from his famous "Four Seasons Suite." I explained that Vivaldi is a famous Baroque era Italian composer who lived from 1678 – 1741. I reminded them that Baroque music is dramatic and powerful and that Vivaldi musically interpreted the difference seasons with amazing precision. And why was I emphasizing the season of spring? In addition to signs of spring springing up all over, we are in the season of Lent – and the word "lent" comes from an Old English word meaning "spring." It's a time for our relationship with God to "bloom" just like the spring flowers. It's a time for us to bask in the warmth of God's love, just like we bask in the warmth of spring following the cold of winter. And as the days lengthen, it's a time for us to lengthen our commitment to "put off the things of night" and walk in the daylight.

While the music played, junior Matthew Borgatti lit the prayer candle – now purple for Lent. We prayed in a special way for those who have entered into God's Kingdom since our last assembly: Mrs. Clare Louise Cooper Drinkard, Grandmother of John Buckley '20; Mr. Vic Baricev, grandfather of Robert Baricev '17; Mrs. Margaret Imm, sister-in-law of Mrs. Mary Pierson; Mr. Paul Kent, great grandfather of Jared Saltaformaggio '17; and, of course, we prayed for Michael – who was attending his first President's Assembly since his return.

Now in its 22nd year, the awards honor students in grades 7-12 who have excelled in the classroom, served their community, and/or shown great courage in overcoming adversity in their own lives. From the LPB website: 18-year-old Reagan Hill survived a horrible diving accident when he was 14. Because of his amazing attitude, strength, and perseverance, he was able to walk out of the hospital just six weeks later. Reagan's accident led him to found "Reagan's Peanut Butter Project" that has raised over \$12,000 and has assisted more than 900 individuals who have suffered injuries or are dealing with cancer in a three-state region. Reagan's Peanut Butter Project Facebook page posts encouraging messages and words of hope. Reagan has been involved in volunteer work for a number of years, helping the Covington Food Bank, Habitat for Humanity, Children's Advocacy Center, and other organizations. Reagan is also an honor student with a 4.02 grade point average.


