
## Repent and Believe the Gospel!

**Rest in Peace:** Saint Paul's lost two stalwarts last week:

- Mr. Raymond Maestri, Class of 1947: Mr. Maestri was a member of the legendary 1947 State Track and Field Championship team coached by then Brother Jasper Ward. It was the last state championship for many years! He was a member of the SPS Athletic Hall of Fame (which has since become dormant) and had three sons and five grandsons graduate from SPS. In addition, he was a neighbor, owning the house across from the tennis courts (northwest corner). Rest in peace, Mr. Maestri!
- Brother Michael Langlois, OSB: Brother Michael served St. Joseph Abbey faithfully for 68 years, 54 of them as sacristan for the Abbey Church. It was in this capacity that I got to know Brother Michael. For over 20 years (1972-1994), SPS held its graduation ceremonies in the Abbey Church. Our classes were small enough in those days for the church to accommodate the congregation barely in the latter years and only after renting several hundred folding chairs. The combination of the beauty of our graduation with the beauty of the Abbey Church was stunning. I still have warm and emotional memories of those ceremonies. Naturally, we needed the cooperation and assistance of Brother Michael during practices and the ceremony itself. Although he was more than gracious to me, it was obvious that our "intrusion" into his well-ordered sacristy monastic routine was a challenge for him. Nevertheless, he was always most welcoming and accommodating. I couldn't have asked for more. God bless you, Brother Michael! Thank you and rest in peace!


