Welcome to the first full week of the 2018 - 19 school year. We've had a smooth opening. Thanks!

Our beginning of the year faculty meetings last week provided me with memorable moments. We began meetings on Aug 6 with Student Council President Josh Rovira reminding us of the power of teacher / student relationships – especially in terms of helping students get involved with SPS life. Josh exhorted the faculty to continue being older brothers and sisters to our students, which is in the finest Lasallian tradition. Throughout the meetings, presenters referred to Saint La Salle's belief that the school must be a place of salvation: both earthly salvation and eternal salvation. And, of course, we covered practical rules, practices and policies.

So what does all of the above have to do with you as parents? Well, I humbly submit the following:

- Just as Josh stressed teacher / student relationships, your relationship with your son is critical to your success as a parent – and with teenagers, that's not always easy! But help him involved with SPS life!
- Just as Saint La Salle wanted his schools to be places of salvation, your home must also be a place of salvation – both earthly and heavenly.
- Just as the school community invoked Our Lady of the Star last year to "guide us to God", you, as parents, must be the "star" that guides your sons to God.
- Just as we this year remember our Founding Brothers, you must help your son appreciate the foundational members of your family and the sacrifices that were made to afford him all that he has today.
- And just as we went over policies and procedures with teachers, you as parents must make clear your rules for and expectations of your sons.

In my newsletter to teachers this week, I reminded them of what Christian Brother Superior General Brother Robert said to the Lasallian world three years ago: *if anything is to get done, it's up to the Lasallian world family to do it.* Similarly, it is up to you as parent, if your son is to be the man God is calling him to be.

Let us pray for and support each other as we begin our new school year, the 108th year of SPS history, thus continuing the Lasallian tradition of transforming lives since 1680.





Mon, Aug 13 (Assembly schedule; B C D E) – Feast of Saint Brother Benilde, FSC



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• Today we celebrate the feast of Saint Brother Benilde (1805-1862) -- the very person after whom we named Benilde Hall. His story should inspire us all. Doing the common things in an uncommon way led to Benilde's sainthood. This was our theme four years ago, and I do not want us to forget it. When you pass Benilde Hall, ask this wonderful Christian Brother saint to assist you in doing the common things in an uncommonly good way! But what else do you really know about St. Benilde? We ask him in prayer several times a day to help us to do ordinary things extraordinarily well. But, what do you really know about him?

- Did you know he was a hunchback and was unable to straighten out his right leg?
- Did you know that he was bullied in school because of his appearance?
- Did you know that that once the boys in his school found out how intelligent he

was they called on him to help with their studies?

- Did you know that he was only 4'9" tall?
- Did you know that while in his early 30's he was already principal of a school?
- Did you know that he inspired over two hundred young men to become Christian Brothers?
- Did you know he learned sign language to help the students in his school who were deaf?
- Did you know he buried the dead, fed the hungry, visited the sick, and conducted night classes for adults?
- The many things St. Benilde did for the young to give them a human and Christian education seem quite extraordinary, but he had a very humble beginning. Although intelligent, initially the Brothers did not allow him to teach because of his appearance. For two years, following the Novitiate, he served in the community of Aurillac as a domestic Brother, cleaning the house, taking care of the vegetable garden, cleaning dishes and preparing the community meals. He did all of these very ordinary things very well. Eventually, he was allowed to teach and in a very short time, he became a great leader and good example to all the Brothers. He was a man of extraordinary charity. He died when he was only 57, his reputation for holiness spread rapidly and he was the first teaching Brother canonized by the Catholic Church in 1967.

Arrival of the Christian Brothers): For most of its history, Saint Paul's had boarding as well as day students. On Saturday mornings, boarders would hike through the woods of St. Tammany. This was also the time when they took unsuspecting new borders on a "snipe hunt." The Junior Conservation Unit met once or twice a month to study animals, birds, plants and trees and ways to preserve and protect them.

Tue, Aug 14 (Assembly; F G A B)

- Feast of St. Maximilian Kolbe. Born in Poland in 1894, Maximilian became a Franciscan. After earning a doctorate in theology, Maximilian did missionary work in Japan and India, returning to Poland in 1936 due to ill health. In 1941, he was arrested by Nazis and sent to the concentration camp at Auschwitz, where on July 31, 1941, in a reprisal for one prisoner's escape, ten men were chosen to die. Father Kolbe offered himself in place of a young husband and father. He was the last to die, enduring two weeks of starvation, thirst, and neglect. He was canonized by John Paul II in 1982.
- **TDIH**: On this day in 1935, President Franklin D. • Roosevelt signs into law the Social Security Act.
- TDIH: In 1945, the Empire of Japan informs the US of • its surrender, thus ending WW II.
- **DYK:** Our Lady of Peace Chapel, built in 1964, was a • gift of Mr. & Mrs. Ernest V. Beck, parents of Brother Francis Beck who was principal of Saint Paul's from 1961-1968 and who built many of the buildings we


currently use. Today, our chapel provides a place of welcome, comfort, and the Real Presence of God. Encourage your son to visit the chapel.

- **Today** celebrates Mary being assumed body and soul into Heaven • at her death and being crowned Queen of Heaven. Pope Pius XII infallibly proclaimed the Dogma of the Assumption in 1950. May our Blessed Mother shower our school with her protection!
- TDIH: In 1914, the American-built Panama Canal, connecting the • Atlantic and Pacific, is inaugurated with the passage of the U.S. vessel Ancon, a cargo and passenger ship.
- TDIH: In 1877, Thomas Edison wrote to president of the • Telegraph Co in Pittsburgh. The letter stated that the word, "hello" would be a more appropriate greeting than "ahoy" when answering the telephone – which was the way people were answering. I like

Thu, Aug 16 (Regular; G A B C)

- TDIH: Baseball great Babe Ruth (aka The Bambino & The Sultan of Swat) and rock star icon Elvis Pressley (The King) died in 1948 & 1977, respectively, at ages 53 & 42, respectively.



The full moon allowed him to glimpse the snow on top of nearby Cow Mountain. The tasty treat was tremendously popular among the town's children, who then called it a "black cow." Note: several dates claim to be the "national celebration day" -- obviously, people want an excuse to indulge!


I draw the following to your attention (in alphabetical order, not order of importance):

After School Issues: Assignment Hall (see below) and detention will soon be in operation. Parents, stress with your sons the need to do homework and follow rules. If your son does end up in AH or detention, establish a procedure for him to follow so you are not wandering around looking for him. We tell the AH student to call their parents. We'll provide a phone if needed.

Assignment Hall: AH will be in full swing this week. Students will be sent to AH if they report to class without homework. They will stay in AH until they finish the homework. AH is not a punishment but a helping structure. Stress with your son the need to complete his homework on time and to bring it to class.

Attendance: Please comply with our attendance regulations as printed in the handbook, which is posted on Edline. This is especially true when a student is absent or needs to check out during the day.

Benilde Hall: We received a certificate of occupancy for the second and third floors from the State Fire Marshall and the City of Covington last week - after extensive renovation of Benilde Hall. The first floor and outside areas will need a few more weeks. The wait was well worth it. More classrooms, better restrooms, an elevator, improved lighting and HVAC, additional ingress and egress, student services, and more. In case you don't know its history, Benilde Hall was built in 1959 under the principalship/presidency of the late Brother Cassian Lange. The second and third floors were open dormitories for 6th and 7th grades. The bottom floor contained study halls and recreation rooms. When SPS dropped 6th grade, the first two floors were converted into classrooms. Interesting trivia: Trevor had one of those non-air conditioned classrooms and bought a window unit - making it one of the few air-conditioned classrooms on campus. It was cool but that unit was loud! The third floor remained a dormitory for 7th grade. When we dropped 7th grade, the third floor became the band room! (Imagine lugging all those instruments up three flights of stairs!) The current band room was a rec hall for the boarders. When the number of boarders started dropping, we moved the rec hall into La Salle Hall and converted the third floor to classrooms. And now we begin the latest (and last – at least for me!) incarnation of that storied (pun)

building! Saint Benilde! Help us turn that ordinary building into an extraordinary one!

Cell Phones:

- State Law prohibits motorists from using any type of hand held wireless communications device while traveling through schools zones during posted hours. The law includes use of a cellular/wireless device for engaging in a voice call, accessing, reading, or posting to a social networking site, and/or writing, sending, or reading a text-based communication. The school zone cell phone ban does not apply if the device is being used to report an emergency, is being used in a hands-free manner, or while the vehicle is lawfully parked. Upon first violation of the school zone ban the fine is \$175, subsequent violations can be up to \$500, and if a crash occurs during the time of the violation, fines can be increased.
- School Cell Phone Policy allows students to use their phones during lunch but only outside. If you need to call or text your son, do so during the lunch hour. Disciplinary action and fines will continue for violation of this policy. With our campus wide wi-fi, he can use his phone to surf the internet if needed.



Centennial Celebration: On Saturday, July 28th, hundreds of people filled St. Louis Cathedral to celebrate with the Christian Brothers of the San Francisco New Orleans District on the 100th anniversary of the Brothers' continuous service in the Archdiocese of New Orleans. The assembled included three archbishops, numerous priests, over 30 Brothers (including General Counselor Brother Tim Coldwell, all the way from Rome), affiliated members, students from the four Lasallian schools in the Archdiocese, and many, many alumni and parents of students, past and present. Following a very moving mass, guests were invited to visit a special centennial collection at the Old Ursuline Convent, tracing the last 100 years. Following that, guests were invited to a special celebration on the Steamboat Natchez, which cruised the Mississippi River - showing our Brothers from the West what Southern hospitality and celebration is all about. It was a magical day. Special thanks for former SPS Vice President for Development, Brother Gale Condit, who was responsible for organizing the events of the day, and to the many generous benefactors who underwrote the celebration. Ad multos annos, Lasallian education in the Archdiocese of NO! BTW, the Ursuline Convent display will remain for the entire month of Aug.

Centennial Tidbit: Though we are celebrating our 100 years of continuous presence in Louisiana, the Brothers' roots here go back as far as 1819 when three Brothers came to the Archdiocese of New Orleans from France with the new Archbishop who stationed them in St. Genevieve, MO, part of the diocesan territory of the time. That venture was short lived. The Brothers returned to Louisiana from 1851-1900, operating the following schools:

- St. Patrick's School in New Orleans (1851)
- Our Lady of the Gulf in Bay St. Louis (1852)
- St. Mary's Academy in New Orleans (1854)
- St. John the Baptist in New Orleans (1859)
- St. Joseph School in New Orleans (1859)
- St. Mary's College in New Orleans (1865)
- St. Joseph's in Baton Rouge (1867)
- St. Theresa's School in New Orleans (1870)

Because of epidemics and financial hardships, the Brothers were forced to leave, not to return until 1918, when they assumed ownership of Saint Paul's and the administration of Saint Peter's (now Catholic High) in New Iberia.





Silent Sustained Reading: On Tuesday, we will begin daily SSR (Sustained Silent Reading) during the first 15 minutes of Block 2. During this time, everyone in the school (students, teachers, administrators, and staff) will read silently for 15 minutes. This is not a time for homework, tutoring, studying textbooks or doing assigned reading, but is designed to make reading a school-wide priority by reading for pleasure. We hope to develop a population of self-motivated readers. The program was created over 30 years ago at the University of Vermont and over the years has resulted in increased development, vocabulary reading fluency and comprehension, writing quality, improved standardized

test scores, increased background knowledge on a wide range of topics, and increased reading time out of school. We instruct students to bring their own reading material but we will have classrooms stocked with magazines, novels, short stories, etc. Help your son prepare for this initiative and have him come prepared on Monday and every day thereafter. You might want to consider initiating a family SSR time, too! I'll keep you posted as to how things go.


- Consider an alternate pick up location for your son other than Founder's Circle. These include the drop off area by the Gene Bennett Sports Complex, the parking lot on the corner of 13th and Jefferson St. or the parking lot at LaSalle Hall on 11th Avenue. You can drive through these parking lots or wait in a parking space there without holding up traffic elsewhere.
- DO NOT pick up your son using the shoulder of 11th Avenue. This is a dangerous area with poor visibility and further backs up traffic when you stop to load or unload.
- If you use the LaSalle Drive (main entrance) car line, please wait to the left so that thru traffic can still move through our campus using the right lane.
- Coordinate with your son about where and when you will meet him in the afternoon. If he is not present when you drive through, please proceed to a parking lot and wait for him there. If you stop in the car line to wait, you are holding up all cars behind you.
- Remind your son to be on the lookout for your car as you drive up.
- Our primary concern is safety, so please adhere to all speed limit and traffic rules in the school area. We are working closely with the Covington Police Department to find solutions to traffic around school. Working together, we can improve both safety and circulation around our campus.


